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# FORTY-FIFTH ANNUAL REPORT. 

## TO THE RIGHT HONOURABLE THE LORDS COMMISSIONERS OF HER MAJESTY'S TREASURY.

## My Lords,

I HAVE the honour to submit to your Lordships the Forty-fifth Annual Report of the Postmaster-General, being an account of the business of the Department for the year ended the 31st of March 1899.

It is estimated that the number of postal packets delivered in Appendix A., the United Kingdoin during the year was as follows:rp. 21 to 25.

The number of letters registered in the United Kingdom was $15,240,669$, an increase of $7 \cdot 2$ per cent. over the number in the previous year.

It will be observed that the highest percentage of increase is Letters. in the case of letters, which show an advance of $8 \cdot 6$ per cent. over the total for the previous yeur, which in its turn was 6.3 per cent. higher than the total for 1896-97.

London received no less than 28 jer cent. of the total number of letters, but the increase during the year was greater in the provinces than in London, London showing an increase of $4 \cdot 5$ per cent. on the previous year, while the increase in England and Wales (excluding London) was $10 \cdot 8$, in Scotland $7 \cdot 4$, and
in Ireland 10.3 per cent. The stimulus given to correspondence by the reduction of rates of postage and by the extension of the deliveries in rural districts has no doubt contributed to this considerable increase.

Post Cards. Post cards have increased in number by 6 per cent. on the year. The rapid growth of correspondence by post card is indicated by the fact that the total given above is more than double the total recorded 12 years ago.

Newspapers.
The number of newspapers shows an advance of some three millions on the total given in my last report. The returns from the different parts of the Kingdom vary somewhat, it being estimated that the number of newspapers delivered in London decreased 3.4 per cent., while the number delivered in the rural districts of all parts of the United Kingdom increased. In Ireland the increase was nearly 10 per cent.
Book Packets. Two causes have combined to cause a decrease in the number of book packets delivered. The book post has been limited during the whole of the year to packets not exceeding 2 oz . in weight, and there have been fewer "heavy postings" of prospectuses and circulars at the Chief Office.
Parcels. The total number of parcels delivered during the year, viz, $71,913,000$, was 6 per cent. higher than the number for the previous year, and more than double the number delivered 12 years agn. The average postage on Inland parcels fell just short of $5 d$. Of the total number $61,777,000$ were rail-borne, and $10,136,000$ road-borne. The railway companies received 705,732l. as their share ( 55 per cent.) of the postage on the rail-borne parcels; the postage retained by the Post Office amounted to $792,367 \mathrm{l}$. Inland parcels, to the number of 761,801 , were registered during the year. Details of the Parcel Post with places abroad will be found under the head of "Foreign and Colonial Mails" on a later page of this report.

## The Express Delivery Service.

The number of Express Services reached a total of 641,227, an increase of 16 per cent. on the total of the year 1897-98. 684,500 articles were delivered by Express Messengers in London, including 282,420 ordinary letters delivered by special messenger in advance of the postman.

On the 1st October last the regulations of the Express Service were made more favourable to the public in several respects. The weight charge on packets above 1 lb . in weight conveyed by special messenger all the way was reduced from $1 \frac{1}{2}$ d. to $1 d$. for every lb . beyond the first lb ., with a maximum payment of 18 ., and the limit of weight was raised from 15 lbs. to 20 lbs. in cases where the messenger can travel by a public conveyance. The fixed charge of $2 d$. for each article beyond one, when several packets are tendered by the same sender for
delivery by the same messenger at different addresses, or to different persons at the same address, was at the same time reduced to $1 d$.
Another change made in the service during the year has been the introduction of a delivery of express letters in London on Sunday. While far from desiring to increase Sunday labour or to disturb the arrangement under which there is no delivery of letters by postmen in London on that day, I thought it right to place the Express Service at the disposal of the public for exceptional cases, and thus remedy the inconvenience caused in cases of emergency or illness by the inability of persons in the country to procure the delivery of letters to their friends in London on Sunday morning. The new service was introduced on the 12th February last, and while it is found to add very slightly to Sunday work it is undoubtedly a boon in cases of special need.

The International Express Service was extended during the year to France, Algeria, and Corsica for parcels, and to British Guiana and to St. Lucia for both letters and parcels.

## Undelivered Postal Packets.

The numbers of undelivered packets dealt with in the year Appendix $G$., were as follows:-

The number of letters which could neither be delivered at the place of their address nor be returned to their senders was 665,274 , or $7 \cdot 77$ per cent. of the total number of letters dealt with in the Returned Letter Offices.
The total value of property in letters opened in the Returned Letter Offices was $720,610 l$.
As many as 44,360 letters were posted without address during the year, and 2,421 of these contained property to the value of 7,076l, one letter having in it an uncrossed cheque for 5000. payable to bearer. Other articles posted without address were 9,225 post cards, 102,820 book packets, and 130,635 newspapers. The number of parcels found in the post without address was 14,066.

## Changes in Regulations.

Certain changes which have been made in the regulations during the year are noticed in other parts of this report, under the head of the service affected.

One change affecting the whole inland post may be mentioned here. On the lst May 1898 the limit of compensation payable in the case of the loss of an inland registered postal packet was raised from 50l. to $120 l$., and the fees were modified so that, after the limit of $10 l$. is passed, each additional penny of fee secures the right to $10 l$. additional compensation, instead of $5 l$. as before. The old and new scales are given in full :-

On the 1st August an alteration in the London and Dublin Day Mail Service was carried out in order to improve the passenger facilities. The departure from Londnn now takes place at 8.30 a.m., instead of $7.15 \mathrm{a} . \mathrm{m}$., but as the train has been accelerated by 30 minutes and the packet by 15 minutes, the arrival of the Mail in Dublin is only 30 minutes later than before. In the other direction the despatch from Dublin is 45 minutes later, but by accelerating the packet and the train, the former hour of arrival in London- 5.45 p.m.-has been maintained.

Night Mail trains in each direction between Yeovil and Eastleigh were established on the 1st September, with considerable advantage to the Mail Service of the district.

On the 1st November the Highland Railway Company opened their new line from Aviemore to Inverness, with the result of accelerating, by 45 minutes or more, the arrival of the South Mails at Inverness and places in the far north, and postponing to a like extent the time of despatch of the return Mails. The Orkney Islands, as well as Skye and Lewis, shared in this improvement.

## Rural Posts.

In my last report I stated that considerable progress had been made towards fulfilling the pronise made by the Government in 1897 to give a regular delivery of letters to every house in the United Kingdom. During the past year the work of extending the posts has been continued as rapidly as possible, and in England and Wales few houses now remain unserved. The same cannot yet be said of Scotland and Ireland, but district after district is being visited by my surveying Staff, and there is a good prospect of the work being completed thruughout the United Kingdom early next year. The letters brought into the official delivery between 22nd June 1897 and 31st March last are estimated to number almost, $40,000,000$ a yenr.

## Motor Vans for Conveyina Mails.

I have not ceased to give attention to the question of employing Motor Vans for the conveyance of Mails both in London and the country, but some of the experiments made during the past year have, from various causes, proved unsuccessful, and I cannot yet report the establishment of any permanent motor services.

## Private Posting Boxes.

In order to afford greater facilities for posting letters in London, I introduced experimentally in February last revised arrangements for collections of letters from boxes on private premises. The change had led to a considerable number of applications for such a service before the end of the financial year.

## Universal Postal Union.

The changes in the Postal Union Regulations effected by the Charges on Cungress of Washington came into operation on the lst of unpaid correJanuary last ; and, in connection with them, a simplification of $\begin{gathered}\text { spondence from } \\ \text { places abroad. }\end{gathered}$ the system of charging insufficiently paid and unpaid correspondence from places abroad was introduced, the charges being in many cases substantially reduced.

Insurance of letters sent abroad.

While there have been for some years arrangements for the insurance of inland letters and parcels and of parcels for many places abroad, it has not been possible until the present year for a person sending a letter abroad to insure it with the Post Office. Such a letter could be registered, but in the case of its loss not more than 50 francs compensation was payable, while no compensation at all was payable for damage to such a letter or for the abstraction of its contents in the post. The scheme under which insured letters were exchanged between many countries of the Postal Union was not in all respects suitable for adoption in this country. At the last Congress of the Postal Union, however, the British delegates obtained the introduction into the Postal Union Insurance Agreement of certain provisions designed to meet the requirements of my Department; and it thus became possible to give in the adhesion of this country to the revised Agreement which came into operation on the 1st of January.

## Penny Postage within the Empire.

As an outcome of proposals addressed by my Department to Penny Postage the Postal Administrations of the various British Colonies and on land. Dependencies for a twopenny rate of letter postage within the Empire, and of the preference of the Canadian Government for a three-halfpenny rate, a Conference of representatives of the Imperial Government and India and the Colonies met in London in June and July, 1898, to consider the question. The result was the establisbment (in most cases on Christmas Day 1898, in the rest shortly afterwards) of a uniform rate of one penny the half ounce on letters passing between the mother country and British India, Canada, Natal, Newfoundland, the Crown Colonies, and British Protectorates, or between those possessions themselves. Australasia and the Cape Colony are the only important parts of the Empire which have not yet adhered to the penny postage scheme.

The scheme has also been extended to the letters of the at Sea. officers and crews of Her Majesty's ships abroad, as well as to those of passengers on British Merchant ships, when addressed to any of the places embraced in the penny postage scheme, and posted in the waters of any of those places or on the high sea. At the same time the extra charge to which the letters of soldiers and seamen, enjoying the old statutory privilege of penny postage, were liable when they had to pass through a foreign country, has been abolished.

## Foreign and Colonial Mails,

The conditions of most of the packet services have been Packet revised, or are under revision, with a view to greater economy Services. as well as greater efficiency. The contracts for the service to New York terminated on the 31st of July 1899, and uegotia tions are in progress with the companies now performing the service for its renewal on fresh terms. The Cape Mail contracts will come to an end in September 1900. Tenders have been
invited by the Cape Government, and endeavours are being made to obtain an improved service. With the companies performing the service to the West Coast of Africa advantageous arrangements have been made, by wbich the correspondence, notwithstanding the increase resulting from penny postage, will be carried at a reduced cost. Notice has also been given to the Royal Mail Steam Packet Company for the termination of the West Indies Mail Contract in June 1900.

Dutcb Mails. The diversion of the Mails from this country for the chief cities of the Netherlands from the Dutch Service, vid Flushing, to the British Service, vid Harwich and the Hook of Holland, came into effect on the lst of May 1898.

Difficulties in the landing and embarkation of Mails at Dover, connected with the harbour alterations, have been met, as far as possible, by urrangements with the companies performing the service for the despatch of the French Mails by the route of Folkestone and Calais or Folkestone and Boulogne when need arises. Negotiations for still further improving this service are now in progress with the French Post Office.

The Foreign and Colonial Parcel Post has been extended to Russia, Formosa, the Banks and Santa Cruz Islands, the Comoro Islands, Kiachow in China, Nigeria, Gurtemala, and Bolivia.

The insurance system has been extended to the Parcel Post with Algeria, Corsica, New Zenland, Russia, Sierra Leone, and Tunis. In the service with a considerable number of Foreign countries and British Colonies the limit up to which parcels can be insured has been raised from 50l. to $120 l$.

The system under which the senders of parcels can take upon themselves the payment of the Customs duty levied in the country of destination, has been extended to the service with France and French Possessions, Sweden, and the Leeward Islands.

An important step has been taken towards simplifying and making uniform the postage on parcels exchanged between the United Kingdom and other parts of the Empire. I took the opportunity of the meetings held by the Imperial Postal Conference to bring forward a scheme for adopting, whenever possible, a scale of -

The simplicity of the scale and the reduction in the postage on heavy parcels which it involves seem likely to give a great impetus to the Parcel Post with the Colonies.

The total number of parcels sent to and received from places Parcels to and abroad during the year was $2,243,865$, an increase of about from places 8 per cent. on the number in the previous year. The parcels received from abroad increased in a considerably larger ratio than thuse sent abroad, owing chiefly to the fact that a very large growth took place in the number received from France, Germany, and Italy. Other large increases were in the service with British East Africa, Canada, Hong Kong, India and South Africa. On the other hand, there was a falling off in the number of parcels sent to Colombia, Spain, and the West Indies. According to the Board of Trade Returns the value of the goods exported and imported by Parcel Post during the last two years was as follows:-

Ordinary Inland Orders show an increase over the previous year of 2.9 per cent. in number, and 4.4 per cent. in amount.

The rapid growth of Telegraph Money Order business noted in last year's report has continued, the figures for 1898-99 being 25 per cent. in advance of those for 1897-98. The rate of increase has been accelerated during the year by the additional facilities introduced on the 1st October last. The sender of a Telegraph Money Order may now have a private message added to the official telegram of advice and delivered to the payee with the Order; he may also prepay a reply to his message; and he is no longer compelled to pay an additional half rate for the repetition of the telegram of advice.

The average amount of ordinary Money Orders was $2 l .16 s .7 d$. , and of Telegraph Money Orders 3l. 8s. 1d.

There has been again an increase in the number and amount of Foreign and Colonial Money Orders, as shown in detail in the Appendix.

During the year a more satisfactory service for the interctange of Money Orders with Portugal has been established, and the Money Order system has been extended to certain places in Korea.

The exchange of Telegraph Money Orders with Germany commenced on the 1st November last, and, during the five remaining months of the financial year, 937 such orders were transmitted to or from Germany. It is evident that the system supplies a public want, and negotiations are in progress for an exchange of Telegraph Money Orders with other countries of Europe.

The number of additional offices opened for Money Order (and Savings Bank) business during the year was 360 .

It has been found possible to arrange for the employment of women upon some of the duties of the Money Order Office, which are similar in character to those performed by women in other departments. Up to the 31st March last 57 women clerks and 30 women sorters had been placed on duty, but ultimately the female establishment will consist of 93 of the former and 40 of the latter. The change has been carried out with satisfactory results.

## Postal Orders.

The number of Postal Orders issued during the year has been Appendix L ., $76,755,217$, representing $27,217,436 l$., the number under each page 70. denomination varying from $10,886,906$ orders for 58. , down to $2,150,371$ orders for $48.6 d$. The total figures show an increase of 7.52 per cent. in number, and 4.62 per cent. in amount, on those for the previous year. The largest increase has taken place in the number of 18 . Postal Orders ( 22.48 per cent.), and the smallest increase in the number of 158 . Postal Orders ( $2 \cdot 97$ per cent.).

The value of the stamps affixed to Postal Orders by the holders during the year was $159,050 l$. 68. 10 d .

## Post Office Savingas Bank.

During the year ended 31st December 1898, 13,757,244 de- Appendix J., posits were made, amounting to $37,361,838 l$. ; the withdrawals pp .58 to 60 . during the same period being $4,957,895$ in number and 32,952,829l. in amount. In every respect, the Savings Bank business of the year was larger than that of any previous year, and at the end of the year a sum of no less than 123,144,099l. was in hand, belonging to $7,630,502$ depositors. On the 31st January 1898, the day's deposits for the first time exceeded 100,000 in number; and on the 31st December the amount deposited, viz., 347,745l., exceeded the record of any previous day in the Bank's history.

The following table shows the distribution of the accounts as regards England and Wales, Scotland, and Ireland, as well as
the average amount to the credit of each depositor, and the proportion of depositors to population :-


The number of withdrawals by telegraph was larger than in any previous year since the arrangement came into operation in December 1893. There were 141,783 such withdrawals on the day of application, the telegraph being used to advise payment as well as to give notice of withdrawal ; and 10,563 on the following day, the telegraph being used only to give notice of withdrawal. The cost to the depositor was about $18.3 d$. in the former cases and $9 d$. in the latter.

Excluding expenditure on land and buildings, the cost of management during 1898 was 449,239 l., an increase of $11,197 l$. on the cost during 1897; but the cost per transaction was lower, being $5 \cdot 8 d$. in 1898, as against $5 \cdot 9: l$. in 1897, and the rate per cent. of expenses to capital 7s. $3 \frac{1}{2}$ d. agninst $7 \mathrm{~s} .6 \frac{3}{4} d$.

For the third year in succession the balance sheet of the Post Office Savings Bank shows a deficit, the exact sum for 1898 being 7,019l.

Facility for using any Savings Bank Office.

Accounts of Societies, \&o.

On the 31st March last the number of post offices open for Savings Bank business was 12,660 , and it is une of the chief advantages of the system that depositors can use any of these offices for the purpose of making deposits or of withdrawing money from his account. These facilities are appreciated more and more each year, and during the year 1898, 36.5 per cent. of the transactions took place at offices other than those at which the accounts had been opened.

The number of new accounts opened for friendly societies during 1898 was 441, and for charitable, provident and trade societies 2,169. 313 penny banks received authority during the year to deposit their funds in the Post Office Savings Bank, and the stamp deposit system in schools was carried out as usual.

Deferred pay of soldiers leaving the Army was received to the amount of $361,38: \%$ l., in 18,677 deposits ; but, whereas in ordinary accounts 70 per cent. of the money deposited remains at the end of a year, the proportion of deferred p.y which the soldiers allow to remain for a year is about 3 per cent.

Increasing use is made by soldiers stationed abroad of the arrangements carried out through the War Office for depositing
money in the Post Office Savings Bank. The amount so received in 1898 was $10,913 l$., in 8,305 deposits.

The investments of depositors in Government Stock were Stock Invest20,162 , amounting to $1,183,029 l$., and the sales 12,567 , amount- ment business. ing to $714,285 l$. At the end of the year the total amonnt of stock was $7,462,134 l$., and the number of stockbolders 72,071 . Of the 20,162 investments, 5,137 were made in Local Loans Stock.

The Immediats Annuities granted during 1898 numbered 2,065 Annuities and and amounted to 55,753l. 164 Deferred Innuities were granted, Life Insarance. amounting to $3,626 l$. As regards Life Insurance, 731 contracts were granted in 1898 , insuring $42,554 l$. On the whole these figures show a decrease on those for the year 1897.

In my last Report I announced the decision to remove the Removal of Central Savings Bank from Queen Victoria Street to a site chosen at West Kensington. The plans of the large building to Central Office
from City to be erected there have now been approved and the work of erection has been begun. On the 24th June last the foundation stone was laid by His Royal Highness the Prince of Wales on behalf of the Queen.

## Telegrapes and Telephones.

The number of telegrams of all descriptions forwarded during Appendix H., the year was $87,043,652$, an increase over the previous year of pp .50 and 51 . $4,013,653$, or 4.83 per cent.

The following table shows the number and value of the various classes of telegram which make up the total, together with the corresponding figures for the previous year:-

It will be observed that the ordinary inland telegrams, which increased in 1897-98 by as many as $3,248,969$ over the previous year, show an equally large advance in 1898-99 over the total of 1897-98. The average value of the telegrams slightly declined, from $7 \cdot 43 \mathrm{~d}$. to $7 \cdot 38 \mathrm{~d}$.

Inland Press telegrams increased in number less rapidly than ordinary telegrams, but their length is indicated by the fact that the average weekly number of words so sent was 14,400,900,

On the occasion of the final match at the Crystal Palace fur the Football Association Cup, 3,509 Press te'egrams were despatched, containing nearly 42,000 words.

The number of Foreign Telegrams cicalt with during the year was the highest on record, and exceeded by 7.59 per cent. the previous year's total.

The concessions made in 1897 in regard to the delivery of telegrams and guarantees for new 'l'elegraph Offices have contributed in no small degree $t$, the general increase of traffic. They have also involved considerable loss, the revenue from porterage alone being $74,000 l$. less in the year than would have been received under the former arrangements. The number of Telegraph Offices opened under guarantee rose from 294 in the previous year to 279 in the year under review, 88 of the number being established at the instance of Parish and Rural District Councils.

Altogether 333 new Telegraph Offices were opened during the year, and the total number of Telegraph Offices in the United Kingdom on the 31 st March last was 10,816 , of which 2,320 were at railway stations.

12,764 miles of additional wire were brought into use during the year, and 6,000 miles of wire in the underground line in course of construction between London and Birmingham are ready to be brought into use.

In June last a new Telegraph Cable was laid between England and Ireland, from Nevin iu North Wales to Newcastle in County Wicklow. It contains four conductors and is the firs! submarine Cable constructerl on the air-space plan.

Coast communications.

The communication between Coastguard and Lifeboat Stations around the coast for life-saving purposes has been further extended during the year. Alarm bel!s were fixed at various Post Offices for facilitating night cails, and about 43 new stations were added to the system.

On the recommendation of the Royal Commission on Electric Communication with Lighthouses, \&c., 10 additional shore lighthouses were conneciel with the postal telegraphic system, and at several of these arrangements have been made by the Board of Trade for the exhibition of storm-warning signals on receipt of storm-warning telegrams from the Meteorological Office.

Two cutlying lighthonses were also electrically connected with the mainland, but further development of arrangements for telegraphic communication with light vessels has been deferred, pending the question of the adoption of an aetheric system of telegraphy.
Telephones. The numbrr of Post Offices open for Trunk Telephone business on the 31st March last was 286, an increase of 22 in the year.

Uut of the sum of $2,300,000)$. authorised by Parliament for the purchase and develupment of the trunk system, the expenditure up to the 31 st March 1899 may be put down approximately at $1,354,241 l$. The expenditure during the year was $153,237 l$.

During the year the trunk system was extended to-

In the case of the towns marked with an asterisk the extension has been carried out under guarantee from the National Telephone Company.

The total number of trunk wire transactions during the year was $7,066,069$, or, reckoning each transaction as involving at least two spoken messages, a total number of $14,132,138$ messages (an increase of 19.7 per cent. over the preceding year). The revenue was $167,505 l$. (an increase of 25 per cent.), and the average value of each transaction was $5 \cdot 681$, as against $5 \cdot 45 d$. for the previous year.
Post Office Telephone Exchanges were opened during the year at the followitig places, viz.: Cowbridge, Ferndale, Porth, Tonyrefail and Treherbert, each Exchange being placed in connection with the Trunk System.

The reduction in the charges for Post Office Telephone Appendix N., Exchange wires and for short lines of private wire, which was pase 72. made in October 1897, has continued to lead to an increased demand for these facilities, the revenue for the year from this source keing 142,600l. against $130,100 l$ in the previous year.

## Post Offices and Letter Bones.

The total number of Post Offices open on the 31st March last was 21,569 , made up as follows:-

The number of letter boxes was increased during the year by 1,138 to a total of 31,441 .

## Uniform.

During the last few years special attention has been given to the question of the uniform supplied to postmen and other classes of the Staff.

As many as 67,000 officers are supplied with uniform, and I am glad to be able to report that the arrangements recently completed for its manufacture and distribution ensure the prompt supply of well-fitting garments to all the officers concerned.

## Staff.

Appendix F., page 43.

The staff of the Post Office has increased during the year by 9,832 from 15()$, 110$ to 159,942 persons, of whom 127,779 are mules and 32,163 females.

The general growth of work has made necessary an addition during the year of 3,000 persons to the Established Staff, but the addition to the number of persons holding unestablished positions has been more than 6,000 , most of whom are employed, for a few hours a day only, in the delivery of letters in rural districts.

Of the 159,942 persons $\in$ mployed on the 31st March last, 67,832 (59,707 men and 8,125 women) were established officers holding Civil Service Certificates ; 20,268 were Postmasters and Postmistresses appointed by me, but not holding Civil Service Celtificates; and the remaining 71,842 were persons filling unestablished situations.
$\therefore$ The number of Postmen, \&c., holding good conduct stripes Good conduct on the 31st March last was 19,511, an increase of 2,229 on the stripes. number at the end of the previous year. The stripes awarded during the year numbered 6,767 , each stripe carrying $1 s$. a week extra pay and representing five years' unblemished service.

The usual tables follow, showing the percentage of wages and Percentage of salaries to Revenue and Expenditure.



## Health of the Staff.

The health of the StaT generally has continued to be satisfactory. Medical officers to the number of 578 are employed
by my Department in London and at Head Post Offices where the Staff employed is sufficiently large to warrant such an appointment. The total Staff in London and at thess head offices numbered, in 1898, 73,487 mon ( 50,950 established officers and 22,537 unestablisted) and 8,685 women ( 7,049 established officers and 1,636 unestablished).

The details given on this and the following page, and in the second and third tables of Appendix F., relate solely to these 82,172 officers, of whom ail whose salaries do not exceed 150l. a year receive free medical attendance. The sick absence of this Staff was less in 1898 than in 1897, being 6 days per head among the men and 88 days per head anong the women, as compared with 7.6 days and 11.3 days respectively in the previous year.

The percentage of sick absentees to the total force, the average sick absence per sick officer, and the average absence per officer employed are shown for the different parts of the kingdom in the subjoined table:-

In Appendix F.full statements are given of the diszases which led to death or retirement during the year among the staff of 82,172 officers. They show a total of 260 deaths, and of 539 retirements on account of ill health. It will he seen that influenza was responsible for 14 deaths and 7 retirements, and phthisis (including hæmoptysis and tuberculosis) for 64 deaths and 89 retiremente. In 1897, 10 deaths and 6 retirements were directly due to influenza, and 70 deaths and 85 retirements to phthisis.

In addition to the statements already given I furmish tables of deaths and retirements which took place during last year among the established staff, that is, the 67,832 otticers throughout the country who hold Civil Service Certificates.

The number of women who retired on marriage during 1898 was 199, with an average age of 27 , and an average service of between 9 and 10 years.
The number of candidates medically examined for Post Office appointments was 7,120 , of whom 472 were rejected.

## Finance.

Appendices $\mathbf{P}$. and Q., Pp. 75 and 76.

The postal revenue of the year, including the value of services rendered to other Departments, has been 13, 049,317 l., an increase of $628,941 l$. on that of the previous year. The postal expenditure has been $9,194,437 l$., an increase of $511,120 l$. on that of theprevious year.

The telegraph revenue of the year, 3,260,145l., shows an: increase of $188,422 l$., and the telegraph expenditure $3,477,949 l$., an increase of $99,108 l$. upon the previous year.

Setting expenditure against revenue, the combined accounts show a profit of $3,637,076 l$. on the year, or if allowance be made for interest on the capital - $10,868,6631$. -- created for the purchase of the telegraphs, a profit of $3,338,188 l$.

These figures are, necessarily, partly estimated.

I cannot conclude this report without referring to the loss which the Department has sustained by the retirement on pension of Sir Spencer Walpole, K.C.B., who was Secretary to the Post Office from 1893 to the present year, and of Mr. W. H. Preece, C.B., Engineer-in-Chief and Electrician from 1892. Since Mr. Preece's retirement, Her Majesty has been pleased to confer upon him the honour of a Knight Commandership of the Bath, in recognition of his eminent services to the State.
