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## THIRTY-FOURTH ANNUAL REPOR'T.

## T0 THE RIGHT HONOURABLE THE LORDS COMMISSIONERS OF HER MAJESTY'S TREASURY.

My Lords,

I have the honour to submit to your Lordships the Thirty-fourth Annual Report on the Post Office, being the Report for the year ended the 31st of March 1888.
The following table shows the estimated number of letters, \&c. delivered in the United Kingdom during the twelve months ended the 31st of March :-

Of the total number of letters, \&c. delivered about 85 per cent. were delivered in England and Wales ( 28 per cent. being delivered in the London Postal district alone), 9.0 per cent. in Scotland, and 6.0 per cent. in Ireland.
The number of registered letters was $10,814,722$, an increase of 0.3 per cent.
New Post Offices have been opened in 396 places, and about Now Offices, 973 letter boxes have been added, making the total number of \&c. receptacles 36,750 , of which 17,587 are Post Offices.
A sum of nearly $84,500 \mathrm{l}$. was expended upon the purchase of sites for Post Office buildings during the year. Of this amount about $35,200 l$. was expended on sites in London, and about $49,200 l$. on sites in the Provinces. These sums include, among other items, 33,711l. spent for completing the puchase of the site of the new buildings for the General Post Office, North, in London, and $30,308 l$. for the purchase of the Athenæum in Glasgow for the enlargement of the Post Office in that city. Besides this, the Cffice of Works expended about 118,000l. on new Post Office buildings in England, Wales, and Scotland, and on the maintenance and enlargement of existing offices, while a
further sum of about $10,300 l$. was expended in a similar manner by the Board of Public Works in Ireland.

New Crown Post Offices have been completed at Aidershot Camp, Bradford (Yorks), Douglas (Isle of Man), Halifax, Redditch, Romford, and Tralee ; besides many Branch and Sorting Offices.
The new Telegraph Factory at Bovay Place, Holloway, was also completed during the year. Progress is being made with the new General Post Office, North, and with the enlargement of the Central Savings Bank buildings. Much relief has been afforded in the Sorting Offices of the General Post Office by the transfer of the Parcel sorting to the old prison buildings at Coldbath Fields, where a site of about $7 \frac{1}{\frac{1}{2}}$ acres, very conveniently situated, has been acquired. It is intended to transfer several other branches of the Post Office business to this site as soon as the necessary arrangements can be made.
Staff. The total number of Officers on the permanent establishment of the Department is about 56,460 ; the number added during the year having been 1,609 . The number of females included in this total is 3,872 , employed as follows:-

Besides the foregoing, there are, it is estimated, about 48,900 persons employed by lucal Postmasters, \&c. throughout the country to aid in carrying on the business of the Department, of whom about 16,000 are females. Most of these persons have private occupations and are employed on postal duty for a few hours only in the day.

The list of retired officers in receipt of pensions shows a total of 3,319 , whose pensions amount to $177,135 l$. a year.

The conduct and general health of the staff continue to be satisfactory.

Under a new contract an acceleration has been effected in the Day Mail Serrice to Downpatrick, Newcastle, Donaghadee, Bangor, and other towns on the Belfast and County Down Railway. The new lines of railway to Bodmin and Helston have been utilised for conveying the Mails. The Down Night Mail to Dolgelly has been accelerated, and between Bath and Bournemouth a new Night Mail train has been established.

In Scotland arrangements have been made for the Mail Packet between Skye and Strome Ferry, which now runs six days a week in Summer and three days a week in Winter, to be continued six days a week throughout the year, and the Mail Packet Service between Strome Ferry and Stornoway has been similarly improved; while a new service by packet has been established thrice a week between Portree and Dunvegan.

Inland Sumple Post.

An Inland Sample Post was established on the 1st of October last, and from a return kept in London it appears that during
the first six months 441,784 articles were posted in London for transmission undor this system, and 43,742 were received for delivery.
The Parcel Post Lusiness has increased largely. The total Parcel Post. number of parcels posted during the year was $36,731,786$, an increase of nearly 12 per cent. on the previous year, apportioned thus:-England and Wales, 30,363,773 ; Scotland, 3,881,895; Ireland, $2,486,118$.
The subjoined Table gives a comparison between the business conducted in 1884-5, 1885-6, 1886-7, and 1887-8:

A Parcel Service by coach was established between London and Brighton on the 1st of June 1887, and the result has been so satisfactory that it is intended to extend the system in other directions. The Parcel Post continues to be much used for the transmission of flowers, game, \&c. It is calculated that over 12,000 parcels, containing upwards of 45,000 grouse, were received in London last Autumn, and in the month of March, vegetables in considerable quantities arrived in parcels from Algiers while it was also noticed that in one week 3,787 parcels containing hats were posted in London alone. As an illustration of the use made of this service by certain firms, it may be mentioned that two firms in London each posted 70,000 parcels at one time, while a third posted 5,000 parcels. The total postage paid on these parcels amounted to $1,875 l$. In connexion with the increased facilities for the transmission of watches and jewellery by the Inland Registered Letter Post, parcels containing articles of this description are no longer insured when sent by Parcel Post, nor is compensation for their loss or damage paid.
The Foreign and Colonial Parcel Post has been extended to Beyrout, Bulgaria, Cameroons, Colombia, Costa Rica, Danish West Indies, Dutch East Indies, France, and the French Colonies and Possessions, Gambia, Gold Coast, Lagos, 1'ortugal (including Azores, and Madeira), Servia, Sierra Leone, Spain, Turkey (French and Austrian Agencies), and Parcels can now be transmitted vid

France to Italy and Switzerland as well as viA Germany, and to Turkey and Egypt in addition to the route vid Gibraltar. The maximum weight for Parcels to Canada has been raised from 3 lbs. to 4 lbs., and there is now a Parcel Post weekly, instead of fortnightly to Ceylon, Singapore, and China.

Foreign and Cnlonial Mails.

The new contract between the Post Office and the Peninsular and Oriental Steam Navigation Company for the mail service between the United Kingdom and India and China, to which I referred in my report of last yeur, came into force on the lst of February 1888. Under this contract an increased rate of speed at sea has been effected, and the total cost of the service has been reduced by 107,000 l. a year.

In the course of last year the Post Office was engaged in negotiations with French and Italian Postal Administrations with the view of obtaining a reduction in the transit rates paid to those departments for the conveyance of the mails to and from the East through France and Italy by the special accelerated train service. The result was that a sensible reduction was obtained, representing a saving of about $20,000 l$. a year, and that other not unimportant concessions were made by the French and Italian post offices.

A postal service to the Transvaal viâ Natal has been established by which specially addressed correspondence can be forwarded from the United Kingdom to the South African Republic at the lower rates of postage applicable to correspondence for Natal itself.

The Canadian Post Office having established provisionally a mail service from Montreal to Japan and China, advantage is being taken of this additional means of forwarding correspondence for those countries, pending the settlement of the question of establishing on a solid basis this important line of communication with the far East through Her Majesty's Western Dominions.

In addition to the night mail between Queenborough and Flushing, a day mail packet was provided by the Dutch Government from the 1st of June last, thus affording a further opportunity for the despatch of Mails from this Country for Holland, the North of Germany, and other parts of Europe.

The question of sending correspondence to Australia by long sea route at a cheaper rate of postage than is required for the route viâ Brindisi has occupied my attention, but the necessary arrangements with the Colonial Post Offices concerned are not yet completed.

The number of Letters, Post Cards, Book Packets, Newspapers,
neturned Letters. Parcels, \&c., received in the Returned Letter Offices was 13,436,600, being a net decrease of 785,387 . This decrease is chiefly owing, no doubt, to the fact that tine correspondence of 1886-7 was abnormally large in consequence of the general election. It is also attributable probably in part to the increase of education, which causes letter writers to exercise more care and accuracy in
addressing letters than was formerly the case. Of the total number received, 412,122 were unreturnable; 175,408 were registered or contained enclosures of value, and 25,726 were wholly unaddressed. Of these unaddressed letters, 1,553 contained money and cheques, \&c., amounting to $7,111 l$.

The careless and insecure manner in which the public send articles through the post is shown by the facts that no less than 24,7£7 articles of all sorts, including 289 coins, were received, having escaped from their wrappers or covers, and that the addresses had become detached, through insufficient fastening, from 4,578 parcels, many of which contained matter of a perishable nature, which was thus lost to the owners.

The Christmas work was heavier than usual last winter, Christmas especially at the Chief Office in London. It is estimated that Work. upwards of 41 millions of letters, parcels, \&c. over and above the uspal numbers were dealt with in London during the Christmas season. One Institution alone is known to have posted 1,350,000 circulars during December. The additional number of parcels in London is estimated at about 700,000 . In order to enable this great influx of extra matter to be dealt with, the regular staff was supplemented by 3,095 persons temporarily emploved for a few weeks; and the ordinary force of 435 Mail vehicles in London was increased by 370 vehicles. Baskets, boxes, bags, barrels, \&c. for parcels were provided to the number of over 47,500 . Notwithstanding this large addition of force and materials, the provision made was only sufficient to enable the enormous increase of work to be fairly met within proper limits of time.

The business of the Post Office Savings Bank shows a con- Post Office siderable increase. During the year ended the 31st of December Sarings Banis. 1887 the deposits numbered $6,916,327$; the amount being $16,535,932$ l., as compared with $6,562,395$ deposits, amounting to $15,696,852 l$., the year before, being an increase of 353,932 in number and $839,080 l$. in amnunt.

There were $2,496,294$ withdrawals, amounting to $14,680,279 l$., as compared, with $2,390,655$, amounting to $13,689,943 l$. in 1886 ; an increase of 105,639 in number and $990,336 l$. in amount.

The sum credited to depositors for interest was $1,244,074 l$.; an increase of $\mathbf{7 4 , 4 8 4 l}$. over the previous year.

The total amount standing to the credit of depositors at the end of the year was $53,974,065 l$., being an increase of $3,099,727 l$. over last year. This total is exclusive of the sum of $3,345,106 l$. Government Stock held by Depositors.

The number of Post Office Savings Bank Offices was increased by 369 during the year, viz., 307 in England and Wales, 42 in Scotland, and 20 in Ireland, making the total number on the 31st of December 8,720. Of these, 871 are in the London District;

183 in Manchester; 120 in Birmingham; 108 in Liverpool; and 94 in Glasgow.

The greatest number of deposits made in one day was 54,267 , on the 31st of December, on which day the largest amount was also received, viz, 152,972l.

The greatest number of withdrawals on one day was 19,971, amounting to $68,796 l$., on the 20th of December, but the largest amount withdrawn on one day was 80,864l., which was withdrawn on the 15 th of December.

The daily average number of deposits was 22,676 , and the amount $54,216 l$. ; and of withdrawals, 8,184 , amounting to 48,132l.

The average amount of each deposit was $2 l .78 .10 \mathrm{~d}$., being the same as in 1886. The average amount of each withdrawal was $5 l .17 \mathrm{~s} .7 \mathrm{~d}$., as compared with $5 l .148 .6 d$. the year before.

The number of new accounts opened during the year was 794,592 , as compared with 758,270 in 1886 ; and the accounts closed were 574,252 as compared with 562,499 .

The number of accounts remaining open at the end of the year was 3,951,761, distributed as follows :-

An Act (50 \& 51 Vict. c. 40.) was passed in September 1887 to grant further facilities in the trausaction of Savings Bank business, which will come into operation as soon as the regulations to be framed in accordance with it have been approved by Parlianient. This Act confers increased powers on the Postmaster General for making regulations respecting the transfer of moneys from one account to another, the payment of the moneys of deceased depositors under nomination, \&c., and also contains provisions for lessening the expense of obtaining certificates of births, deaths, and marriages required in connexion with Post. Office Savings Bank business, \&c., together with other provisions relating to Government Stock investments (among other things, reducing the minimum sum for investment or sale from $10 l$. to one shilling) and to life insurances and annuities.

There was a large increase in the Government Stock investment business during the year, the investments numbering

18,204, and amounting to $915,047 l$., as compared with 16,563 investments, amounting to $841,121 l$., in 1886, while the sales numbered 10,216 , and amounted to $462,785 l$., as compared with 8,918 sales, amounting to $389,965 l$. the year before; being an increase as regards investments of 1,641 in number and $73,926 l$. in amount ; and as regards sales of $1,2.98$ in number and 72,820l. in amount. The number of Stock Certificates obtained was 50 for $5,500 l$. stock, as compared with 59 certificates for $7,300 l$. in 1886.

The total amount of stock held by depositors at the close of the year was $3,345,106 l$., held by 40,270 depositors. This was an increase of 4,965 in the number of stockholders and of 448,165l. in the amount of stock, as compared with the year 1886. The average amount of stock held by each person was 83l. 18. 4d., as compared with $82 l .18 .1 d$. in 1886.

The Life Insurance and Annuity business shows a slight increase. The number of Life Insurance Contracts granted was 585 for $36,168 l$, as compared with 506 for $34,188 l$. in 1886, and the number of Immediate Annuities purchased was 912 amounting to 19,299l., as compared with 823 Annuities for $17,388 l$. in the year before. The deferred Annuities were 90 in nuinber and $1,628 l$. in amount, as compared with 87 amounting to $1,772 l$. in 1886. The Board of Trade purchased 103 Annuities for $350 l$., as empared with 105 for $357 l$. in the previous year.

The effects of the reduction of the rates of commission on Money Orders. Inland Money Orders, made on the 1st of September 1886, are becoming more apparent every year, and there was an increase of $618,968 \mathrm{l}$. in the amount of the Inland Orders last year, as compared with an increase of only $287,363 l$. the year before and a decrease of $1,561,354 l$. in the year 1885-86, while the falling off in the numbers of Orders was 209,785 only, as compared with ${ }^{2}$ falling off of 595,731 in the previous year.

The total number of Inland Orders was 9,552,777, and the total amount 22,881,676l., as compared with $9,762,562$ Orders amounting to $22,262,708 l$. in 1886-7.

[^0]In the Colonial and Foreign Money Orders the usual increase was fully maintained last year, the increase in these classes of Orders having been over 141,200 in number and over $360,000 l$. in amount.
Postal Ordere. The Postal Order business also shows a large increase; the amount transmitted by this means having been 14,696,000l., or $1,737,000 l$. more than in 1886-7. The number of Orders issued was upwards of $36,300,000$.

The amount transmitted within the United Kingdom during the year by means of Money Orders and Postal Orders taken together was upwards of $37,577,000 l$.

Telegraphs.
The total number of Telegraph Messages forwarded during the year was $53,403,425$, being an increase of $3,159,786$ over last year. The reduced rate having been in operation the whole of the year 1886-7, it is possible to compare the results for two years as regards Inland Telegraph Messages, and, excluding Railway, Press, Foreign, and Official Messages, the figures are as follows :-

New Telegraph Offices have been opened at 257 Post Offices and at 39 Railway Stations throughout the United Kingdom, making the total number of such offices 6,810 . Three additional Telephone Exchanges were opened by the Department during the year, and the number of subscribers was increased hy 92 . The total number of subscribers on the 31st of March was 1,370 , and the amount of the subscriptions was $26,417 \mathrm{l}$. It was stated in the last report that the use of copper wire had been resorted to and was likely to prove advantageous; but the further use of such wire has been prevented for the present by the abnormal rise in the price of copper.

The process of placing the wires underground wherever possible has been considerably extended, and of the 1,745 lines of wire entering the Central Station in London not one is open. In many cases the wires are conducted underground for distances of 12 to 22 miles from this Office.

The celebration of Her Majesty's Jubilee last summer caused an immense increase in telegraph work in London, amounting to nearly 60 per cent. over the ordinary average, and on the day preceding the Jubilee Ceremony no less than 30,597 local messages were transmitted through the Central Station, the total number of messages dealt with on that day in the Central Office being 124,291 .

Revenuc and Expenditure

The gross revenue for the year, including Savings Bank business, was $11,064,745 l$., arrived at thus :-

# Post Orfice Savings Bank. <br> Extracts from the Controller's Report. 

Five hundred and ninety-one Friendly Societies and 1,462 Trade Ancounts of Provident and Charitable Societies received authority last year to open Societies. ascounts with the Post Office Savings Bank. In 1886 the numbers were 646 and 1,380 respectively, a large number of Friendly Societies' accounts having been transferred from three large Trustee Savings Banks closed in that year. Accounts were opened last year on behalf Large Sucieties. of two of the largest collecting Friendly Societies in the United Kingdom, and the deposits made by these Societies, and by another which had opened an account previously, amounted to upwards of 168,000 . Among the Societies last year were 20 connected with Her Majesty's Jubilee, of which 10 were Jubilee Celebration Funds, 3 Slate Clubs, 3 Jubilee Surplus Funds, and 4 Miscellaneous Funds for purchase of clocks, street-lamps, \&c.
(28.) The number of Penny Banks continues to increase, 312 Penny Banks. having received authority last year to open accounts as against 285 in 1886 and 200 in 1885 . Of the 312 which applied last year, 145 were School Banks, 38 of them being in Board Schools. It is observed that at a meeting on the 15th December the London School Board passed a Resolution of resolution to the effect that Peuny Savings Banks be established where- London School ever practicable in the boys' and girls' departments of the schools of the Board. Board, and further that these Banks should be in connexion with the Post Office Savings Bank.
(29.) The prominence given to schemes for the encouragement of thrift entails on the Department the duty of replying to some curious and cations from oftentimes troublesome applications on the subject. As an instance, a philanthropic person interested in the welfare of the "sons of toil" desired to know pernons. in the event of one shilling a week being deposited for three years what amount of interest would accrue assuming no withdrawal to be made. The applicant was informed as to the mode of computing interest, but apparently his arithmetical powers were not equal to his philanthropy, so that, on his again applylng, the calculation was made in this Department, when it was found that if a person had deposited one shilling on the lst January 1884 and had continued to save one shilling at regular intervals of seven days up to the 28th December 1886 the sum of $7 l .17 s$. would have accumulated and interest would have accrued to the amount of 5s. $1 \frac{1}{2} d$. It subsequently appeared that the information was wanted for the purpose of ascertaining the comparative advantages of the Post Office Savings Bank and certain Loan Societies, and that the applicant considered that, on the whole, the advantage was on the side of the Post Office Sarings Bank.
(30.) In connexion with the celebration of Her Majesty's Jubilee, several benevolent persons in different parts of the country were supplied

with forms of declaration and received special assistance in opening accounts for school-children and others whom they desired to benefit. Some hundreds of accounts were opened in this manner, and the facts were in several instances noticed in the press. In one case permission was given to a schoolmaster to have the name of the school printed on the back of stamp deposit slips to be used by his ceholars, and also to have the stamps intended to be affixed to the slips perforated with the name of the school.
(31.) Every year a considerable amount of labour is expended in compelling depositors to withdraw money, for which presumably they hare no use, in order to keep their accounts within the statutory limit of 2001 . There were about 2,010 such cases last year, and only about one fourth of the depositors elected to make the required reduction by investing in Government Stock. It seems a pity, in the cause of thrift, that the provision for an extension of the limits of deposit originally contained in the Savings Banks Bill of last session should have been dropped.
(32.) There were 20,108 claims to the moneys of deceased depositors, including holders of Annuity and Insurance Contracts, the number of such claims in 1886 being 19,696. Probates of Wills or Letters of Administration were produced in 5,285 cases as compared with 5,017 in Nominations by the previous year. The number of claims by nominees, under the providepositors. sions of the Provident Nominations and Small Intestacies Act, 1883, was 373 against 316 in the previous year. 3,714 fresh nominations were registered, making the total number in force on the 31st December last 15,525.

(33.) 350 applications were made last year respecting accounts of depositors who had become insane, as compared with 316 such applications in 1886.
(34.) Two small Trustee Savings Banks were closed last year, viz., those at Barking and Wexford, by which the number of such Banks is reduced to 402, the number closed since the establishment of the Post Office Savings Bank in 1861 being 244. The amount transferred from these two Banks and from othersin process of closing was $13,754 l$. and $300 l$. stock, making with $63,(23 l$. and $2,130 l$. stock transferred from Banks by certificate, an aggregate of $\mathbf{7 6}, 777 \mathrm{l}$. and $2,430 \mathrm{l}$. stock transferred to the Post Office Sarings Bank during the year. In the previous year the total amount transferred was 209,970l. including $28,349 l$. transferred by certificate from open Bauks. The amount transferred last year from the Post Office Savings Bank to Trustee Savings Banks was $12,885 l$. and $1,02 i l$. stock, as compared with $13,606 l$. in 1886.
(38.) In reference to Post Office Savings Banks abroad, I naay mention that during last year the method of conducting the business in this department was personally investigated by Post Office Officials from Canada, the Cape of Good Hope, and Western Australia, aud by gentlemen interested in the system from Austria and Jamaica, while information on the subject was sought by the Governments of India, Victoria, and New Zealand, and by a member of Congress and a private individual in the United States of America.

[^4]1,654,400l., it may be hoped that the "small depositors" are as a class becoming more numerous, though the evidence afforded by the figures of a single year is not conclusive. At the Cape of Good Hope the business Cape of Good continues to increase, the amount due to 10,757 depositors on the 31st Hope.
December, 1886 , being $222,761 l$. as compared with 177,9301 . standing to the credit of 8,518 depositors on the corresponding date of the previous year. The sum deposited during the twelve months was 224,217 l. and that withdrawn 186,440l., the latter having been unexpectedly large, owing to the speculation in Gold Mining Companies. The practice of permitting withdrawals to be made by telegram, which was only allowed in cases of urgency, has been made general by regulation, so that the delay necessitated by reference to the Head Office for authority for repayment has been reduced to a minimum. The cost of telegraphing is borne by the depositor. With regard to the Indian Empire, in the India.
absence of the necessary returns, I cannot speak as to the business done, but I obserre from the rules that the minimum and annual limits of deposits are fixed at 4 annas and 500 ruppes respectively, and that interest is allowed at the rate of $3 \frac{3}{4}$ per cent. per annum. Provision is made for investments by depositors in Government Stock, such investments not to exceed the value of 1,000 rupees Stock in one year, and 3,000 rupees in all. Sales of Stock are likewise effected by the Bank, and the interest due on Stock held by depositors is placed to the credit of their Savings Bank accounts. In Upper Burmah, according to a Upper Barmah. statement in the Times, Postal Savings Banks have been already introduced. In respect of Australasia, I should premise that whereas both Anstralasia. Post Office and General Savings Banks are established in Now South Wales, Victoria, Tasmania, and New Zealand, only the former are in existence in Queensland and Western Australia, while in South Australia officers in charge of Post and Telegraph Offices are authorised by the Government to act as agents of the Savings Bank in Adelaide. Confining my remarks to the Post Office Savings Banks, I note that in a leaflet sent to me from Melbourne it is stated that on the 30th June 1887 the depositors in New South Wales numbered 60,580, with $\pi$ balance to their credit of $1,369,527 l$. in Victoria 80,125 with $1,27+, 380 l$. in Tasmania 2,289 with 42,912l., and in Western Australia 2,176 with $\mathbf{2 8 , 1 9 8 l}$. In Queensland the sum standing to the credit of 37,559 accounts was $1,337,9650$. on the 31st December 1886, and in New Zealand on the same date, the aggregate amount in 74,871 accounts was $1,61 \overline{0}, 979 l$. These figures, compared with those for the previcus year, indicate, as a rule, an increase in the number of accounts and $n$ slight falling off in the amount due, the effect probably of the depression in trade which has visited the Colonies.
(40.) In France the number of Post Offices authorised to transact France. Savings Bank business was 6,649 on the 31st December, 1886, when the amount due to 845,053 depositors was $7,626,961 l$., being an increase during the year of $1,460,739$ l. The investments by depositors in Government Stock were 3,196 in number and $157,351 l$. in amount. Fifty-one investments were made by the administration owing to the depositors having failed to reduce the balance to their credit below the limit allowed to be deposited. The new accounts, numbering 239,377, opened in the 12 months werc classified under nine heads according to the descriptions or occupations of the depositors, and the result showed that, excluding children, the leisured classes (propriétaires, rentiers, et personnes sans professions) outnumbered any other class, the next most numerous being industrial operatives (ouvriers d'industrie). The publication of the report on the Post Office Savings Banks in Italy for 1886 Italy.
was delayed owing to the occurrence in that year of the second quinquennial division of profits, in which $1,152,267$ accounts participated, the amount divided being $1,233,224$ lire $(47,328 l$.). Reference is made in the report to the magnitude of the work, the opinion being expressed that with the continued growth of the institution the difficulty of the quinquennial division will be well-nigh insurmountable, unless steps be taken to distribute the work over the whole period, and even then it must always be a colossal undertaking (un lavoro colossale). The business during 1886 is described as having been sufficiently satisfactory, the number of deposits, $1,877,223$ (including 363,056 by means of stamps), and the amount deposited, $6,536,7241$. , showing an increase of 133,114 and 830,4961 . as compared with the previous year ; while the withdrawals which numbered 986,123 and amounted to $5,139,198 l$. showed un increase of 102,453 and 352,653 l. The total amount duc to $1,391,343$ depositors on the 31st December 1886 was $8,793,6481$. the increase of $1,717,281 l$. during the year being greater than in any previous year and largely abore the average rate of progress. Owing to the high price of Government Stock there was a sensible diminution in investments, which numbered only 3,947 , amounting to $149,932 l$., as compared with 4,918 amounting to $186,336 l$. in 1885 . It is observed that Post Office Savings Banks have been established at Assab and Massowah. The experiment of authorising the Post Office Official in any village in Jtaly unprovided with a Post Office Savings Bank to accept deposits to an amount not exceeding $2 l$. per diem, to which I alluded last year, has brought in 45,162 deposits, amounting to 19,4321. while 4,294 withdrawals of the aggregate amount of $2,986 l$. have been been made through the same agency. In the latter part of the year Naval Savings Banks were initiated and 135 deposits, amounting to $683 l$. were made therein. Under the arrangement by which lottery prizes can be placed to the credit of accounts in the Post Office Savings Bank there Austria. Were 680 deposits of the aggregale amount of $3,816 l$. In the Austrian Post Office Savings Banks, putting aside the branch of business connected with deposits on " running account" which are withdrawable by cheque, the number of accounts remaining open at the end of 1887 was 597,708 and the total amount due $1,240,8831$., being an increase of Post Office Savings Banks during the first 11 months of their existence. Business was begun on the 1st February 1886, and by the 31st December 2,000 offices had been opened, 472,028 deposits, amounting to 267,709l., and 67,036 withdrawals, amounting to $125,753 l$., had been made, and the balance due to 85,517 depositors was $141,956 l$. It will thus be seen that the average amount of each deposit was $11 s .4 d$. and of each withdrawal $37 \mathrm{~s} .6 \boldsymbol{d}$., while the average amount to the credit of each account was $11.13 s .2 d$. These figures reem to indicate that the institution is largely used by comparatively poor persons, and the fact that no less than 341,321 of the deposits were made by means of stamps affixed to forms may perhaps point to there being a large proportion of the young among the depositors. Facilities exist for the the purchase of Government Stock on behalf of depositors, and during the period under review the sums so employed amounted to over 25,0001. In Belgium the announcement that interest on balances exceeding 200l. would be reduced from 3 to 2 per cent. after the close of the year 1886 had the effect of decreasing the amount deposited during the latter half of that year. The deposits by individuals, as distinguished from the funds of Corporations and public bodies, which are also deposited in the Banks, amounted to $4,443,829 l$. and the withdrawals to $3,645,874 l$. The sum standing to the credit of $481,071 l$. accounts on the 31st December 1886
was $8,214,244 l$. The investments by depositors in Giovernment Stock numbered 3,900 and the sales 1,426 , the nominal value of Stock purchased being 489,3321 . and of that sold $193,456 l$. At the end of the year there were 7,310 existing investments inscribed in the books of the Bank representing a capital of $1,511,177 l$. The Dutch Post Offiee Savings Netherlands. Banks continue to show the gradual developineut which has characterised them in the past, the number of depositors 139,989 and the amount due to them 738,803 l. on the 31st December 1886 markiug an increage in the year of 27,681 and $208,135 l$. respectively. The average amount of each deposit was 11.11 s . and of each withdrawal 4l. It is stated in the Report that in 51 cases advantage was taken of the facilities afforded to depositors for obtaining repayment by telegram, and that it is intended to establish, as the French have done, a Fost Office Savings Bank on each ship of the Navy. In the Swedish Banks at the close Sweden. of 1886 there were 134,769 accounts with a sum due therein amounting to $117,838 l$., being an average balance per account of 17 s .5 d . The transactions during the year consisted of 203,987 deposits, amounting to $83,804 l$., and of 33,540 withdrawals, amounting to $50,165 \%$.

In Canada, there were on the 30th June, 1887, the close of the fiscal year, 90,159 depositors with $3,899,550 l$. to their credit, being an increase of 9,289 depositors and 467,676 l. during the year. It is remarked in the report that, as the number of deposits, 143,076, increased in greater proportion than the amount deposited,
