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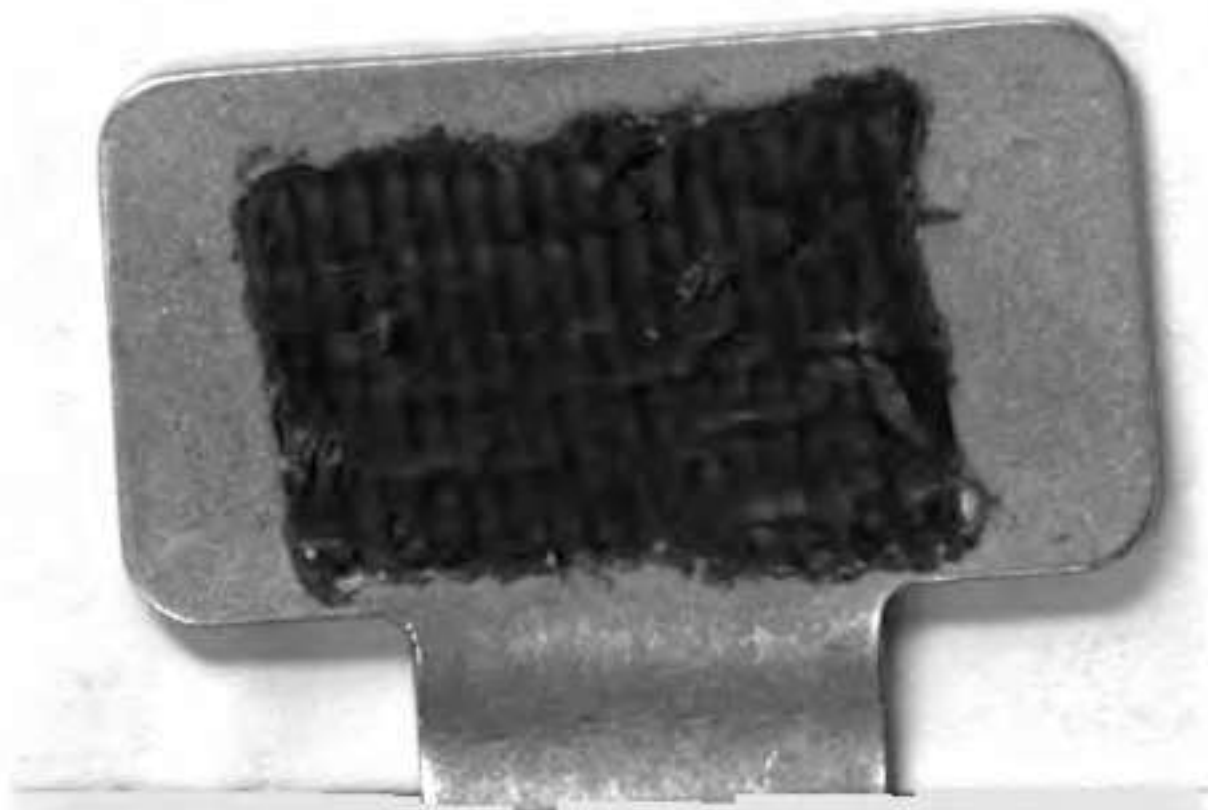
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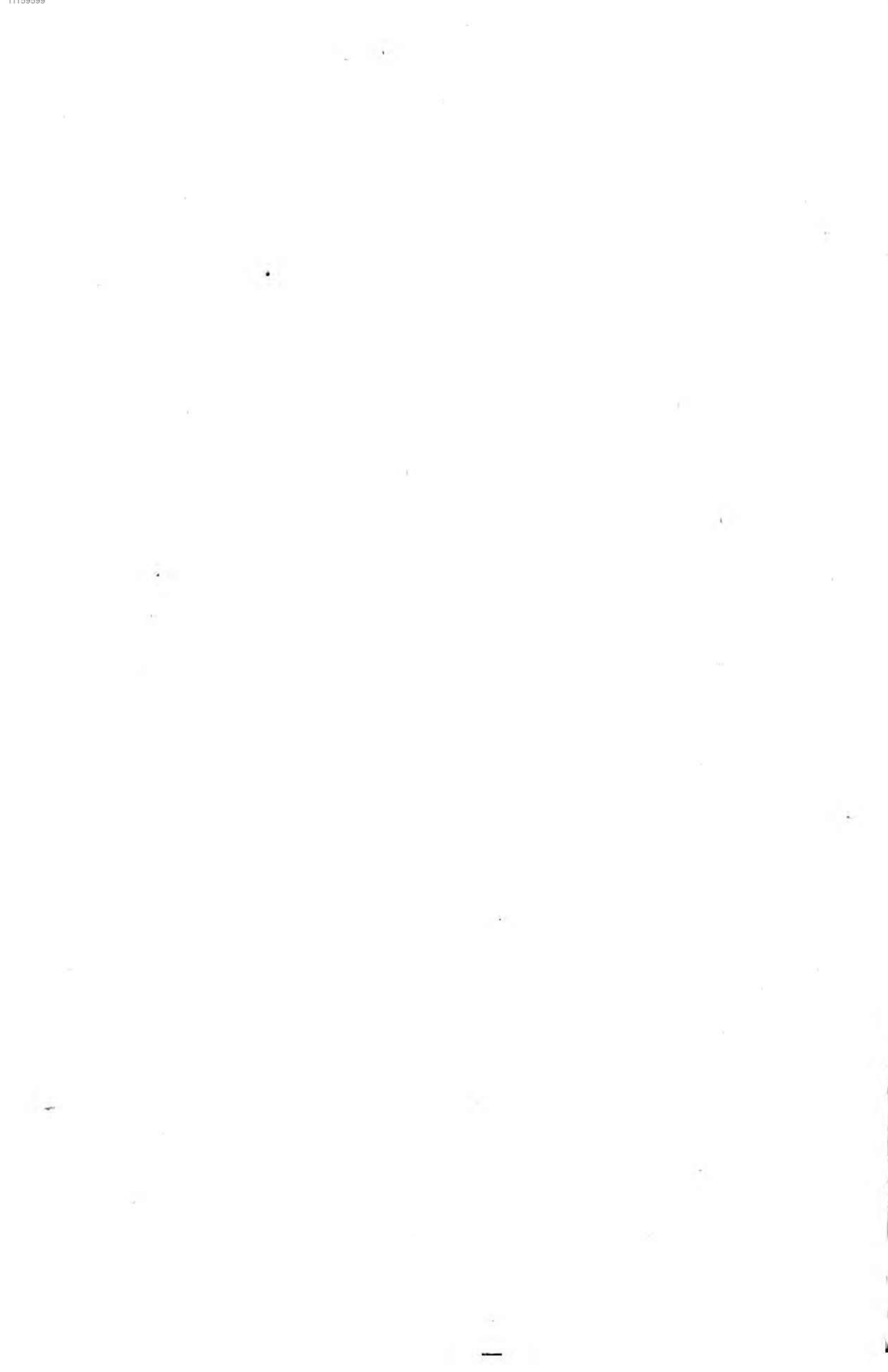

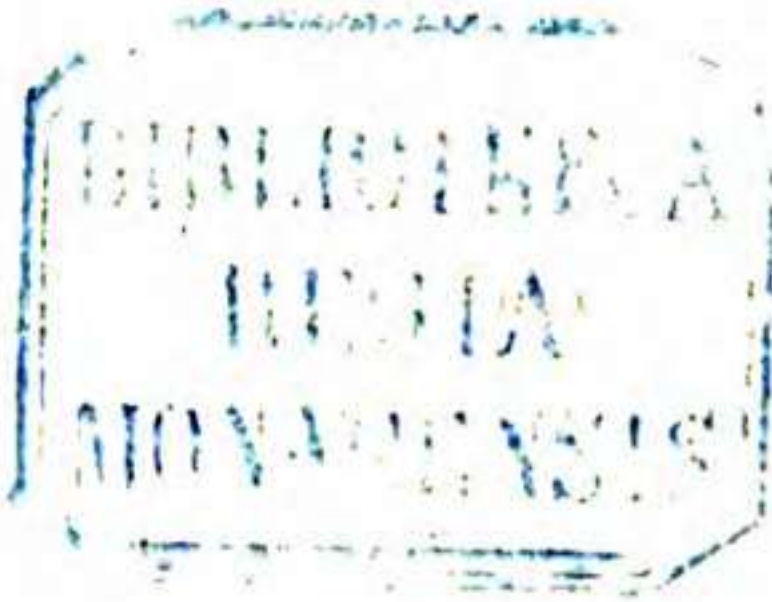

## PRINCIPAL ALTERATIONS, &c. DURING THE QUARTER.\*

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The following alterations have taken place since the issue of the last number of the "BRITISH POSTAL GUIDE," dated 1st January 1873:—

*Africa.*—The mail packet service to the West Coast of Africa by the steam vessels leaving Liverpool on the 6th, 12th, 18th, and 30th of each month has been resumed.

*Iceland and the Farøe Islands.*—The postage of a letter addressed to Iceland or the Farøe Islands, and forwarded by Danish Mail Packet, has been reduced from 4d. to 3d. per  $\frac{1}{2}$  oz.

*Malta.*—The mail for Malta viâ Italy is now only forwarded on Tuesday morning, with a supplementary mail the same evening, instead of on the evenings of Wednesday and Friday.

*New Zealand.*—The mail service to New Zealand viâ San Francisco has been discontinued. The correspondence will therefore be sent wholly viâ Suez.

*Sweden.*—The Swedish Mail Packets between Hull and Gottenburg have recommenced their voyages for the season.

*St. Helena.*—The date of despatch of the mail for St. Helena has been altered from the 5th to the 15th of the month.

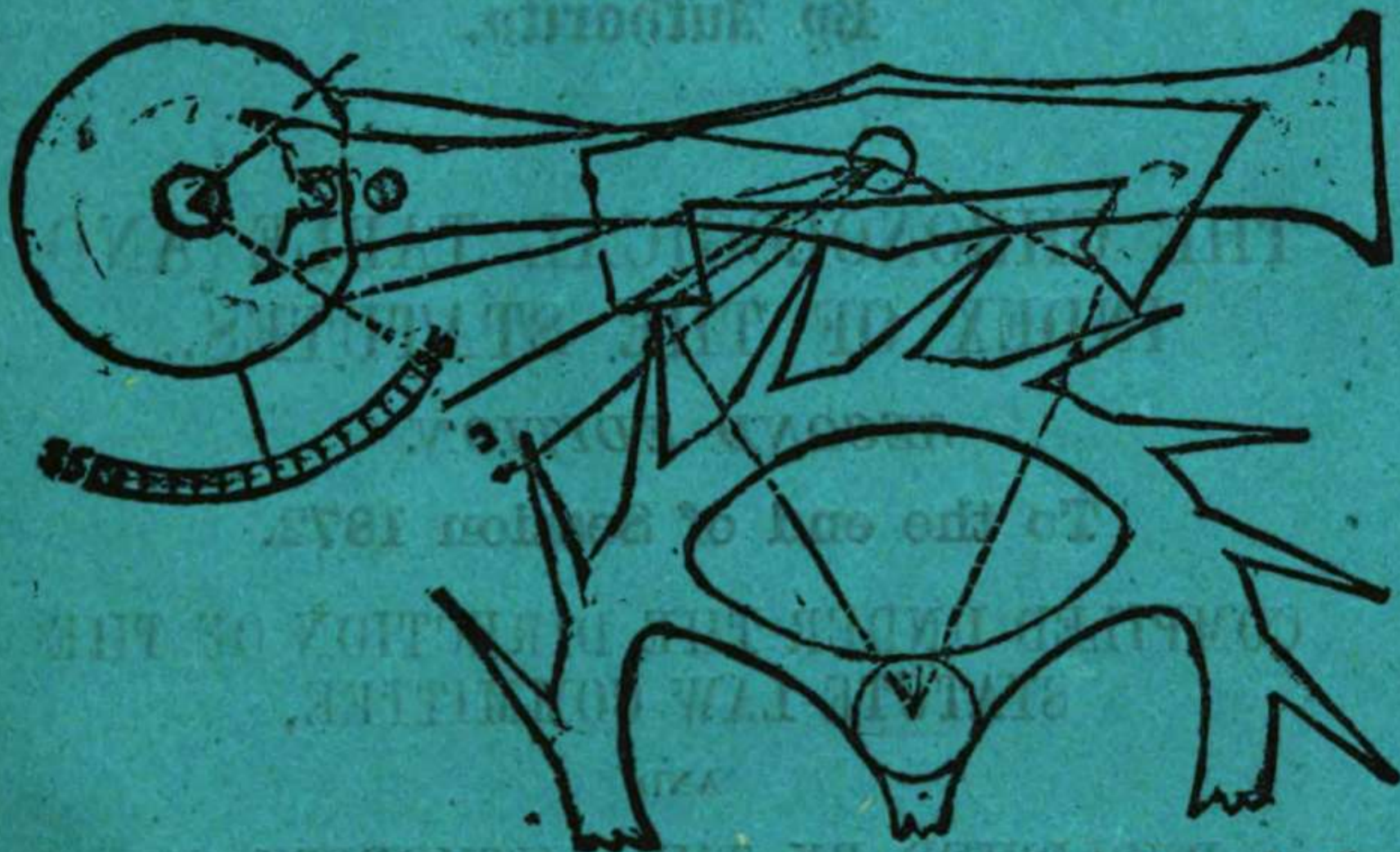
*Turkey, &c.*—According to information received from the German Post Office, the limit of weight of a packet of printed papers (including newspapers) or patterns addressed to Roumania, Servia, or Turkey viâ Germany, or to Norway or Sweden viâ Stralsund, has been fixed at one pound.

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\* Before any important alteration is made, notice of it is exhibited at every Post Office in the country, and is inserted in the "Postal Official Circular" (see page 2). A copy of the notice also is sent for insertion to each of the London daily newspapers. In the "Postal Official Circular" also are inserted minor alterations not of sufficient importance for a more extensive notice.

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## ORDINARY RATES OF POSTAGE AND CONDITIONS OF TRANSMISSION.

### I.—INLAND LETTERS.\*

Rates of postage.

1. The rates of postage when prepaid are as follows, viz.:—

For a letter not above 1 oz.†	-	-	1 <i>d.</i>
„ above 1 oz. but not above 2 oz.			1½ <i>d.</i>
„ 2 oz.	„	4 oz.	2 <i>d.</i>
„ 4 oz.	„	6 oz.	2½ <i>d.</i>

A letter above the weight of 12 oz. is liable to a postage of 1*d.* for every ounce, beginning with the first ounce. Thus, a letter weighing between 14 and 15 oz. must be prepaid 1*s.* 3*d.*

Unpaid and insufficiently paid letters.

2. A letter posted unpaid is chargeable on delivery with double postage; and a letter posted insufficiently prepaid is chargeable with double the deficiency.

Dimensions.

3. No letter may be above 18 inches in length, 9 inches in width, or 6 inches in depth, unless it be sent to or from one of the Government Offices.

### II.—COLONIAL AND FOREIGN LETTERS.

Rates of postage.

1. The rates of postage on letters to the colonies and foreign countries will be found in the Table of Colonial and Foreign Postage, pages 54 to 73.

Prepayment in some cases compulsory.

2. To some countries prepayment of the postage is compulsory. Where this is the case, the fact is indicated in the Table of Colonial and Foreign postage by the letter "c" prefixed to the rates of postage; prepayment being in all other cases optional.

Postage cannot in all cases be wholly prepaid.

3. To some countries the whole of the postage cannot be prepaid; and where this is the case, the letter "a" is prefixed to the rates in the Table of Colonial and Foreign Postage, to indicate that an additional charge is levied on delivery.

Treatment of insufficiently paid letters:

4. A letter posted unpaid, or paid only in part, directed to go by a route by which prepayment is compulsory, is sent to the Returned Letter Office, to go back to the writer, unless there is another route by which prepayment is not required; in which case the letter is sent by the latter route. Letters, however, for Australia and New Zealand, if prepaid as much as one rate (even though the prepayment be insufficient), are not detained, but are forwarded charged with the deficient postage and an additional rate.

if prepayment is compulsory;

5. A letter posted insufficiently prepaid for a place to which prepayment is optional is sent forward charged; the value of the stamps, however, being, as a rule, taken into account.

if optional.

\* Inland letters are those which pass between places in the United Kingdom, including the Isle of Man, the Orkney, Shetland, Scilly, and Channel Islands.

† If the weight be exceeded to the smallest extent, even though the balance be merely turned, the letter becomes liable to a higher postage. The same rule applies to letters going abroad. To provide, therefore, for errors in scales, &c., it is well to allow a little margin, or to pay the postage of the next greater weight.

6. The following are the charges made on delivery at the under-mentioned places upon letters posted unpaid (wholly or in part) :—\* Charges on delivery.

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Letters posted unpaid (wholly or in part) for the following places, if sent by French packet, are charged with a postage of 9d. per ¼ oz. ; partial prepayment not being recognised in these cases.

7. The same rates are chargeable in this country upon unpaid or insufficiently paid letters received from the above-named places, with the exception that letters from Alexandria, Cairo, and Suez, received via Southampton, and letters from China, and from Holland via France, are charged the prepaid rate only.

8. No letter for any colony or foreign country may be above 2 feet in length or 1 foot in width or depth. Dimensions.

9. Letters not specially directed by a particular route are forwarded by the route immediately following the name of the place in the Table of Colonial and Foreign Postage. Routes.

**Exceptions :—**

1st. Letters for Aden, Alexandria, Cairo, India, and Suez are sent by the first mail despatched by British Packet either via Brindisi or via Southampton according to the route indicated by the postage ; letters for Borneo, Ceylon, China, Japan, Java, Labuan, Penang, Philippine Islands, and Singapore are sent by the first packet, whether British or French, according to the route indicated by the postage ; and letters for Malta are sent by the first mail despatched, if the prepayment does not indicate that they are to be sent by another route.

2nd. Letters for Canada (if not registered) posted after the despatch of the mail by Canadian Packet on Thursday, are forwarded via the United States on Saturday. Registered Letters if not fully prepaid to be sent via the United States are detained for despatch by the next Canadian Packet.

3rd. Letters for the Argentine Confederation, Guadaloupe, and Martinique, are, if prepaid, sent in the first mail despatched by British

or French Packet after the time of posting; and letters for Cuba and Mexico are, if prepaid, sent in the mail viâ France, if that be the first Mail despatched after the time of posting.

4th. Letters for Switzerland are forwarded viâ France when that route is indicated by the amount of prepaid postage.

Supplementary mail to Rio, &c.

10. Letters for Brazil, Monte Video, and Chili, if specially directed "*by Supplementary Mail viâ Bordeaux or Lisbon*," and posted in time for despatch from London by the Day Mail of Friday, will in due course overtake, at Bordeaux or Lisbon, the Packet despatched from Liverpool on the previous Wednesday. The postage viâ Bordeaux is 1s. per half ounce, and viâ Lisbon 1s. 3d. per half ounce.

Address of letters for Turkey, Persia, &c.

11. Letters for such places in Turkey and Asia Minor as have *no Austrian Post Office* should be addressed to the care of an agent residing in the nearest port at which an Austrian Post Office has been established.\* It is recommended also that any letters for Erzeroum and other parts of the interior of Armenia, or for Persia, be addressed to the care of some agent at Samsoun or Trebizond, to be forwarded to their destination.

Address of letters for Russia.

12. Letters for Russia should have the name of the town added in either English, French, or German; and if for the smaller towns in Russia they should bear as a part of their address the name of the province or government in which they are situated.

Naval officers' and seamen's letters, not sent according to address.

13. Letters addressed to officers and seamen serving on board ships of war on Foreign or Colonial stations are forwarded according to information furnished, at short intervals, by the Admiralty, as to the movements of the squadron (or separate ship if detailed for special service), and not according to the direction on the letters; the latter often being erroneous owing to the writers not having the necessary information. This rule has been adopted, with the sanction of the Lords Commissioners of the Admiralty, in the interest of the service generally.

### III.—INLAND NEWSPAPERS.

Newspapers must be registered.

1. Under the "Post Office Act, 1870," any publication fulfilling the conditions hereafter named can, upon payment of an annual fee of 5s., be registered at the General Post Office to pass within the United Kingdom as a newspaper for a postage of one halfpenny. Without such registration no newspaper is entitled to be sent through the post at less than the book rate of postage.

Definition of a newspaper.

2. The conditions are as follows:—

1st. The publication must consist wholly or in great part of political or other news, or of articles relating thereto, or to other current topics, with or without advertisements.

2nd. It must be printed and published in the United Kingdom, must be published in numbers at intervals of not more than seven days, and must be printed on a sheet or sheets unstitched.

3rd. The full title and date of publication must be printed at the top of the first page, and the whole or part of the title and the date of publication at the top of every subsequent page; and this regulation applies to "Tables of Contents," and "Indices."

Definition of supplement.

4th. A supplement must consist wholly or in great part of matter like that of a newspaper, or of advertisements, printed on a sheet or sheets, or on a piece or pieces of paper, unstitched; or wholly or

in part of engravings, prints, or lithographs illustrative of articles in the newspaper. The supplement must in every case be published with the newspaper, and must have the title and date of publication of the newspaper printed at the top of every page; or, if it consists of engravings, prints, or lithographs, at the top of every sheet or side.

3. Registration for inland circulation includes registration for transmission abroad. Inland registration includes registration for abroad.
4. For each inland newspaper, whether posted singly or in a packet, the postage, when prepaid, is one halfpenny; but a packet containing two or more registered newspapers is not chargeable with a higher rate of postage than would be chargeable on a book packet of the same weight, viz., one halfpenny for every 2 oz. or part of that weight. Newspaper rates.
5. A newspaper posted unpaid, or a packet of newspapers posted either unpaid or insufficiently paid, is treated as an unpaid or insufficiently paid book packet of the same weight. Unpaid or insufficiently paid newspapers.
6. The postage must be prepaid either by an adhesive stamp, or by the use of a stamped wrapper. Prepayment by stamps.
7. No newspaper can now be sent through the post a second time for the original postage. For each transmission a fresh postage is required. Fresh postage for each transmission.
8. Every newspaper must be posted either without a cover (in which case it must not be fastened, whether by means of gum, wafer, sealing wax, postage stamp, or otherwise) or in a cover entirely open at both ends, so as to admit of easy removal for examination.\* If this rule be infringed, the newspaper is treated as a letter. Cover must be open at both ends.
9. Every newspaper must be so folded as to admit of the title being readily inspected. How folded.
10. A newspaper or packet of newspapers which contains any enclosure except supplements is charged as a letter, unless the enclosure be such as might be sent at the book rate of postage, and the entire packet be sufficiently prepaid as a book packet, in which case it is allowed to pass. Enclosures.
11. A newspaper which has any letter, or any communication of the nature of a letter, written in it or upon its cover, is charged as an unpaid or insufficiently paid letter. Anything of the nature of letter forbidden.
12. No packet of newspapers may be above 14 lbs. in weight, nor above two feet in length, one foot in width, or one in depth. Weight and dimensions.

#### IV.—COLONIAL AND FOREIGN NEWSPAPERS.

1. The rates of postage to the colonies and foreign countries on newspapers registered for transmission abroad will be found in the Table of Colonial and Foreign Postage, pages 54 to 73. Each newspaper is liable to a separate rate of postage, whether sent singly or in a packet, and, if above 4 oz. in weight, it is liable to two rates of postage; and so on. Each newspaper liable to distinct rate of postage.
2. The conditions of registration for transmission abroad are the same as those for inland transmission; excepting that for foreign transmission a newspaper may be published at intervals of thirty-one days; and that it may be printed (but not its supplement) on sheets stitched together. Moreover, Conditions of registration for transmission abroad.

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\* In order that no failure may occur in the delivery of newspapers through the covers becoming detached, it is recommended that the addresses be written on exposed parts of the newspapers themselves as well as on the covers.



prices current and market reports (but not private price lists or trade catalogues) may be registered as newspapers for foreign transmission, provided that they be published at intervals not exceeding thirty-one days.

Prepayment compulsory.

3. The postage, *which must be prepaid*, cannot be paid in money.

Must be posted within eight days.

4. All publications registered for transmission abroad *must be posted within eight days from the day of publication*, including that day; and any newspaper posted more than eight days after the date of publication, as well as any unregistered publication, must be prepaid at the book rates of postage.

Collected numbers not allowed.

5. The collected numbers issued during the month of a weekly or fortnightly publication are not allowed to pass as a monthly publication.

Must be open to examination.

6. Every newspaper must be posted either without a cover (in which case it must not be fastened, whether by means of gum, wafer, sealing-wax, postage stamp, or otherwise), or in a cover entirely open at both ends, so as to admit of easy withdrawal for examination.

How folded.

7. Every newspaper must be so folded as to admit of the title being readily inspected.

No enclosures.

8. No newspaper, whether posted singly or in a packet, may contain any enclosure except the supplement or supplements belonging to it.

No writing allowed.

9. There must be no writing or other mark on a newspaper sent abroad but the name and address of the person to whom it is sent; nor anything on the cover but such name and address, the printed title of the publication, the printed name and address of the publisher or vendor who sends it, and words indicating the date on which the subscription to the newspaper will end.

Dimensions and weight.

10. No packet of newspapers may be above two feet in length or one foot in width or depth. The limit of weight, which is not the same to all countries, is in each case shown in the Table of Colonial and Foreign Postage.

Newspapers for Russia.

11. It is forbidden to introduce into Russia, through the post, political newspapers, even in covers open at the ends or sides; and the only means by which persons residing in Russia can obtain newspapers from the United Kingdom is by subscribing for them at one of the Russian Post Offices. The admission into Russia even of newspapers not of a political character is permitted only when they are addressed to the house of some established bookseller, to the higher schools, to the Imperial Public Library, or to the Academy of Sciences in Russia. There is not, however, any restriction on political newspapers or any other publication addressed to members of the Royal Family of Russia, the Imperial Ministers, or members of the Diplomatic Corps.

Printed Prices Current in covers open at the ends or sides are allowed to be addressed to any persons residing in Russia.

#### V.—INLAND BOOK POST.

Rate of postage. Unpaid and partly paid packets. What a book packet may contain.

1. The postage is one halfpenny for every 2 oz. or part of that weight.

2. A packet posted wholly unpaid is charged with double the book-postage; and if posted partially prepaid, with double the deficiency.

3. A book-packet may contain any number of separate books or other publications (including printed or lithographed letters), photographs (when not on glass or in cases containing glass or any like substance), drawings, prints, or maps, and any quantity of paper, or any other substance in ordinary use for writing or printing upon; and the books or other publications, prints, maps, &c., may be either printed, written, engraved, lithographed, or plain, or any mixture of these. Further, all legitimate binding, mounting, or covering of a book, &c., or of a portion thereof, is allowed, whether such binding, &c. be loose or attached; as also rollers in the case of prints or maps, markers

(whether of paper or otherwise) in the case of books, pens or pencils in the case of pocket-books, &c., and, in short, whatever is necessary for the safe transmission of such articles, or usually appertains thereto; but the binding, rollers, &c. must not be sent as a separate packet.

*Circulars*,—*i.e.*, letters which are intended for transmission in identical terms to several persons, and the whole or the greater part of which is printed, engraved, or lithographed,—may also be sent by book post.

4. But a book-packet may not contain any letter, or communication of the nature of a letter\* (whether separate or otherwise), unless it be a circular-letter or be wholly printed; nor any enclosure sealed or in any way closed against inspection; nor any other enclosure not allowed by Rule 3. If this rule be infringed, the entire packet is charged as a letter.†

What it may not contain.

5. A book-packet may be posted either without a cover (in which case it must not be fastened, whether by means of gum, wafer, sealing wax, postage stamp, or otherwise), or in a cover entirely open at both ends, so as to admit of the contents being easily withdrawn for examination;‡ otherwise it is treated as a letter. For the greater security of the contents, however, it may be tied at the ends with string; Postmasters being authorised to cut the string in such cases, although if they do so they must again tie up the packet.

Must be open at both ends; but may be tied with string.

6. No book-packet may be above 5 lbs. in weight, nor above one foot six inches in length, nine inches in width, or six inches in depth.

Weight and dimensions.

7. When, owing to a great and unusual influx of letters, books, &c., the transmission or delivery of the letters would be delayed if the whole mail were dealt with without distinction, book-packets may be kept back till the next despatch or delivery.

May be kept back.

## VI.—COLONIAL AND FOREIGN BOOK POST.

1. The rates of postage on book-packets to the colonies and foreign countries are given in the two subjoined tables, as also in the Table of Colonial and Foreign Postage, pages 54 to 73.

Rates of postage.

2. Every book-packet must be posted either without a cover (in which case it must not be fastened, whether by means of gum, wafer, sealing wax, postage stamp, or otherwise) or in a cover entirely open at both ends so as to admit of the contents being easily withdrawn for examination; otherwise it is treated as a letter. For the greater security of the contents, however, it may be tied at the ends with string; Postmasters being authorised to cut the string in such cases, although if they do so they must again tie up the packet.

Must be open at both ends.

3. The limit of size for a book-packet addressed to any place abroad is 24 inches in length and 12 inches in width or depth.

Dimensions.

*Exceptions*.—No packet for Algeria, Azores, Cape de Verd Islands, France, Madeira, or Portugal, or for Egypt, Syria, or Turkey, when sent by French Packet, must be above 18 inches in length, width, or depth.

4. Whatever is allowed under Rule 3, Section V., to be sent in an inland book-packet may be sent in a book-packet to any of the places named in Table I., except circulars not *wholly* printed, which are not allowed to be sent to any place abroad at less than the letter rates, and water-colour drawings, which are not allowed to be sent in a book-packet to France or Algeria.

What a book-packet may contain for places in Table I.

\* Entries merely stating who sends the book, &c., or to whom it is given, are not regarded as a letter.

† It is the duty of Postmasters, whenever they have ground for suspecting an infringement of any of the above conditions, and occasionally, even when there is no ground for suspicion, to open and examine book-packets posted at, or passing through, their office.

‡ In order to secure the return of book-packets which cannot be delivered, the names and addresses of the senders should be printed or written *outside*; thus, "From \_\_\_\_\_ of \_\_\_\_\_."

5. To the countries, &c. named in Table II., the Book Post is more restricted. Books and printed matter can be sent, but no writing is admissible, nor indeed any manuscript marks whether in or upon the packet beyond the name and address of the person to whom it is sent.

More restricted book post places in Table II.

Exceptions.—A packet for Austria, Azores, Cape de Verd Islands, Denmark (via Belgium), Germany, Greece, Ionian Islands, Madeira, Portugal, or the United States may contain the written name and address of the sender; and unbound proof sheets sent to the foregoing countries, or to Russia, or (via Belgium) to Turkey, Moldavia, Wallachia, &c., may contain ordinary corrections of the press.

VII.—COLONIAL AND FOREIGN PATTERN AND SAMPLE POST.

1. There is a Pattern and Sample Post to such colonies and foreign countries as are marked in the Table of Colonial and Foreign postage with the letter "P"; but it is restricted to *bonâ fide trade patterns or samples of* Colonial and Foreign Pattern and Sample Post.

*merchandise.* Goods sent for sale, or in execution of an order (however small the quantity may be), or any articles sent by one private individual to another which are not actually patterns or samples, are not admissible.

Rate of postage. 2. The rates of postage will be found in the Table of Colonial and Foreign postage, pages 54 to 73.

Must be easy of examination. 3. Patterns or samples, when practicable, must be sent in covers open at the ends, and in such a manner as to be easy of examination.\* But samples of seeds, drugs, and such like articles, which cannot be sent in covers of this kind,—but such articles only,—may be posted enclosed in boxes, or in bags of linen, or other material, fastened in such a manner that they may be readily opened; or, in the case of samples of seeds, &c., for the United States of America, Holland and its possessions, Belgium, Denmark, Greece, Portugal and its possessions, and Switzerland in bags entirely closed, provided such closed bags are transparent, so as to enable the Officers of the Post Office readily to satisfy themselves as to the nature of the contents.

No writing allowed. 4. There must be no writing or printing upon or in any packet except the address of the person for whom it is intended, the address of the sender, a trade mark or number, and the price of the articles.

Must not be of intrinsic value. 5. Samples of intrinsic value must not be sent to any foreign country except the United States; and in the case of France, samples of eider down, raw or thread silk, woollen or goats' hair thread, vanilla, saffron, carmine, or isinglass, are considered to fall under this rule, if they weigh more than three ounces; and up to this weight raw and spun silk, as well as coloured and twisted silk, may be sent to Germany.

Dangerous and prohibited articles. 6. Such articles as scissors, knives, razors, forks, steel pens, nails, keys, watch machinery, metal tubing, pieces of metal or ore, provided that they be packed and guarded in so secure a manner as to afford complete protection to the contents of the mail bags and to the Officers of the Post Office, while at the same time they may be easily examined, may be sent as samples to the following countries, but to these alone; viz., the Azores, Belgium, Cape de Verd Islands, Denmark, Germany, Holland, Madeira, Moldavia, Norway, Portugal, Sweden, Switzerland, Turkey, United States, Wallachia, and the British Colonies; and not even to these places when addressed "viâ France." Indigo cannot be sent to any place abroad.

Weight. 7. The limit of weight is not the same to all countries. For particulars see footnote at pages 54 to 73.

Dimensions. 8. A packet of patterns or samples sent to the Azores, Cape de Verd Islands, France, Madeira, Portugal, or by French packet to Turkey, Syria, or Egypt, must not exceed 18 inches in length, width, or depth; a packet to any other place abroad must not exceed 24 inches in length or 12 inches in width or depth.

### VIII.—CARD POST.

Post cards. 1. Post Cards, whether official or private, having a halfpenny stamp impressed upon them (adhesive stamps not being accepted in payment of the postage) may be transmitted between places in the United Kingdom with letters written upon the back.

Nothing to be written on front. 2. The front (or stamped) side is intended for the address only, in addition to the printed words "Post Card" and "The address only to be written "on this side." There must be nothing else written, printed, or otherwise impressed on it, nor must there be any writing or printing across the stamp. On the reverse side any communication, whether of the nature of a letter or otherwise, may be written or printed. Nothing whatever may be attached; nor may the card be folded, cut, or otherwise altered. If any one of these rules be infringed, the card will be charged 1d. on delivery.

Must not be cut, &c.

\* In order to secure the return of Pattern packets which cannot be delivered, the names and addresses of the senders should be printed or written *outside*; thus, "From \_\_\_\_\_ of \_\_\_\_\_."

3. When, owing to a great and unusual influx of letters, books, &c., the transmission or delivery of the letters would be delayed if the whole mail were dealt with without distinction, Post Cards may be kept back until the next despatch or delivery. May be kept back.

4. No card other than one of those issued by the Government, or a private card impressed with a halfpenny stamp at the Office of Inland Revenue, Somerset House, or at the Stamp Offices at Liverpool and Newcastle-on-Tyne, will pass under a halfpenny stamp, if it bear on it a written communication of the nature of a letter. Stamp must be impressed.

5. For information as to the conditions under which private cards are impressed with a halfpenny stamp, application must be made to the Office of Inland Revenue. Private cards.

## SPECIAL RATES OF POSTAGE AND CONDITIONS OF TRANSMISSION.

### IX.—ADDRESSES TO THE QUEEN AND PETITIONS TO PARLIAMENT.

1. Petitions and addresses to Her Majesty, forwarded direct, are exempt from postage; and such petitions and addresses, as also petitions to either House of Parliament, if sent to a Member of either House, are likewise exempt, provided they do not weigh more than two pounds, and are either without covers or are in covers open at the ends. No letter or other enclosure, however, must be inserted; and if one be found, such enclosure, unless it bear the proper number of postage stamps, will be charged as an unpaid letter. Exempt from postage.

2. The restriction laid down as to the size of letters does not apply to petitions or addresses to the Queen, whether directed to Her Majesty, or forwarded to any Member of either House of Parliament; nor to Petitions to either House of Parliament, forwarded to any Member of either House. No limit of size.

### X.—PARLIAMENTARY PROCEEDINGS.

1. Printed Votes or Proceedings of the Imperial Parliament, sent without covers or in covers open at the ends, may circulate within the United Kingdom at the rate of one halfpenny for every 2 oz. or part of that weight. Rates of postage.

2. The words "Parliamentary Proceedings" must be written or printed on the cover of the packet; otherwise it will be treated as an ordinary book packet.

3. Prepayment, when the circulation is within the United Kingdom, is optional; and if it be made in part, the simple difference only will be charged. Prepayment optional.

4. Parliamentary Proceedings may be sent, under the Book Post privilege, to all the Colonies, and to those Foreign States between which and this country there is a book post. Parliamentary Proceedings, &c. sent abroad.

5. The limit of size prescribed for ordinary book packets does not apply to printed Parliamentary Proceedings. No limit of size.

### XI.—PARLIAMENTARY NOTICES.

Parliamentary notices may be forwarded through the post under the following regulations:—

1. The words "Parliamentary Notice" must be legibly printed on the face of the letter; and in order to secure the speedy return of any notices which may be undelivered, the name and address of the solicitor issuing such parliamentary notice should also be legibly printed or written on the face of the letter; though this is not imperative. Mode of address.

2. These notices must be posted either at the General Post Office, St. Martin's-le-Grand, in London; the General Post Office in Dublin; the Where to be posted.

Dates of posting.

3. All notices which by the standing orders of either House of Parliament are required to be served on or before the 15th December must be posted not later than the 12th December, unless the 12th fall on a Sunday, when they must be posted not later than the 11th; and those notices which, by the same orders, may be served after the 15th, must be posted at least three clear days before the time specified in the standing orders.

Must be prepaid and registered.

4. The postage chargeable on these notices, and the registration fee of sixpence on each, must be prepaid by stamps.

Must be accompanied with lists in duplicate.

5. The notices must be posted at the Post Office window, accompanied with duplicate lists of the addresses, the notices being arranged, for the convenience of comparison, in the order of the list. These lists will be examined by the officer in attendance at the window; and if they correspond with the addresses he will sign and stamp every sheet of each list. One of the duplicate lists will then be returned to the person who brought the letters, and the other forwarded to the Secretary, General Post Office, London.

Hours of posting.

6. The hours for receiving such notices are the same as those for the registration of ordinary letters, unless they be presented at such a time as to interfere with the other duties of the office; in which case the Postmaster may appoint any other time within the next twenty-four hours for receiving the same, provided that, when the notices are to be served on or before the 15th December, such arrangement do not delay the posting beyond the 12th.

Re-directed notices.

7. Re-directed parliamentary notices are, like letters, liable to an additional rate of postage.

Arrangements with Postmasters.

8. The senders of parliamentary notices should, if possible, arrange on the previous day, with the Postmaster, as to the most convenient time for posting them, and state the probable number.

## XII.—NOTICES RELATING TO VOTING FOR MEMBERS OF PARLIAMENT, POLL-BOOKS, AND JURY SUMMONSES.

Notices to voters.

1. Notices relating to votes for Members of Parliament, belonging to any of the classes enumerated in the Acts 6 Vict. c. 18. and 13 & 14 Vict. c. 69., can also be sent through the post (with the securities for their safe delivery enjoined by the Acts) on prepayment, in stamps, of the postage at the letter rate—whether Inland or Foreign, as the case may be—and of a registration fee of twopence, provided they be presented, duly directed, open and in duplicate, to the Postmaster of an office which is also a Money Order Office.\* On receiving the notices, the Postmaster will compare each with its duplicate, and if the two agree, the latter will be stamped and returned to the bearer. The notices must be presented at least half an hour before the fixed times for posting ordinary letters.

Postage and registration fee must be prepaid.

Where and how to be posted.

2. The production by the person who posted a notice of the stamped duplicate is evidence of the notice having been given to the person at the place mentioned, on the day on which such notice would, in the ordinary course of post, have been delivered there.

Re-directed notices.

3. They are liable to the usual charge for re-direction.

Poll-books.

4. When a poll-book or parcel of voting papers is presented by any returning officer to be forwarded by post, the Postmaster is required to give to such officer an acknowledgment thereof in writing, stating the time when he received it.

\* The posting of these notices and of Jury Summonses is confined strictly to Post Offices where Money Order business is transacted; consequently, whenever such business is suspended at any office none of these notices can there be received.

5. No registration fee is demanded for poll-books or parcels of voting papers, and prepayment of the postage is optional. No registration fee.
6. Jury Summonses may, in England and Wales, be sent through the post under the following regulations :— Jury Summonses.
- 1st. They must bear the words "Jury Summons" on the same side as the address.
- 2nd. The postage at the letter rate, together with a fee of 2*d.* for each summons, must be prepaid in postage stamps. Fee of 2*d.* and postage to be prepaid.
- 3rd. They must be posted at those Offices only which are Money Order Offices, and each must be accompanied with a duplicate endorsed with the name and address of the person to whom the original summons is directed. On receiving them the Postmaster compares their addresses with those of the duplicates, and on being satisfied that they are alike, he forwards the originals in the usual course of post (but not as registered letters), returning the duplicates to the person who brought them, duly marked with the Stamp of the Office. Where and how to be posted.
- 4th. These Summonses are received within such hours as may be previously agreed upon between the Sheriff or other proper Officer and the Postmaster, and which must be so arranged as not to interfere with the current duties of the Office. Hours at which posted.

**XIII.—LETTERS FOR NON-COMMISSIONED OFFICERS, SOLDIERS, AND SEAMEN IN HER MAJESTY'S SERVICE.**

1. Non-commissioned officers, bandmasters, army schoolmasters (if not superintending schoolmasters or schoolmasters of the 1st class), schoolmistresses, private soldiers, or seamen belonging to Her Majesty's Ships, whether serving on sea or land, and whether in a British Possession or Foreign Country, as also enrolled pensioners in Canada, can send and receive letters by Packet or Man-of-War, for a postage of 1*d.*; but if any such letters have to pass through a foreign country they are subject, in addition, to the foreign postage, whatever that may be. Thus the postage to the under-mentioned countries (including the British charge of one penny) is as follows:— Rates of postage.

2. The Person claiming the privilege must at the time be actually employed in the service of Her Majesty, and must not be either a commissioned officer, or warrant officer, viz., assistant engineer, gunner, boatswain, or carpenter; the privilege not extending to these officers. Must be on service.
3. If the letter be posted within the United Kingdom, the penny must be prepaid, as must any foreign postage that may be chargeable; and if sent by a private ship, the gratuity of one penny to the captain must also be prepaid. If posted abroad, prepayment is not compulsory, but if the letter be sent unpaid, it is on delivery charged twopence, together with any foreign postage or gratuity to a sea captain that may be due. Prepayment compulsory.
4. The letter must not weigh more than half an ounce. Weight.
5. It must relate entirely to the private concerns of the soldier or seaman.
6. The name of the soldier or seaman, with his class or description, must appear in the direction; and the officer having the command must sign his name, and specify the ship, or regiment, corps, or detachment to which the How to be addressed.

Treatment of insufficiently paid and incorrectly addressed letters.

Must not be directed to any one's care.

7. If the letter be posted in the United Kingdom for a place abroad, unpaid or insufficiently paid, or if the class or description of the soldier or seaman be not written in the address, it will be detained and returned to the writer for payment of the postage.

8. Letters for seamen on board Her Majesty's ships stationed at a port abroad should not be addressed to the care of the British Consul at that port, or to any agent on shore ; as the privilege enjoyed by seamen, of receiving their letters through the post at reduced rates of postage, is confined to such letters as are addressed directly to them. All letters directed to the care of any other person are liable to the ordinary rate of postage ; and in those cases where prepayment is necessary, they will be detained if such ordinary rate be not prepaid. The same rule is applicable to letters for non-commissioned officers in the army, schoolmasters, if not of the first class, schoolmistresses, and private soldiers.

XIV.—LETTERS FOR PASSENGERS ON BOARD MAIL PACKETS.

Must be registered.

1. Letters for passengers on board the Cunard and Inman packets for America touching at Queenstown, or on board the Mediterranean packets about to sail from Southampton with the mails for India, Australia, China, &c., may be posted in any part of the United Kingdom up to the time at which ordinary registered letters to go by the same packets are received. They must be registered, and the postage and registration fee must be fully prepaid, and they must be addressed to the care of the commander of the packet.

2. Letters for passengers on board the Canadian packets touching at Londonderry, may, under similar conditions, be posted up to the same time as ordinary registered letters for Canada. These must be addressed to the care of the officer in charge of the mails.

Mode of address.

3. The letters should be addressed thus : "Mr. \_\_\_\_\_, on board the mail packet for \_\_\_\_\_, at Queenstown [Londonderry or Southampton]. Care of the Officer in charge of the mails," or "care of the Commander of the packet;" as the case may be.

Letters for passengers to India.

4. Letters directed to the care of the Packet Agent at Suez, and despatched by the mail *viâ Brindisi*, will probably reach passengers for India, &c. who have sailed in the packet which left Southampton the previous week.

XV.—LETTERS, &c. BY PRIVATE SHIPS.

1. Letters intended to be sent by Private Ship must be addressed "By Private Ship;" and if by a particular vessel, the name of the ship must be added. The postage of a letter by a Private Ship is as follows:—

2. Letters cannot be sent unpaid to the Countries marked thus (\*). The Unpaid postage for letters weighing more than ½ oz. advances in the same manner as letters that for letters sent by mail packets. Unpaid letters coming into this country are charged the same rates as unpaid letters going out of it.

3. Book Packets and Packets of Patterns may be sent by Private Ship, for Books and the same postage as by Mail Packets, to all places to which there are Mail patterns. Packets.

4. Newspapers by Private Ships to the Azores, Cape de Verd Islands, Newspapers, Madeira, Norway, and Portugal must be prepaid 2d. each per 4 oz.; and to all other places 1d. each per 4 oz.

REGULATIONS AS TO PREPAYMENT, REGISTRATION, &c.

XVI.—MODES OF PREPAYMENT.

1. Inland letters, newspapers, and book-packets cannot be prepaid in money, but must be prepaid by means of stamps, either adhesive or embossed or impressed. This rule applies also to registered letters. Inland letters, &c. must be prepaid in stamps.

Exceptions.—At the Chief and District Post Offices and at the Charing

Cross and Lombard Street Post Offices in London, as well as at the Head Offices in Edinburgh and Dublin, letters and book-packets may, from 10 a.m. to 4 p.m., be prepaid in money, provided the amount be never less than 1l., and that the letters and book packets be tied in separate bundles of 60, with the addresses arranged in the same direction. Foreign letters can be paid in money.

2. Letters to places abroad may be prepaid either in money or in stamps; but the payment must be made wholly in stamps or wholly in money. This rule applies also to registered letters. Foreign newspapers must be prepaid in stamps.

3. Newspapers, book-packets, and sample-packets for places abroad can be prepaid only by means of stamps; and in their case prepayment is always compulsory.

4. British postage stamps, though available for all letters, &c. going out of this country, are not, as a general rule, available for letters, &c. coming

into it; the principal exception being in the case of letters posted by naval officers, marines, and seamen serving abroad, which, if posted in the ship's bag, must be prepaid by means of British postage stamps.

### XVII.—REGISTRATION (INLAND AND FOREIGN).

Fee for in-

1. The fee for registering a letter, newspaper, or book-packet passing between any two places in the United Kingdom is fourpence.

Fee for

2. The same fee is chargeable for the registration of letters, newspapers, book-packets, and patterns to the British Colonies, United States, Germany, Italy, Switzerland (viâ Belgium), and (when sent in closed mails) to the British Post Offices in Egypt and Constantinople.

3. To all other foreign countries *only letters or packets paying the letter rate can be registered*. The fee chargeable in each case will be found in the column headed "Registration fee" in the Table of Colonial and Foreign postage. To some countries, as shown in that Table, a letter can be registered only to the port of arrival; it being left, in those cases, to the postal authorities of the country to which that port belongs to continue the registration or not as they may think proper. To a few countries, as also shown in the Table, there is no arrangement whatever for registration.

4. No letter or other postal packet addressed to initials or to a fictitious name can be registered.

5. Registered letters, &c. must be prepaid as regards both postage and registration fee; except official letters for Government Offices in London, Dublin, or Edinburgh, which may be registered on prepayment, in stamps, of the registration fee only.

6. Every letter to be registered should be presented at the counter, and a receipt obtained for it, and should on no account be dropped into the letter-box. If, contrary to this rule, a letter marked "Registered" be dropped into the letter-box it will, *if directed to any place in the United Kingdom or the British Colonies*, be liable to a registration fee of 8d., instead of the ordinary fee of 4d.

7. At all Post Offices the latest time for posting registered letters on the payment of the ordinary fee is entered in the notice exhibited in the Office window; but, upon payment of a late fee of fourpence, in addition to the ordinary registration fee, at the Metropolitan Chief Offices, at the London District Offices (including the Lombard Street and Charing Cross Offices), and at all provincial Head Offices, letters, whether inland, foreign, or colonial, may be registered after the hours specified, until the closing of the letter-box for each despatch (exclusive of the time during which late letters are received), or until the office is closed for the night.

8. The registration of a packet makes its transmission much more secure, inasmuch as, under ordinary circumstances, a registered packet can be traced through its whole course; and thus the loss of a registered packet is a very rare occurrence. Nevertheless large sums of money or other articles of great value should not be sent through the post, even if the packet be registered; as the machinery of the Department is not arranged with a view to such transmissions. By law, the Post Office is not responsible for the safe delivery of registered packets; though any officer who may neglect his duty on this point will be called to strict account. Sent in *unregistered* letters, valuable articles are exposed to risk, and offer a temptation which ought not to be created; and the Department cannot in any way undertake the safe conveyance of such packets. All inland or colonial letters, therefore, which appear to contain coin, even though they be posted without registration, are treated as registered, and charged on delivery with a double registration fee of eightpence in addition to the ordinary postage; and any such letters which cannot be registered in time to be forwarded by the Mail for which they are posted are detained for the next despatch. Even if the letter do not

contain any article of intrinsic value, it should, if it be very important, be registered.

9. No Letter Carrier, Rural Messenger, or other servant of the Post Office is allowed to carry a letter for any person to be registered. Letter Carriers.

XVIII.—RE-DIRECTION.

1. Every re-directed letter, post-card, or other postal packet is liable to an additional postage (at the prepaid rate) for each re-direction, unless the re-direction be made by an Officer of the Post Office, and both the original and the second address be within the same free delivery.\* Thus, on a paid or unpaid letter, not exceeding 1 oz. in weight, re-directed either by an Officer of the Post Office, or by any one else, to a different postal district in the United Kingdom, or from one place to another in the same postal district but not in the same free delivery, an additional postage is levied of one penny; and if the weight be more than one ounce, but less than two ounces, of three half-pence, and so on. Re-directed letters, &c. liable to a second postage.

*Exceptions.*—No charge for re-direction is made on Government letters; nor is any charge for re-direction made on newspapers from abroad, unless they have been opened, in which case they are liable to postage as books.

Further: Letters addressed to commissioned officers in the army, navy, or ordnance, or (provided they do not exceed  $\frac{1}{2}$  oz. in weight) to schoolmasters or schoolmistresses in the army, or non-commissioned officers, private soldiers, or seamen employed on actual service in any of Her Majesty's colonies, or on any foreign station, and who, before receiving the letters, may have started on their return home or to another station, may be re-directed to such officers, private soldiers, or seamen, &c., when these have removed *upon service*, and will be delivered to them without any charge for re-direction. The same privilege extends to the letters of *non-commissioned officers, schoolmasters in the army (of all but the first class), schoolmistresses in the army, private soldiers, and seamen*, (but to these only), re-directed from one part of the United Kingdom to another, or from the United Kingdom to a place abroad, provided the original postage is prepaid and the letters do not exceed half an ounce in weight.

2. Letters originally posted in the United Kingdom and re-directed to any place abroad are charged as unpaid letters. Foreign and colonial letters received here and re-directed to some place abroad are liable to an additional foreign or colonial rate of postage; but if re-directed to some place within the United Kingdom they are liable only to an additional inland rate. Letters re-directed to foreign parts.

3. A registered letter when re-directed to any place within the United Kingdom is only liable to the same additional charge as an ordinary re-directed letter. If, however, instead of being taken back to the Post Office to be dealt with as a registered letter, it is dropped into the letter box as an ordinary letter (the word "registered" not having been erased, or having been erased in pencil only), it becomes liable to the same treatment as any other letter marked "registered" and found in the letter box, and is surcharged with a registration fee of eightpence minus the value of any stamps already affixed for the registration. A registered letter re-directed to a colony or foreign country is liable to a second postage and registration fee, *which must be prepaid*. Registered letters.  
Second postage and fee must be prepaid when re-directed to foreign parts.

4. Notices of removal and applications for letters to be re-directed must in all cases be made in writing, and be duly signed by the persons to whom the letters are addressed. In London such notices or applications should be sent to the Secretary to the Post Office, or handed to the letter-carrier of the district; and in provincial towns they should be sent to the local Postmaster. Notices of removal.

\* For purposes of re-direction the whole of the London District is at present regarded as within the same free delivery.

Postmasters not always bound to re-direct letters.

5. A Postmaster is not bound to re-direct letters for a person temporarily leaving his home, and not having a private bag or box, unless the house be left uninhabited, or the letters would be delayed in their transmission by being sent to the house to be re-directed there.

### XIX.—DELIVERY.

What letters, &c. must not be delivered. No extra payment allowed except Christmas Boxes. Delivery at window.

1. Letter Carriers and Rural Messengers are prohibited from distributing any letters, newspapers, &c., except such as have passed through a Post Office, whether before beginning their rounds, whilst on their rounds, or after they have completed them. Nor are they allowed to receive any payment beyond the postage for the delivery or collection of any letter, &c.; nor to deviate from the route laid down for them. The prohibition from receiving payment in addition to the postage does not, however, extend to Christmas boxes.

2. No person living within the town free delivery, or within the limits of a rural post free delivery, unless he rent a private box, can claim to have his letters delivered at the office window if a delivery by Letter Carrier or a despatch by messenger is about to take place; but letters which arrive by a mail, after which there is no immediate delivery by Letter Carrier or Messenger, may be obtained by any person on application at the office window, so long as the office is open for delivery.

Postmaster may refuse to deliver at window.

3. In order to prevent the additional trouble which is sometimes caused by letters being directed to a Post Office for persons who reside within a free delivery from such office, but who have no private box, a Postmaster is authorised, when such letters arrive by a mail for which there is a delivery from house to house, to refuse to deliver them at the window (even though initials may have been substituted for the full name), and to send them out by the Letter Carriers; except such as are addressed to the military in barracks.

Private boxes and bags in the country.

4. Any person can have a private box who is willing to pay the appointed fee. Where this fee goes to the Revenue, it is generally fixed at one guinea per annum, to be paid in advance, and for a period of not less than a year; and the Postmaster, where it goes to him, may demand the same terms, though he may, at his option, take less. The same also, in most cases, are the terms for a private bag; except that, in addition, there is the cost of the bag itself, and a charge for conveyance, the maximum of the latter being half a guinea per annum, if the bag be conveyed by a Rural Messenger, and two guineas if by a contractor for a mail cart or other horse post. If more than one Rural Messenger or more than one contractor take part in the conveyance of a private letter bag, each is allowed to charge the full amount of the fee for his service. The weight of a private bag, when empty, is limited to one pound. As the service of private bags may possibly delay the despatch of the general bag, none are allowed without the permission of the Surveyor. If a private letter bag made up at one Post Office be left at another to be called for or to be delivered from thence, the Postmaster at such other office may make a charge for his trouble; which charge is usually 5s. per annum. Any person residing within the limits of a town free delivery, and renting a private letter bag, is considered to have the accommodation of a private box at the Post Office as well as a bag, and is liable to the full charge for both box and bag.

### XX.—POSTAGE STAMPS.

Postage stamps, &c. must be kept for sale.

1. Every Head Postmaster is required to keep, for sale to the public, a sufficient stock of the different postage stamps in use, as also envelopes bearing an embossed penny stamp, newspaper wrappers bearing an impressed halfpenny stamp, and Post Cards. The stamps are of the respective values of  $\frac{1}{2}d.$ ,  $1d.$ ,  $1\frac{1}{2}d.$ ,  $2d.$ ,  $3d.$ ,  $4d.$ ,  $6d.$ ,  $9d.$ ,  $10d.$ ,  $1s.$ ,  $2s.$ , and  $5s.$  The em-

bossed envelopes are made of four sizes, viz.,  $5\frac{1}{4}$  ins.  $\times$   $3\frac{3}{8}$  ins.,  $5\frac{1}{4}$  ins.  $\times$  3 ins.  $4\frac{3}{4}$  ins.  $\times$   $2\frac{3}{4}$  ins., and 4 ins.  $\times$   $2\frac{1}{2}$  ins.; and are all sold at the following prices:—

The Post Cards are not sold singly, but in packets of twelve for  $6\frac{1}{2}d.$

2. Sub-postmasters are required to keep halfpenny and penny stamps and Post Cards only; but they are bound, on application, to procure any stamps of other values, embossed envelopes, or newspaper wrappers. What Sub-postmasters must keep.

3. Every Rural Messenger is authorised to sell penny postage stamps at the usual price of 1d. each; and when any person applies to him for postage stamps the Messenger must either supply them, or (if he have none in his possession) must, without extra charge, receive the postage in money and, on his arrival at the Post Office, obtain postage stamps for the amount, and affix them carefully to the letters. Rural Messengers may sell Postage Stamps.

4. Payment of postage cannot be made by means of postage stamps which have been torn, cut, or otherwise rendered imperfect; or of embossed, or impressed, stamps cut out from the envelopes, cards, or wrappers, on which such stamps were embossed or impressed (even although the stamps have not been before used or sent by post), or of receipt or other Inland Revenue stamps. Applications for allowance on spoilt postage stamps, embossed envelopes, post cards, or newspaper wrappers, which have not passed through the post, should be made to the Office of Inland Revenue. In the case of envelopes, cards, or wrappers, the applications must be accompanied by these articles intact; as no allowance can be granted on the embossed, or impressed, stamps if cut therefrom. Stamps which cannot be used for postage. Spoilt stamps.

5. To discourage the transmission of coin by post all Postmasters in the United Kingdom at whose Offices Money Order business is transacted, and all Letter Receivers in the London District, are permitted, though not compelled, to purchase postage stamps from the public (provided the stamps be not soiled or otherwise damaged), at a charge of  $2\frac{1}{2}$  per cent.; the charge, however, never being less than one halfpenny. Under this arrangement the payments are as follows:— Stamps purchased from public.

6. In order to prevent the temptation to steal stamps attached to letters, which might be afforded by facilities for selling them, no separate stamps can be purchased. They must in all cases be presented in strips containing at least two stamps adhering to each other. Must be in strips.

7. In consequence of representations made to the Post Office by various Firms that there is reason to believe that their postage stamps were purloined by persons in their employ, the Department has recommended that the name or initials of Firms, &c. be either printed on the back of the stamps (by arrangement with the Inland Revenue Office, Somerset House), or perforated through the stamps by means of a machine devised for the purpose; so that, the sale of such stamps being thereby rendered difficult (Postmasters having Safeguard against theft.

been instructed not to purchase any of them) there may be little or no temptation to steal them.

Paper may be impressed with postage stamps.

8. Paper taken by the public to the Inland Revenue Office can be impressed with postage stamps under conditions which may be learnt on application at that office.

License to sell Stamps.

9. Applications from persons in London, not in the service of the Post Office, for licenses to sell postage stamps should be made to the Office of Inland Revenue. Residents in the provinces should apply to the Stamp Distributor of the District.

## XXI.—ARTICLES NOT ALLOWED TO BE SENT BY POST.

Nothing indecent or libellous may be sent.

1. It is forbidden to forward by post any indecent or obscene print, painting, photograph, lithograph, engraving, book or card, or any other indecent or obscene article, or any letter, newspaper, publication, packet, or card having thereon any words, marks, or designs of an indecent, obscene, libellous, or grossly offensive character. Anything posted contrary to this prohibition will be stopped and sent up to the Returned Letter Office, London.

Nothing dangerous may be sent.

2. Postmasters are instructed not to receive any letter which there is good reason to believe contains anything likely to injure the contents of the mail bag, or to do bodily harm to any officer of the Post Office. If such a packet be posted without the Postmaster's knowledge, or if at any time before its despatch he should discover any such packet, he is directed not to forward it, but to report the case, with the address of the packet, to the Secretary. The following are examples of the articles referred to :

A glass bottle, or glass in any form ; leeches, game, fish, meat, fruit, or vegetables ; bladders or other vessels containing liquids ; gunpowder, lucifer matches, or anything which is explosive or liable to sudden combustion ; razors, scissors, needles, forks, or other sharp instruments are also forbidden, except when sent in packets of samples to the foreign countries mentioned in Rule 6, Section VII.

Letters to Germany.

3. According to the regulations of Germany, no letter exceeding 250 grammes in weight (a little more than  $8\frac{1}{2}$  oz.), can, if containing any other enclosure than paper, be allowed to circulate by the post. Any such letters, therefore, forwarded in the Mail to Germany, will be liable, on their arrival at the German frontier, to be stopped, and sent to the Custom House for delivery as *freight*.

Coin, jewelry, &c. for Belgium, Italy, Spain, Turkey, New South Wales, Victoria, and Costa Rica.

4. The laws of Spain forbid the transmission, by the post within that country, of letters or other packets containing coin, watches, jewelry, or other articles of value, which are liable to Customs duties ; and the circulation of such articles in letters is also prohibited in Belgium and Italy. Any such packets, therefore, which may be forwarded in the mails to Spain, Belgium, or Italy will not be delivered, but will be sent back. A similar prohibition, on pain of forfeiture, is placed upon the transmission of diamonds and other jewels to the Turkish Empire, of money and jewelry to the Republic of Costa Rica, and of jewelry, &c. to the colonies of New South Wales and Victoria, Australia.

Post Office not responsible for losses through failure, &c.; nor for injuries to books, &c. Packets should be well guarded.

## XXII.—MISCELLANEOUS REGULATIONS AND SUGGESTIONS.

1. The Post Office is not, by law, responsible for any loss or inconvenience which may arise from the non-delivery, mis-sending, or mis-delivery of any letter, book, or other postal packet (even if the packet be registered, see Section XVII., page 18) ; nor is the Post Office responsible for any injury which a packet may sustain during its transmission.

2. To guard against such injury all postal packets which are likely to suffer from stamping or from great pressure should be placed in strong covers ;

and even with this precaution no fragile article should be sent through the Post. It should be remembered that every packet has to be handled several times; that it is exposed to considerable pressure and friction in the mail bag; and that, whenever the bag has in the course of its transmission to be transferred by means of the railway apparatus, the risk of injury is much increased.

3. No information can be given respecting letters which pass through a Post Office except to the persons to whom they are addressed; and in no other way is official information of a private character allowed to be made public. A Postmaster may, however, give an address if he has no reason to believe that the person whose address it is would disapprove of his doing so. Official information.

4. Provision having been made, by means of the British Postal Guide (with local Postal Guides in large towns) and the Postal Official Circular, to supply full and authentic information on all postal matters, the public should abstain, as much as possible, from applying for such information to Postmasters and other officers of the department. When information is asked for, the application should be in writing and addressed to the Secretary of the Post Office, as Postmasters are not required to correspond with the public on official matters. For any error in a reply to a *verbal* application the Department does not hold itself responsible. Applications for postal information.  
Post Office not responsible for error in *verbal* replies.

5. Postmasters are not allowed to return any letter or other packet to the writer or sender, or to any one else, or to delay forwarding it to its destination according to the address, even though a request to such effect be written thereon. Letters when once posted cannot be returned.

6. Postmasters are not bound to give change, nor are they authorised to demand change; and when money is paid at a Post Office, whether as change or otherwise, no question as to its right amount, goodness, or weight can be entertained after it has been removed from the counter. Change and bad money.

7. Postmasters are not bound to weigh any letters or other packets for the public, except foreign and colonial letters about to be prepaid in money; but they *may* do so if their duty be not thereby impeded. Postmasters not bound to weigh letters.

8. If a letter be forwarded under cover to any Postmaster with a request that he will re-post it at his office, the letter, on being re-posted, will be endorsed with the words "posted at \_\_\_\_\_, under cover, to the Postmaster of \_\_\_\_\_." Attempted deception as to place of posting.

9. Every address should be legible and complete. When a letter is sent to a Post Town the last word in the address should be the name of that town, except when the town is but little known, or when there are two Post Towns of the same name, or when the name of the town is identical with or very like the name of some foreign town or country. In such cases the name of the county should be added. Thus, the last part of the address of a letter to Newport in Monmouthshire should be—

"Newport,  
Monmouthshire."

10. When a letter is sent to a place where there is only a Sub-office, the name of the Head Office should be given, unless the office is a Railway Sub-office, when the initials R.S.O. and the name of the county should be given. The name of the Post Town or county, as the case may be, should be written in a separate line. Letters posted in one part of the United Kingdom and intended for another (as, for example, letters posted in England and intended for Scotland) should have the name of the country to which they are sent added to the address, unless the letters be intended for either London, Edinburgh, Dublin, or other very large town; when such addition is unnecessary. Addresses should be legible and complete.

11. The number, too, of the house should appear; its omission being a cause of delay in the sorting; and tending to retard the general delivery. In the case of letters for places abroad the name of the *country* as well as the town should be given, in full, and should be the last word in the address. Attention to this latter precaution will often assist in deciphering the name of Name of Post Town or county should be given.

a town, and prevent the letter from being mis-sent when there are towns of the same name in different countries. For example : a letter intended for London in Western Canada, but simply addressed "London, W.C.," would be forwarded to the Western Central District of the Metropolis in England.

12. Letters for well-known firms and persons in London are sometimes addressed "London" only ; but this practice often causes delay in their delivery. Letters for strangers or for persons whose address is not known at the Chief Office, simply addressed "London," (and not "Post Office," or "Poste Restante, London,") are not delivered from the *Poste Restante*, but are sent to the Returned Letter Office.

Letters to be called for at Provincial Offices.

13. A letter addressed to a Post Office to be called for is retained one month ; and, if not called for by the end of that time, is sent to the Returned Letter Office to go back to the writer. But if the letter be addressed to a Post Office at a seaport town for a person on board a ship, expected to arrive at that port, it is kept three months.

(For the rules relating to letters addressed to Post Offices in London, see page 31.)

Letters to be called for at clubs, hotels, &c.

14. All letters addressed to Club Houses, hotels, and other places where letters are received to be called for, should be returned to the Post Office as soon as it has become evident that they will not be called for. In the London District such letters should, under ordinary circumstances, be returned to the Letter Carriers within a month of their delivery.

Letters should contain full address of writer.

15. Every letter should contain the full address of the writer, in order to ensure its return if the person to whom it is directed cannot be found. A much larger portion of the undelivered letters could be returned if the names and addresses of the senders were always either fully and plainly written inside or embossed on the envelopes.

Treatment of undelivered letters.

16. In London, letters which cannot, for any reason, be delivered are, as soon as they have been properly tried, sent to the Returned Letter Office.

17. In the country, when an inland letter is refused, it is retained by the Postmaster for one day before being sent to the Returned Letter Office ; unless the refusal be conditional, in which case the letter is kept for three days, as are all colonial or foreign letters when refused, and letters, whether inland or foreign, addressed to persons not known, or gone away. But when the reason for the non-delivery of a letter, &c. is that the person to whom it is addressed is dead, the letter is sent, as soon as practicable, to the Returned Letter Office ; as are all letters intended for ships which have sailed before the arrival of such letters at the port of departure.

How disposed of in Returned Letter Office.

18. On reaching the Returned Letter Office, a letter originating in the United Kingdom is at once opened, and if found to contain the writer's address is returned to him. Although it may have been posted unregistered, if there is any article of value in it, the letter is registered in the Returned Letter Office ; a registration fee of 4*d.* being demanded on delivery. If it does not contain either the writer's address or an article of value, the letter is destroyed. After being retained for periods varying from one week to two months, colonial and foreign letters are, with few exceptions, returned unopened to the country from which they were received.

Letter-boxes should be provided.

19. To facilitate the delivery of letters, a letter-box should be affixed to every house-door.

Posting of letters, circulars, &c.

20. All letters, &c. should be posted as early as practicable, especially when sent in large numbers, as is frequently the case with newspapers and circulars, and care should always be taken to see that the packet falls into the letter-box, and does not stick in its passage. Much trouble is saved to the office if circulars, before being posted, are tied in bundles with all the addresses in one direction.

Registered letters to be accompa-

21. When several letters are sent by the same person for registration they should be accompanied with a list (in duplicate) of the addresses ; one list to be retained at the Post Office, and the other, when signed, to be returned by

the bearer. This practice (which is adopted by many bankers) saves time both to the public and to the department. nied by lists in duplicate.

22. Stamps should be placed on the front, that is, on the address side of the letter, and upon the right hand upper corner. On re-directed letters care should be taken not to place fresh stamps over those which have been previously used. Where to affix the stamps.

23. In affixing the stamps, the corner of the envelope and the gummed side of the stamp should be slightly wetted, and then the stamp should be gently pressed till it is firmly fixed. The practice of dipping the stamp in water is objectionable; because, unless the stamp be immediately withdrawn, and care be taken, by the use of blotting paper or some other absorbent, to remove any excess of moisture, the gum may be washed off, or the stamp may be rubbed off the letter. By the use of envelopes bearing an *embossed* stamp (which can be obtained at any Post Office) all risk of the stamp being detached may be avoided. How to affix them.

24. The practice of sealing letters passing to and from the East and West Indies, and other countries with hot climates, with wax (except such as is specially prepared), is attended with much inconvenience, and frequently with serious injury, not only to the letters so sealed, but to the other letters in the mail, from the melting of the wax and adhesion of the letters to each other. The public are therefore recommended, in all such cases, to use either wafers or gum, and to advise their correspondents in the countries referred to, to do the same. Hot climates.

25. Any person who, on receiving a surcharged letter, has reason to think that it has been wrongly taxed, should take it, before it has been opened, to a post office to be weighed, and if it then appear that it does not turn the scale, should have its exact weight certified in writing. This will in most cases be sufficient evidence that the letter has been erroneously charged; though sometimes, owing to the paper being damp when it is posted, a packet weighs more then than when it is delivered; and it is the weight at the time of posting that determines the charge. Letters supposed to be wrongly surcharged.

26. When complaint is made of a letter or other postal packet being lost, missent, or delayed, information, as precise as possible, regarding all the facts of the case should be furnished, together with any documents that may throw light upon the matter. The day and hour at which the letter, &c. was posted, as well as the office at which and the person by whom this was done, should always be stated; and when possible, the cover or wrapper in an entire state should be sent, in order that the place of delay may be ascertained by an examination of the stamps. Complaints about missing letters, &c.

27. Neither money nor any other article of considerable value ought ever to be sent through the post, except by means of a money order or in a registered letter. Any person who sends money or jewellery in an unregistered letter, not only runs a risk of losing his property, but exposes to temptation every one through whose hands his letter passes, and may be the means of ultimately bringing some clerk or letter carrier to moral ruin. Every letter which contains money or other valuable article even when registered, ought to be securely sealed, and if there be postage stamps in it, these should be enclosed in paper thick enough to prevent their being seen or felt through the cover. Money, &c.

28. Whenever bank notes are sent by post, even in registered letters, they should be cut in halves, and the second halves should not be posted till it has been ascertained that the first halves have been received; and further, in order to afford the means of identification, a memorandum should always be made of the number of each bank note. Bank notes.

29. Except where the Surveyor may deem a longer interval necessary, late letters,\* &c. are received till within five minutes of the despatch of the mail; Late letters.

\* "Late Letters" are such as are posted after the ordinary time, and cannot be sent forward by the mail then in preparation, unless extra payment be made.

although no office is kept open merely for this purpose after ten o'clock at night.

Prepayment  
of late let-  
ters.

30. No late letters, &c. (except Government letters) are forwarded by the mail preparing for despatch unless prepaid, and that by stamps, including both the ordinary postage and the late letter fee; but in the case of letters directed to any department of Government, it is sufficient to prepay the fee. Prepaid letters may, however, be handed to the sorters in the Travelling Post Offices on any of the lines of railway upon which such offices are run, on payment of an extra fee (in postage stamps) of 2*d.* on each letter. The times at which late letters can be posted at the Chief Office, St. Martin's-le-Grand, the Branch Offices, the District Offices, Receiving Offices, and Pillar Boxes in London, are given at pages 125 to 170.

Notice of  
hours of  
attendance,  
&c.

31. Every Postmaster is required to have a notice conspicuously placarded, giving information respecting the hours of attendance, the despatch and delivery of letters, &c.

Sunday.

32. At all offices which are open on Sunday the public are allowed, during the time they are open (*viz.* from 9 to 10 in the morning and one other hour), to prepay foreign and colonial letters, to purchase postage stamps, and to have letters registered. The hours at which telegraph business is attended to are, as a rule, from 8 to 10 A.M.; but no Money Order, Savings Bank, Insurance, or Annuity business is transacted on that day.

33. At no provincial town in England or Ireland is there more than one delivery on Sunday, Christmas Day, or Good Friday; nor, in Scotland on Sunday or the Sacramental Fast Days;\* and any person is at liberty to prevent even this delivery, so far as relates to himself, as shown by the following regulations:—

1st. Any person can have his letters, &c. retained in the Post Office on Sunday by addressing to the Postmaster a written request, duly signed, to that effect; and such request will be held to include newspapers, and all other postal packets, even such as may be marked "immediate;" as no distinction can be allowed.

2nd. No letters, &c. the non-delivery of which by the Letter-carrier on Sunday has been directed, can be obtained from the Post Office window on that day.

3rd. Private box-holders have the option of applying for letters at the office while it is open for delivery on Sunday, or of abstaining from so doing, as they may think proper; but no person can be permitted to engage a private box for Sunday only.

4th. To prevent the inconvenience and confusion which would arise from frequent changes in these instructions, no request can be entertained unless it extend to a period of at least three months, nor be withdrawn, even after the lapse of that time, without a week's notice.

34. Any person conveying (otherwise than by the Post) a letter not exempted from the exclusive privilege of the Postmaster-General incurs, by law, a penalty of £5 for every letter, and £100 for every week the practice is continued. The sender also is liable to a penalty of £5 for every letter.

35. The exclusive privilege of the Postmaster-General is confined strictly to letters, and does not therefore extend to newspapers, books, or money; any of which may be legally conveyed by other means. The following kinds of letters also need not be sent through the Post:—

1st. Letters sent by a private friend, to be delivered by such friend to the person to whom they shall be directed;

2nd. Letters sent by a messenger on purpose, concerning the private affairs of the sender or receiver thereof; commissions or returns thereof,

\* The despatch from Sub-offices on Christmas Day and Good Friday is generally earlier than on other week days.

and affidavits and writs, process or proceedings or returns thereof, issuing out of a Court of Justice ;

3rd. Letters sent out of the United Kingdom by a private vessel (not being a packet boat) ;

4th. Letters of merchants, owners of vessels of merchandize, or of the cargo or loading therein, sent by such vessels of merchandize, or by any person employed by such owners for the carriage of such letters, according to their respective directions, and delivered to the respective persons to whom they shall be directed, without paying or receiving reward or profit for the same in anywise ;

5th. Letters concerning goods or merchandize sent by common carriers, to be delivered with the goods which such letters concern, without hire or other advantage for receiving or delivering such letters ;

36. No person, however, is authorised to make a *collection* of such excepted letters for the purpose of sending them in the manner above described.

37. The following persons are expressly forbidden to carry a letter, or to receive or collect or deliver a letter, even though they shall not receive hire or reward for the same : Persons forbidden to carry letters.

1st. Common known carriers, their servants or agents, except a letter concerning goods in their carts or waggons, or on their pack horses ; and owners, drivers, or guards of stage coaches ;

2nd. Owners, masters or commanders of ships, vessels, steam boats, or boats called or being passage or packet boats, sailing or passing coastwise, or otherwise between places within Great Britain or Ireland, or between, to, or from ports within Her Majesty's dominions or territories out of the United Kingdom, or their servants or agents, except in respect of letters of merchants, owners of ships, or goods on board ;

3rd. Passengers or other persons on board any such ships, vessels, steam boat, passage or packet boat ;

4th. The owners of or sailors or others on board a ship or boat passing on a river or navigable canal within the United Kingdom or other Her Majesty's dominions.

### XXIII.—PREVALENT MISCONCEPTIONS.

1. Complaint is sometimes made of delay in carrying into effect intended improvements. It should, however, be borne in mind that changes in machinery so extensive and intricate as that of the Post Office must be made cautiously, and with much previous consideration. The arrangements of the service, even in districts widely separated, are so much dependent upon each other, and economy of time (one of the first objects in all postal organization) requires that they should be so nicely adjusted, that no alteration can safely be made without completeness of preparation and a close examination of all its consequences ; for as on the one hand experience proves that almost every improvement shows the way to further amendment, so, on the other, it will be found that an ill-considered change, though it may give a partial advantage in one quarter, generally leads to dislocation and confusion in others. This, of course, involves a reference to every district or community which may be affected,—often distant from the metropolis ; and entails the necessity of reports from various quarters, which must be considered, compared, and in many instances tested by experiment, before a safe decision can be arrived at. Even then, negotiations with railway companies or coach proprietors may have to be entered into, tenders invited, new contracts made, and old contracts, requiring notice of termination, got rid of, before the decision can take effect. Much time necessary in making alterations:

2. It is often assumed that a mail conveyance, passing by or through a place, however small, ought, as a matter of course, to deposit the letters directed Mails for small places.

thereto; the practice, and the necessary practice, being that until the mail arrives at the head post office of the district the letters in question are not separated from the other letters of that district. Any other arrangement would require either that the mail conveyance, even if but a mail cart, were converted into a travelling Post Office, and furnished with clerks of great local knowledge, or that every village in the kingdom having any correspondence with the place in question were to make up a bag for that place; in which case its mail would contain nearly as many bags as letters.

Reduction  
of Head  
Offices.

3. It happens from time to time that, owing to the stream of postal communication having been diverted from the old mail road to a line of railway, or from other causes of like nature, it becomes desirable to reduce the post office of a town from the condition of a principal office to that of a sub-office. This step not unfrequently gives rise to complaints; the inhabitants being under the impression that they shall not in future be so well served. This is a misconception. The change is not made when it will subject the correspondence to delay; nor does it cause any withdrawal of accommodation in respect to Money Order, Savings Bank, or other postal business. It is, in fact, simply a departmental arrangement, which consists in carrying on the sorting of the letters for the new sub-office at some intermediate office, instead of sending the letters in direct bags.

No control  
over Foreign  
Post Offices.

4. A frequent error is to assume that the Postmaster-General has some control over the delivery, charge, and other postal arrangements in the Colonies, and even in foreign countries; whereas, except at Malta and Gibraltar, the British Post Office is as powerless abroad as the Foreign or Colonial Post Offices are here.

5. Another misconception, which occasionally causes trouble and disappointment, consists in assuming that a discretionary power can be intrusted to subordinate officers to remit penalties or overcharges in special circumstances. Cases will undoubtedly occur in which strict observance of a general rule may inflict more or less injustice upon individuals, and where a dispensing power immediately at hand might furnish a remedy; but in an establishment as large and as widely spread as the Post Office there will always be many subordinate officers, some of them carrying on their duties beyond the easy reach of any supervising authority, who are not fit depositaries of such a power, affecting, as it would, to a great degree, the public revenue. It therefore becomes necessary to lay down definite and precise rules from which no departure can be allowed, except under sanction of the Postmaster-General; while in the few instances in which these rules press hardly, appeal can be made to the General Post Office. It may be added, that in many instances even such appeal is necessarily fruitless, the Postmaster-General being bound to a particular course by positive law.

#### XXIV.—REGULATIONS RELATING SPECIALLY TO THE LONDON DISTRICT.

##### *Postal Districts.*

1. London and its environs are divided into Eight POSTAL DISTRICTS, each of which is treated, in many respects, as a separate Post Town. The following are the names of the Districts, with their abbreviations, viz. :—

Eastern Central .....	E.C.	South Eastern .....	S.E.
Eastern .....	E.	South Western .....	S.W.
Northern .....	N.	Western .....	W.
North Western .....	N.W.	Western Central .....	W.C.

2. By the addition of the initials of the Postal District to the address of a letter for London or its neighbourhood, increased security is afforded against mis-delivery or delay, and the work of the Post Office is facilitated.

3. The District initials for every important street or place are given in the Street List at pages 175 to 223.

*Town Deliveries.*

4. The portion of each District within about 3 miles of the General Post Office is designated the Town Delivery, and the remainder the Suburban Delivery.

5. Within the limits of the Eastern Central District there are daily twelve deliveries, and within the Town limits of the other Districts eleven deliveries :—The *First*, or General Post delivery, including all Inland, Colonial, and Foreign letters arriving in sufficient time, commences about 7.30 A.M., and, except on Mondays, or on other days when there are large arrivals of letters from abroad, is generally completed, throughout London, by 9 o'clock. In the Eastern Central District the second delivery begins at about 8.15 A.M., and includes the correspondence received by Night Mail from Ireland and by the North Mail arriving at 6.45 A.M.; and the third delivery in this District, corresponding with the second delivery in other districts, is made at 10.30 A.M., and includes the letters collected in London generally at 8.45 A.M., and the correspondence by the Scotch Mail arriving about 9.40 A.M. The next nine deliveries are made in every District hourly, and include all letters reaching the General Post Office, or the District Offices in time for each despatch. The last delivery, extending to all the Districts, begins at about 7.45 P.M.

6. Each delivery within the Town limits occupies about an hour.

7. The Provincial Day Mails are due at various times, and the letters are included in the next Delivery after their arrival in London. The Day Mails from Ireland, France, and the Continent generally, and the letters received from Brighton and other towns which have a late afternoon communication with London, are delivered the same evening in London and in the Suburbs within the six-mile circle. (For number of Mails between Provincial Post Towns and London, see page 123.)

*Suburban Deliveries.*

8. There are six despatches daily to the Suburban Districts. The first (at 6.30 A.M.) is to all places within the London District; and includes the correspondence by the Night Mails from the Provinces, and by any Colonial or Foreign Mails arriving in sufficient time. This delivery is generally completed in the nearer Suburbs by 9 A.M., and at the more distant between 9 and 10 A.M. The second despatch (at 9.30 A.M.) is to the nearer Suburban Districts only. The third despatch (at 11.30 A.M.) comprises, with a few exceptions, every part of the London District. Except to isolated places, the fourth despatch (at 2.30 P.M.) is to most of the Suburban Districts. The fifth despatch (at 4.30 P.M.) extends to the whole of the Suburban Districts; and, except in the remoter rural places, the letters are delivered the same evening. The sixth despatch is at 7 P.M. Letters for this despatch posted at the Town Receiving Houses and Pillar Boxes by 6 P.M., or at the *Chief Office of the District to which they are addressed* by 7.30 P.M., are delivered the same evening; except at a few distant places, where the delivery is made early the following morning.

9. The deliveries in the Suburban Districts begin from one to two hours after the stated time of despatch; according to the distance from London; the deliveries in rural parts of the remoter Suburban Districts being necessarily fewer than in the towns and villages.

*Collections from the Town and Suburban Receiving Houses, &c.*

10. The latest times for posting letters at the Chief and District Offices, and at the Receiving Houses and Pillar Letter Boxes, for the London and Suburban despatches, and for the Inland, Colonial, and Foreign Mails, are fully stated in the Tables at pages 125 to 170. It is requested that all letters may be posted as early as possible.

11. Letters brought to the Receiving Houses after the fixed time of posting has expired cannot be forwarded till the next despatch; and the Receivers and Letter-carriers are strictly forbidden to receive a fee for including such letters in the collection. Provided, however, that they be not detained, and their duty thereby impeded, Letter-carriers in the Suburban Districts are permitted to take charge of letters to be posted on their route.

12. As a general rule the number of despatches from any place is the same as the number of deliveries there.

13. At the District Offices, and at the Town Receiving Houses, separate boxes are provided for "London District" and "General Post" letters; and the public will much facilitate postal business by taking care to post their letters in accordance with the inscription on each box. For the convenience of persons intrusting their letters to servants or children to post, the inscription on the "London District" box is in *red* letters, and that on the "General Post" box in *black* letters, so that the most illiterate person can be instructed in which of the boxes to deposit any letter. In the Town Districts generally, and in certain Suburbs where there is a collection from the Pillar Boxes at 3 or 4 A.M. (see pages 128 to 170), the Receiving Office Letter Boxes are closed during the night and on Sundays, in order that letters may not be posted there, but in the Pillar Boxes, and so have the advantage of such early collection.

*Night Mails from London.*

14. These Mails leave the General Post Office at 8 P.M., and (with one or two exceptions) arrive at all important towns in England and Wales in time for a Morning delivery, beginning before 9 o'clock.

The arrival at Edinburgh and Glasgow is also in time for a similar delivery.

For times of posting for these Mails, see Tables given under each District, pages 125 to 170.

*Mails for the Channel and Scilly Islands, Isle of Man, Orkney and Shetland Islands, and Island of Lewis.*

15. The Jersey and Guernsey Mails are conveyed by steamers to and from Southampton; the despatches and arrivals being as follows:—

The Mails for Guernsey despatched from London on Saturday afternoon are not delivered till Monday morning.

16. Alderney and Sark are served from Guernsey, and letters are forwarded to them on the average five times in a fortnight.

17. The Scilly Islands Mails are conveyed by steamer to and from Penzance twice a week, viz. : from Penzance to Scilly on Wednesdays and Saturdays, soon after the arrival of the Night Mail from London; and from Scilly to Penzance on Tuesdays and Fridays in connexion with the Night Mail to London.

18. Mails to and from the Isle of Man are conveyed by steamers between Liverpool and Douglas *daily* (Sundays excepted) from 1st *June* to 30th *September*; in May and October *four times* weekly; and during the rest of the year *three times* weekly. There is also one communication weekly between Liverpool and Ramsey.

19. Mails to and from the Orkney Islands are conveyed daily (excepting Sunday), from Thurso at 9.40 A.M., and from Stromness at 4.45 A.M.

20. Mails to and from the Shetland Islands are conveyed from Aberdeen every Friday Evening, arriving at Lerwick on Sunday Morning; and returning from Lerwick to Aberdeen every Monday at 6 and 10 P.M. alternately.

21. Mails to and from the Island of Lewis are conveyed between Ullapool and Stornoway five days a week from 1st April to 30th September, and three

days a week during the remainder of the year. The excepted days in summer are Saturday and Sunday. In winter the Packet leaves Ullapool on Tuesday, Thursday, and Saturday mornings, and returns on Monday, Wednesday, and Friday in time for the despatch of the London Mail in the afternoon.

*Latest time for registering Letters.*

22. For the *Night Mails*, the latest time for registering both inland and foreign and colonial letters at the Chief Office, St. Martin's-le-Grand, and at the Head District Offices and Post Offices at Lombard Street and Charing Cross, on payment of the ordinary fee of 4d., is 5.30 P.M.; or, on payment of a late fee of 4d. in addition to the registration fee, the latest time is 6 P.M. At the Town Branch Offices and Town Receiving Houses the latest time for registering letters for the *Night Mails* (such letters not being forwarded by the Midnight Despatches) is 5 P.M.

23. For the *Day Mails* to the Provinces, Ireland, Scotland, France, and the Continent generally, and for the Colonial and Foreign Mails via Southampton, letters can be registered at the Chief Office, at the Head District Offices, and at the Lombard Street and Charing Cross Post Offices, for the ordinary fee between 6 and 7.30 P.M., and at the Town Branch Offices and Town Receiving Houses between 5.30 and 7.30 P.M. the previous evening.

24. For the *first London District Delivery* letters can be registered at the Chief Office, at the Head District Offices and at the Lombard Street and Charing Cross Post Offices for the ordinary fee between 6 and 7.30 P.M., and at the Town Receiving Houses between 5.30 and 7.30 P.M. the previous evening; and for the other London District deliveries half an hour before the latest time for posting ordinary letters. No letter can be registered at the Chief Office, the Lombard Street Post Office, or the Western District Office before 7.30 A.M. or after 7.30 P.M., or at the Charing Cross Post Office or other District Offices before 8 A.M. or after 7.30 P.M., or at the Town Branch Offices and Town Receiving Houses before 8 A.M. between 5 and 5.30 P.M., or after 7.30 P.M.

25. At the Suburban Offices the latest time for registering is half an hour before the fixed time for clearing the box for each despatch, except that no letter can be registered before 8 A.M. or after 7.30 P.M.

*Letters "to be called for."*

26. There is a Poste Restante both at the General Post Office, St. Martin's-le-Grand, and at the Charing Cross Post Office, where letters "to be called for" can be obtained between the hours of 9 A.M. and 5 P.M. No letters are taken in "to be called for" at the other District or Branch Offices, and any so directed are sent to the Charing Cross Poste Restante from Offices in the Western Districts of London, viz., the W., S.W., W.C., and N.W. Districts; and to the Poste Restante, St. Martin's-le-Grand, from the Offices in the other Districts.

Poste Restante at General Post Office and Charing Cross.

Hours of attendance.

Letters not taken in at other district offices.

27. The Poste Restante being intended solely for the accommodation of strangers and travellers who have no permanent abode in London, letters for residents must not be addressed to the Post Office "to be called for;" and any letters for a resident so addressed, although delivered at the Post Office for one week, are, after that time, sent out by the Letter-carriers. Even strangers are not, as a rule, allowed to use the Poste Restante for more than two months; at the end of which time they are expected to have their letters sent to a private address.

Poste Restante not intended for residents.

Privilege only granted for two months.

28. Letters addressed to initials or to fictitious names, at the Poste Restante, or any District or Branch Office, are not taken in, but are at once sent back to the writers.

Initials and fictitious names.

Private address: letters cannot be re-directed from

29. Letters may not be re-directed from a private address to the Poste Restante.



Should be addressed "To be called for."

30. Letters intended to be called for at the General Post Office should have the words "to be called for" added to the address; otherwise such letters are sent round, in the first instance, to the several departments of the General Post Office, to ascertain whether they are intended for any of the officers, and therefore may not be at hand when applied for.

Particulars required.

31. All persons applying for letters at the Poste Restante must be prepared to give the necessary particulars to the clerk on duty, to prevent mistakes and to ensure the delivery of the letters to the persons to whom they properly belong. If the letters be for a subject of the United Kingdom he must be able to state from what place or district he expects them, and must produce some proof of identification; and if he send for his letters, the messenger, besides being furnished with this information, must have a written authority to receive them. If the applicant be a foreigner he must produce his passport; or if he send for his letters the messenger must produce it. Subjects, however, of States not issuing passports, are treated as subjects of the United Kingdom.

Letters: how long kept.

32. Letters from abroad addressed to the Poste Restante, London, are retained for two months. Letters from provincial towns similarly addressed are retained one month, and letters posted in London one fortnight; all such letters, at the end of these periods, being sent to the Returned Letter Office for disposal in the usual manner.

Letters to be called for at Receiving Houses.

33. The Letter Receivers in the London District are not required to take charge of letters to be called for; but they are permitted to do so (and also to charge a fee), provided that the letters are addressed "Post Office," and that the persons seeking such accommodation are known to them or have previously made a like application, and that the Receiver is satisfied that proper use will be made of the privilege. When, however, letters for strangers are presented without the Receiver's consent having been first obtained, or, when there is reason to suspect that the Receiving House is being made to serve improper ends, the Receiver is instructed to refuse to take them in. Letters may not be re-directed from the Poste Restante to a Receiving House, or from one Receiving House to another in the London District.

#### *Private Letter Boxes.*

34. Private letter boxes may be rented at the window of the General Post Office, at the Lombard Street Branch Office, and at any District Office. The charge for a private box is 3*l.* a year, payable in advance; and no box can be rented for less than a year. Private box holders can obtain their letters between 7.30 A.M. and 7.30 P.M.

#### *Overcharged Letters.*

35. Overcharges are returned between the hours of 10 and 4, on presenting the overcharged letters at the office for the sale of stamps, &c. at the General Post Office. Or the letter may be sent to the office by the Letter-carrier of the District.

#### *Hours of Attendance.*

36. Postage stamps and stamped envelopes are sold at the Chief Office between the hours of 6.45 A.M. and 7.30 P.M.; at Lombard Street and at the Western District Office between 7 A.M. and 7.30 P.M.; at the other District Offices and the Charing Cross Post Office between 8 A.M. and 7.30 P.M.; and at the Branch Offices and Receiving Houses between 8 A.M. and 8 P.M.

37. Business relating to Money Orders, Savings Banks, &c. is transacted at the Chief District Offices, at the Post Offices, in Lombard Street and at Charing Cross, between 10 A.M. and 4 P.M.; except on Saturdays, when such business ceases at 1 P.M. At Branch Offices and Receiving Houses in the Town Districts the time is between 10 A.M. and 4 P.M.; at Branch

Offices in the Suburban Districts between 10 A.M. and 5 P.M. ; and at Receiving Houses in the Suburban Districts between 9 A.M. and 6 P.M. On Saturdays, however, although general Savings Bank business ceases at the hours named, yet Savings Bank *Deposits* are received at all Money Order Offices, except Charing Cross, until 8 P.M.

*Sunday.*

38. All Post Offices in the London District are closed on Sundays with the exception of those mentioned at pages 36 and 37, which are open during certain hours for the receipt and despatch of telegrams. Letters, however, posted in London before 9 P.M. on Saturday are forwarded to the travelling post offices, and reach their several destinations in time for delivery on Monday morning. Letters posted in the *Pillar Boxes within the Town limits, and in some of the nearer Suburbs, on Sundays*, are collected early on Monday morning, in time for all the Morning Mails, and for the first London District delivery.

**OTHER BRANCHES OF POSTAL BUSINESS.**

**XXV.—POST OFFICE TELEGRAPHS.**

1. The charge for telegrams throughout the United Kingdom, including the Channel Islands and the Isle of Man, but excepting the Scilly, Orkney, and Shetland Islands, is 1s. for the first 20 words, and 3d. for every additional five words, *i.e.*, for every additional group of not more than five words\* ; the names and addresses of the sender and receiver not being counted. Tariff for inland telegrams.

2. The charge for telegrams to the Scilly Islands is 3s. 6d. for the first 20 words, and 9d. for every additional five words ; and to the Orkney and Shetland Islands 2s. for the first 20 words, and 6d. for every additional five words ; except to Moss Bank, Culla Voe, Uya Sound, and Balta Sound, in Shetland, the rates to which are 3s. for the first 20 words, and 9d. for every additional five words. Tariff for the Scilly Isles, &c.

3. The charges for press telegrams are 1s. for every 100 words or portion of 100 words handed in between the hours of 6 p.m. and 9 a.m. ; and 1s. for every 75 words or portion of 75 words handed in between the hours of 9 a.m. and 6 p.m. ; with an additional charge of 2d. per 100 or 2d. per 75 words, as the case may be, for the same telegram to every additional address. Tariff for press telegrams.

4. The inland telegram forms are of two kinds, namely, the "A 1" form, embossed with a stamp of the value of 1s., and the "A" form (given gratis), with no stamp embossed thereon. The "A 1 forms" may be purchased singly or in any number. They may also be had bound up into books of 20 forms ; price 1l. Telegram forms.

5. Interleaved books of stamped telegram forms bearing the name and address of the sender (and of the receiver, if required) printed on each form are supplied free of extra cost, if not less than 500 of such stamped forms (value 25l.) are taken at a time.

6. Stamped telegram cards are also issued to the public at the rate of 1s. for each card, or in packets containing 20 cards at 1l. per packet. Telegram cards.

7. When the terminal telegraph office, *i.e.*, the office from which the message is delivered, is a Head Post Office, the amount paid for the transmission of a message covers the cost of delivery within the town postal delivery of that office. But when it is not a Head Post Office, the message is delivered free only within a radius from it of one mile. Free delivery.

8. When the addressee resides beyond the above-described limits, portorage is charged at the rate of 6d. per double mile (that is, a mile out and a mile Portorage beyond free delivery.

\* A similar interpretation is to be put upon the phrase "every additional — words," wherever such phrase occurs.

back), or any part thereof, provided the whole distance to be traversed does not exceed three miles out and three miles back. For instance, if the addressee's residence is a mile and a quarter from the terminal telegraph office, and also beyond the free delivery, the charge for portage would be 1s.; if the distance is above two miles and under three, 1s. 6d.

Delivery by mounted messenger.

9. If the addressee resides at a greater distance than three miles from the terminal telegraph office, portage is charged for delivery by mounted messenger at the rate of 1s. per double mile, except in the case of telegrams for Ireland, where the charge is only 8d. per double mile.

Deficiency charged against addressee.

10. The sum paid by the sender for delivery by special foot messenger, or by mounted messenger, is always telegraphed to the terminal telegraph office; and should the sender have undercalculated the distance over which the message has to be carried by special foot or mounted messenger, the deficiency is charged on delivery.

Excess refunded to sender.

11. If, on the contrary, the sender has paid too much, the excess, on application to the Secretary, is refunded to him.

Delivery by post or train.

12. If the sender requires his telegram to be forwarded by post or by train from the terminal telegraph office he must write the words "by post" or "by train" in the space provided for that purpose at the foot of the message form.

Telegrams for ships.

13. A deposit of 5s. is required upon all telegrams addressed to persons on board ship (unless the ship be lying in the dock) to cover any expense incurred in their delivery; but application can be made to the Secretary for any surplus.

Extra charges and portage.

14. Extra charges for words beyond the number allowed for 1s. must be prepaid by stamps affixed to the telegram form; and the extra charge for portage, when any has to be paid, should also, as far as possible, be prepaid.

Sender to state distance.

15. In order that the charges for portage may be properly assessed, the senders are expected to state, as accurately as possible, the distance at which the addressees live from the terminal telegraph office.

Embossed stamps removed from "A 1" form.

16. An embossed stamp which has been removed from a spoiled and unused "A 1" form will be accepted in payment of a telegram; but mutilated or defaced stamps will not.

Sender should give his address.

17. The sender should state his address with sufficient fulness to enable the Department to communicate with him should such a course be necessary. When the senders of messages do not reside in the town from which they forward their telegrams they should furnish their permanent address on the telegram form, and add the name of the town from which the message is sent. For example; if John Smith, of Glasgow, tenders a message in Birmingham for transmission to Liverpool, and if he describes himself as John Smith, Glasgow, he should add the words, "now in Birmingham."

Repetition of telegrams.

18. Telegrams may be repeated at the request of the sender, if he desires to adopt this extra security against risk of error, by being re-signalled from each office at which they are received to the office from which they are forwarded. The charge for repetition is one half the ordinary tariff; fractions of threepence being reckoned as twopence.

Prepaid replies.

19. The cost of a reply to a telegram may be prepaid; and a Prepaid Reply Pass will then be delivered to the addressee, who will be at liberty to send his reply, from any Postal Telegraph Station, at any time within two months after the date of the original telegram. If the pass be not used, application for the return of the money, accompanied by the Prepaid Reply Pass, may be made, by the holder, to the Secretary, General Post Office, London. A Prepaid Reply Pass, however, need not necessarily be used for the reply to a message, but may be used for the purpose of prepaying a message containing the same number of words as that named on the pass.

Re-direction of telegrams.

20. Telegrams may be re-directed from town to town at an extra charge of *one half* the ordinary tariff (fractions of threepence being reckoned as twopence); but in such cases they must not have been opened.

21. Copies of a telegram directed to more than one person or firm in the same free delivery will be delivered separately at an additional charge of threepence per copy. The London Postal Districts, however, will not be regarded, for this purpose, as together forming one free delivery; each Postal District being treated separately. Copies of telegrams delivered to several persons.

22. Persons who wish to avoid sending so far as to a Telegraph Office may, without additional charge, post either a stamped telegram card, or a telegram form enclosed in an envelope addressed "Telegraph Office," in a wall or pillar box, or in the letter-box of a Receiving Office or Sub-Post Office. Telegrams so posted are sent on to the nearest Postal Telegraph Office by the first collection from the letter-box in which they are deposited, are thence transmitted by wire as soon as possible, and are delivered to the addressee free of extra charge, provided the proper amounts for the number of words contained in them, and for portorage when they have to be delivered beyond the limits of the free delivery, have been prepaid. The period of arrival at the Postal Telegraph Office is regarded as the time of receipt from the public. In the case of telegram cards, the date and hour at which the message is posted should be written in the spaces provided for that purpose. Telegrams can be posted.

23. Telegrams so posted, but insufficiently prepaid, are forwarded to their destination, the difference of charge being obtained from the addressee; but unpaid telegrams are not forwarded. Unpaid telegrams not forwarded.

24. Most of the Telegraph Offices in the United Kingdom are closed between 8 p.m. and 8 a.m.; and as time is required for transmission between office and office, it must be borne in mind that if a telegram be deposited in a box at such a time that it cannot reach a Telegraph Office before 7 p.m., it may not reach its destination until after 8 a.m. on the following day. Telegrams posted late liable to delay.

25. Telegrams written on the proper forms and properly prepaid may be handed to Rural Messengers who are proceeding to Postal Telegraph Offices for transmission therefrom. Telegrams can be handed to rural messengers.

26. Telegrams written in any European language are charged for according to the number of words they contain; but all unintelligible words not forming part of any European language are charged for as if each syllable were one word. Should the word not be composed of syllables, then five letters are considered as equal to one word. Foreign words, &c.

27. No combination of two or more words is counted as one word, with the exception of those words which are ordinarily coupled by hyphens, such as "mother-in-law," "non-delivery," "sub-lieutenant," "alms-houses," &c., or words denoting the names of persons or towns, whether connected by hyphens or not, such as "O'Niel," "MacDonald," "Newcastle-on-Tyne," "Isle of Wight," &c. The name of the county added to the name of a place is reckoned separately, as, for example, "Newcastle, Staff.," "Bradford, Yorks.;" the charge being, in each instance, for two words. Compound words not counted as one word.

28. The following exceptional compound words are charged for as one word:— Exceptional compound words.

Midday.	To-day.	Halfpenny.

Also all denominations of trades, such as linendraper, silversmith, share-broker, &c.

29. Abbreviations of auxiliary verbs designated by apostrophes (such as can't, won't, don't, I'll, you'll, couldn't, shouldn't, &c.) are charged for as one word. By writing words in this way, however, there is a greater risk of error. Abbreviations allowed but not recommended.

30. Numbers expressed in figures in an inland telegram are counted as so many words, according to the number of figures employed. For example, "7" counts as one word, "12" as two words, "385" as three words; and so on. Fractions are counted according to the number of figures employed to express the quantity, one word being added for the bar or mark of division Each figure reckoned one word.

between the numerator and denominator—thus, " $\frac{1}{2}$ " counts as three words, " $\frac{3}{4}$ " as three words, " $10\frac{7}{8}$ " as six words.

District initials.

31. The initial letters denoting the several London Postal Districts are each charged as one word; for instance, "S.W." is counted as two words.

Names of ships.

32. The name of a ship is charged as a compound word if composed of more than one word. For example, "City of Brooklyn" is charged as three words.

Parentheses, &c.

33. When the sender of a telegram desires words to be underlined, or placed in a parenthesis, or within inverted commas, two extra words are charged for.

"Private," "confidential," &c. on envelope of message.

34. When the sender of a telegram desires that special instructions, such as "private," "confidential," "to be opened at once," or the like, shall be written on the envelope containing the copy of the message which is to be delivered to the addressee, he must write the instructions on the form immediately after the address of the person to whom the message is sent. These instructions are charged for as part of the message.

Telegrams repeated at half cost.

35. If the receiver of a telegram doubts its accuracy, he may have it repeated by depositing half the amount paid for its transmission to him. The money will, however, be refunded to him if it should turn out that the telegram had been inaccurately transmitted.

Registration of addresses.

36. The full address at which telegrams reaching London from provincial towns or from abroad, and marked with an abbreviated or arbitrary address, are to be delivered, can be registered at the General Post Office on payment of an annual fee of one guinea.

Sender must pay for a fresh message if sent to a second address.

37. The sender of a telegram, upon being informed that his message cannot be delivered in consequence of the addressee being unknown at the address furnished, must, should he desire to furnish a corrected address, pay the cost of a fresh telegram.

Messages "To be called for."

38. When telegrams are addressed to a Postal Telegraph Office to be called for, they are kept for two clear days; and, if no application be made for them within that time, are sent to the Chief Office, London.

Re-direction of letters by telegraph.

39. Telegrams for the re-direction of letters are accepted at the ordinary rate of charge; but the sender must append his signature to the telegram, otherwise it cannot be acted upon.

Indecent or libellous telegrams.

40. Telegrams which are indecently or obscenely worded, or which appear to contain abusive, libellous, or slanderous matter, will not be transmitted.

Non-liability of Post Office.

41. The Department is not liable for losses incurred through the incorrect transmission, delay, or non-delivery of telegrams.

Hours of attendance.

42. Telegraph offices are, as a rule, open from 8 a.m. to 8 p.m. on week days, and from 8 a.m. to 10 a.m. on Sundays. There are, however, offices in several of the larger towns which are open for longer periods; and at the following offices in London and in the country there is attendance continuously during the day and night, both on week days and Sundays.

*Private Wires.*

43. The Department undertakes to construct and afterwards maintain, at Private the rates specified in Tables A. and B., a line of private wire between the wires. place of business or residence of a firm or private individual and a Postal Telegraph Office, or between two places of business or residences; except where it may be desired to have a line of private telegraph between two towns which are connected by means of the public postal wires. In such cases the Department only grants a line of private wire in each town between the place of business and the Head Postal Telegraph Office; the service between the two towns being performed over the public wires at the ordinary charge, of course, for inland telegrams, in addition to the fixed yearly rental for the two lines of private telegraph.

44. The Department also undertakes to supply Greenwich mean time by Time sig- electric current every hour in the day in London, and at either 10 or 1 o'clock nais. to places in the country at the rates set forth in Table D.

45. All applications or communications in regard to private wires or time Applications: signals should be addressed to "The Surveyor of Private Wires, General Post Office, London." how to be made.

## C.—REGULATIONS AND CONDITIONS.

*a. An Instrument in a Postal Telegraph Office.*—For desk accommodation and clerk's services, 5*l.* 5*s.* per annum.

*b. Delivery of Local Messages.*—A charge of 3*d.* each is made upon messages sent over a private wire and intended to be delivered within the local free delivery; beyond that boundary the ordinary rates for delivery are charged.

*c. Extension of an Existing Line.*—If the extension does not increase the rental, the cost is borne by the renter.

*d. Maintenance of Lines not the Property of the Department* will be undertaken for any period of not less than one year; the annual charge is calculated at 1*l.* less, per mile, than the rates set forth above under "wire rental scale;" but before the Department will undertake to maintain it, a line must be put into thorough order by the proprietor at his own expense. The Department cannot allow the erection on its poles of a wire not belonging to it.

*e. Agreement.*—A simple form of agreement has been prepared and every renter will be required to sign it. This agreement, as a rule, will be determinable at three months' notice, given previous to the end of the current year's rental; or failing such notice, on payment of such sum as the Department may agree to accept in lieu thereof; but where the expense is considerable, the period must not be less than from three to five years; the latter period being stipulated for, when the proposed line will be in an outlying district, will be specially provided for a single renter, and it is not probable that there will be other renters.

*f. Payment of Rental.*—The rental is, in all cases, payable *yearly, in advance.*

XXVI.—MONEY ORDERS.

1. The public are recommended, when applying for Money Orders, to use printed "Application Forms," which save time, and afford greater security, than verbal messages, against mistakes. These forms are supplied gratuitously at all Money Order Offices. Application forms.

3. No order is allowed to contain a fractional part of a penny. No fractional part of a penny allowed.

4. No Money Order can be issued, unless the applicant furnish, in full, the surname and at least the initial of one Christian name, both of the remitter and the payee, together with the remitter's address. In the case of Colonial and Foreign Orders the full address of the payee must be given; and if the Order be payable to a native in British India, the Tribe or Caste, and the Father's name, must also be furnished. Particulars required.

*Exceptions:—*1st. When the remitter directs at the time of issue (which he is at liberty to do), that the order, by being crossed like a cheque, be made payable only through a bank, it is left to his option to give or withhold the name of the payee.

2nd. If the remitter or payee be a peer or a bishop, his ordinary title is sufficient.

3rd. The usual designation of a firm is sufficient, except in the case of a company trading under a title which does not consist of the names of the persons composing it, as the "Carron Company."

5. The holder of a Money Order is always at liberty to direct, by crossing it, that the order be paid through a bank, even though its payment was not originally so restricted; and when the order is thus presented the question put on the presentation of an ordinary Money Order is dispensed with. Orders can be crossed.

6. When application is made for a Money Order payable in London, or at any other town where there is more than one Money Order Office, the remitter should say at which of such offices he wishes it to be paid: otherwise the order can be cashed only at the Head Office. It is not incumbent on a Postmaster to supply such information relative to local or provincial offices, but the nearest Money Order Office to any street in London may be ascertained by referring to the Street List, at page 175. Nearest Money Order Office.

7. An order once issued cannot be cancelled; and should repayment or transfer to a different office be required, the remitter or payee must apply to the paying Postmaster according to the directions in par. 16 of these regulations. Orders cannot be cancelled.

8. In order to enable the remitter to obtain an acknowledgment of the receipt of a Money Order before the Money is paid, it is arranged that he may make his order payable ten days after date, provided that, in the presence of the Postmaster, when he obtains the order, he affix thereto, in the space after the request *C.*, a penny receipt stamp, and write his signature across the stamp.



Payment of Money Orders.

9. When an order is presented for payment (otherwise than through a bank) the Postmaster has first to see that the signature of the payee be as full as the name given in the advice, and be not in any way inconsistent therewith. He has then to call on the applicant to give the name of the remitter, and if the reply be correct, the order will be paid, unless the Postmaster have good reason for believing that the applicant is neither the rightful claimant, nor deputed by him. When an order is paid through a bank it is sufficient that it be receipted (without regard to any discrepancy between the signature and the name in the advice), and that it be presented (crossed with the name of the receiving bank) by some person known to be in the employment of the bank.

10. Money Orders do not require a receipt stamp.

Lapsed and void Orders.

11. Payment of an order, issued and payable in the United Kingdom, or issued in the United Kingdom and payable in Belgium, Denmark, Germany, Holland, Italy, or Switzerland, or issued by any of those countries on the United Kingdom, must be obtained before the end of the second calendar month after that in which it was issued (for instance, if issued in January it must be paid before the end of March): otherwise the order becomes lapsed, and a new order is necessary, for which a second commission is charged. The period for payment of orders issued in the United Kingdom and payable at other places abroad or in any colony authorised to transact Money Order business, including Gibraltar and Malta, is six months; and orders granted at those places on the United Kingdom are also payable during six months after that in which they were issued. A person presenting a lapsed order is furnished with a copy of a printed notice headed "Lapsed Money Orders," containing directions how to proceed. If the order be not paid before the end of the twelfth calendar month after that in which it was issued (for instance, if issued in January, and not paid before the end of next January), all claim to the money is lost.

No compensation granted and no after payment made.

12. No application can be entertained for compensation for alleged injury from the nonpayment of a Money Order at the expected time.

13. After once paying a Money Order, by whomsoever presented, the Office is not liable to any further claim.

Precautions to be taken with Money Orders.

14. To guard against any person, even if he obtain possession of a Money Order, fraudulently getting it cashed, the remitter is recommended,—

1st. When he is well known to the payee, to sign the letter enclosing the order with his initials only.

2nd. When this is not the case, either to make the order payable ten days after date, or to register the letter enclosing it, or to make the order payable through a bank by crossing it like an ordinary cheque.

3rd. When it is not considered expedient to adopt either of these courses, to send the remitter's name (without a knowledge of which payment cannot be obtained) in a separate letter from that containing the Money Order; although this latter precaution is much less effective than either of the others.

Payment cannot be made on day of issue.

15. Payment of an order cannot be demanded on the same day as that on which the order was issued.

Duplicate orders, transfers, repayments, alteration of name, &c.

16. In case of the miscarriage or loss of an inland money order, a duplicate is granted on a written application (with the necessary particulars, and enclosing the amount of a second commission, in postage stamps) to the Controller of the Money Order Office of England, Scotland, or Ireland, as the case may be, where the original order was issued; and if it be desired to stop payment of an inland order, application must be made at the office where the order is payable, and a second commission must be paid. If alteration in the name of the payee or remitter of an inland Money Order should be required, application, accompanied by the payment of a second commission,

must be made by the remitter to the Postmaster of the office at which the order was issued. Should transfer of payment of an inland order from one office to another in the United Kingdom, or repayment of the amount of an order, be required, an application enclosing the order must be made to the Postmaster at whose office the order is payable; who will transmit, in exchange, a new order payable at the place desired, but for a less sum than the original order by the amount of the second commission charged for the re-issue. Proper printed forms for making applications in all these cases may be obtained at any Money Order Office. Whenever, on complaint being made, it is found that the necessity for an application, entailing the payment of a fresh commission, is attributable to the Post Office, the charge will be remitted to the applicant and imposed on the officer in fault.

17. A Postmaster is required to give information how to apply for a duplicate order, &c., and must furnish the prescribed form of application. If payment of an order be refused, in consequence of the reply to the question respecting the remitter, or the signature on the order not corresponding with the entries on the advice, the applicant for payment should communicate with the remitter, and request him to apply personally to the issuing Postmaster.

18. No Letter Carrier, Rural Messenger, or other Servant of the Post Office is bound to procure a Money Order for any person, or to obtain payment for one; but such services are not forbidden.

Letter Carriers, &c. not bound to procure Money Orders.

19. Money Orders are issued in the United Kingdom on the following colonies, British agencies, and Foreign countries\* :—

21. The renewal of a lapsed Order, the issue of a duplicate Order, or the stoppage of payment of an Order issued by a Colony on the United Kingdom, will be made on application to the Controller of the Metropolitan Office of that portion of the United Kingdom in which such *Colonial Order is payable*, provided an additional British Inland Rate of Commission be enclosed with the application; except in the case of lapsed Orders, when the additional commission will be deducted from the amount of the new Order issued by the Department; but the lapsed Order must be transmitted with the application for its renewal. Postmasters in the United Kingdom have power to transfer to other offices in the United Kingdom payment of colonial orders originally drawn on their own offices. As regards Foreign Money Orders, applications should be made to the Controller of the Money Order Office, London.

Duplicate Colonial and Foreign Orders, transfers, stoppage of payment, &c.

\* When a whole country is named, Money Orders may be drawn, as a rule, on any important town in that country, as also on the many smaller towns, of which complete lists are kept at every Money Order Office.

† Considerable variations in the rates of exchange with any foreign country may occasionally necessitate an increase, or decrease, of the commission.

## XXVII.—POST OFFICE SAVINGS BANKS.

Hours of business.

1. Every Post Office Savings Bank is also a Money Order Office, and is open for bank business during the same hours as for Money Orders. (But see page 33, paragraph 37.)

Amount of deposits.

2. Deposits of one shilling, or of any number of shillings, or of pounds and shillings, may be made by any person at the Post Office Savings Banks, provided that such depositor shall not make deposits amounting to more than 30*l.* in any year ending the 31st December, or make any further deposit when the amount standing in his name, exclusive of interest, exceeds 150*l.* When any Depositor's principal and interest amount together to 200*l.*, all interest will cease so long as the balance of the account continues to amount to the said sum of 200*l.*

Name, address, and occupation of Depositor to be furnished, and declaration to be made.

3. On making his first deposit, every person must give his Christian and surname, state his occupation and residence, and sign the following declaration, to be witnessed by the Postmaster or by some person known to the Postmaster or by the Minister or a Churchwarden of the parish in which the Depositor dwells, or by a Justice of the Peace; and if such declaration or any part thereof shall not be true the Depositor making the same will forfeit all right to his deposits.

If Depositor cannot write.

4. If the Depositor cannot write, then on making the foregoing declaration and in any other case in which his signature is required, the Depositor must, in the presence of a witness, affix his mark to be attested by the witness's signature.

Depositor's book to be issued. Deposits to be reported to the Postmaster-General and acknowledged.

5. Every deposit must be entered in the Depositor's book, and attested by the Officer making such entry, and by the dated stamp of the Office. The book must then be given to the Depositor and kept by him as primary evidence of the receipt of the deposit. When a book is first given to a Depositor he must, in the presence of the Postmaster, sign his name in it. The amount of each deposit, with the name, occupation, and residence of the Depositor, must, upon the day of the receipt thereof, be reported to the Metropolitan Office, and an acknowledgment of such deposit will be forthwith sent by post to the Depositor as conclusive evidence of his claim to its repayment with interest thereon. If the Depositor do not receive the acknowledgment within ten days after making his deposit, he should apply for such acknowledgment to the Principal Office in London.

Interest.

6. Interest, calculated yearly at the rate of 2*l.* 10*s.* per cent. per annum, will be allowed on every complete pound deposited, reckoned from the first day of the calendar month next following the day on which a complete pound shall have been deposited or completed up to the first day of the calendar month in which the moneys are withdrawn. The interest thus calculated

will be at the rate of one halfpenny per calendar month for every complete pound. The interest will be reckoned to the 31st December in every year, and will then be added to the principal.

7. Besides ordinary persons, deposits may be made :—

(A.) By a Trustee on behalf of another person, in the joint names of such Trustee and the person on whose account such money shall be so deposited; but repayment of the same, or any part thereof, will not be made without the receipts of both parties. A person may act as trustee in any number of accounts, and at the same time have an account in his own name.

Persons by whom deposits may be made.

(B.) By two persons jointly on their own behalf, provided neither of them is already a depositor.

(C.) By any person under 21 years of age or for his benefit; and repayment will be made to such minor, if more than 7 years old, as if he were of full age.

(D.) By the Trustees of any legally established Friendly, Charitable, or Provident Society, or Penny Savings Bank; provided such Trustees make application by post to the Controller of the Savings Bank Department accompanied by a copy of their rules. Such Societies, &c. are allowed to invest considerably beyond the usual limit, or even without restriction as to amount; according to circumstances.

(E.) In the name of the Registrar of any County Court. Under the 24th section of the Act 30 & 31 Vict. c. 142 (County Courts Act), "trust moneys" not in excess of 500*l.* may be thus deposited; and under the 26th section, money paid into a County Court in "equitable proceedings" may be deposited by the Registrar without restriction as to amount.

8. Deposits made in Scotland by a married woman, or by a woman afterwards married, will be repaid to her unless her husband shall give notice, in writing, to the Postmaster-General requiring payment to be made to him. This rule applies also to deposits made in England or Ireland before the 9th of August 1870; from which day, by the passing of the Married Women's Property Act, all deposits made in England or Ireland by a married woman, or by a woman who may afterwards marry (unless the money belong to her husband and be deposited without his consent), are the separate and uncontrolled property of the woman.

As to repayment of deposits made by married women.

9. The Depositor's book must be forwarded *once in each year, on the anniversary of the day on which the first deposit was made*, to the principal office in a cover (to be obtained at any Post Office Savings Bank), in order that the entries may be compared with the entries in the books of the Postmaster-General, and the interest due to the Depositor inserted in it.

Depositor's book to be sent once a year to Principal Office.

10. No charge will be made for the books at first supplied to Depositors, or for books issued to them in continuation thereof; but if any Depositor shall lose his book, and shall desire a new book, application must be made by him to the Controller of the Savings Bank Department by letter, stating the circumstances, and enclosing Postage Stamps of the value of one shilling to pay for the new book should the application be granted.

No charge for book at first supplied. Charge for duplicate book.

11. No charge for Postage will be made to Depositors for the transmission of their books to the Principal Office, or for the return thereof to them, or for any applications they may have to make for acknowledgments of deposits, or for any application or necessary letter of inquiry respecting the sums deposited by them, or for the replies thereto.

No postage charged for transit of books, &c.

12. A Depositor in the Post Office Savings Bank may transfer his deposits to any other Savings Bank legally established; and, on his written application, accompanied by his book, to the Chief Office of the Postmaster-General, in a form to be obtained at any Post Office Savings Bank, he will be furnished with a certificate of the whole amount due to him; and his account with the Post

Transfers of deposits.

Office Savings Bank will thereupon be closed. A Depositor in any legally established Savings Bank may transfer his account to the Post Office Savings Bank, and may require from the trustees or managers of such bank a certificate, stating the amount due to him; and thereupon his account with such bank will be closed. The certificate may be delivered at any Post Office Savings Bank, and will be received as a deposit of the amount therein set forth; and on the certificate being forwarded to London, and verified by the National Debt Commissioners, an account for the amount thereof will be opened with the Depositor, and an acknowledgment for the amount will be sent to him.

With-  
drawals of  
deposits.

13. Any Depositor wishing to withdraw the sum deposited by him, or part thereof, must make application for the same in a Form which may be obtained at any Post Office Savings Bank. In this Form the Depositor must give the Particulars therein required; and on receipt of it at the General Post Office in London, a warrant for the amount required, payable at the office named by the Depositor, will be sent to him by post. This warrant must be presented by the Depositor at the Post Office named thereon, together with the Depositor's book, in which the Postmaster will enter the amount repaid, and attest the entry with his signature and the dated stamp of his office. The Postmaster will take from the Depositor a receipt (not chargeable with stamp duty) on the warrant for the amount repaid to him. The Postmaster-General will endeavour to prevent fraud, and to identify every Depositor transacting business with the Post Office Savings Bank; but if any person shall obtain possession of a Depositor's book and then fraudulently represent himself to be the Depositor, and by forwarding the proper notice of withdrawal, and by presentation of the Depositor's book, and compliance with the Rules of the Department, shall obtain any sum of money belonging to that Depositor, the Postmaster-General will not be responsible for the loss thereof.

Repay-  
ments.

14. Repayments are made only to the Depositor in person, or to the bearer of an order under his hand, signed in the presence of either the Minister or a Churchwarden of the parish in which the Depositor resides, of a Justice of the Peace, or, in case of sickness, of the Medical Attendant. If the Depositor be resident abroad, the signature must be verified by some constituted authority of the place in which he resides. A Form of Order, to be signed by the Depositor on such occasions, may be obtained at the Post Office at which the warrant is made payable. Money invested under the Act 30 & 31 Vict. c. 142 (County Courts Act), in the name of the Registrar of a County Court, can only be withdrawn upon authority addressed to the Postmaster-General by the Commissioners of Her Majesty's Treasury.

Funds of

15. In case any Depositor shall die leaving any sum of money not exceeding 50*l.*, exclusive of interest, deposited in the Post Office Savings Bank, and Probate of his Will, or Letters of Administration, be not produced, or if notice in writing of the existence of a Will, and intention to prove the same, or to take out Letters of Administration, be not given at the Principal Office within one month from the Death of the Depositor; or if such notice be given, but such Will be not proved, or Letters of Administration be not taken out, and the Probate or Letters of Administration (as the case may be) produced to the Postmaster-General within two months from the death of the Depositor, it will be lawful for the Postmaster-General, after such period of *one* or *two* months, as the case may be, to pay and divide such funds at his discretion to or amongst the widow or relatives of the deceased Depositor or any one or more of them; or, if he shall think proper, according to the Statute of Distributions.

Funds above  
50*l.*

16. In case any depositor shall die leaving any sum of money in the Post Office Savings Bank which (exclusive of interest) shall exceed the sum of Fifty Pounds, the same will only be paid to the Executor or Administrator on the production of the Probate of the Will or Letters of Administration of the Estate or Effects of the deceased Depositor.

17. If any Depositor, being illegitimate, shall die intestate, leaving any person or persons, who but for the illegitimacy of such Depositor, and of such person or persons, would be entitled to the money due to such deceased Depositor, it will be lawful for the Postmaster-General, with the authority in writing of the Barrister-at-law appointed to certify the Rules of Savings Banks, to pay the money of such deceased Depositor to any one or more of the persons who in his opinion would have been entitled to the same according to the Statute of Distributions if the said Depositor had been legitimate.

Payment on death of a Depositor being illegitimate and dying intestate.

18. If any Depositor shall become insane, or otherwise incapacitated to act, and the same shall be proved to the satisfaction of the Postmaster-General, then the Postmaster-General, if he shall be satisfied of the urgency of the case, may authorize payment, from time to time, out of the funds of such Depositor to any person whom he shall judge proper to receive it.

Incapacitated Depositors.

19. If any dispute shall arise between the Postmaster-General and any Depositor, or any executor, administrator, next of kin, or creditor, or assignee of a Depositor who may become bankrupt or insolvent, or any person claiming to be such executor, administrator, next of kin, creditor, or assignee, or to be entitled to any money deposited in the Post Office Savings Bank, the matter in dispute must be referred, in writing, to the Barrister-at-Law appointed under the Savings Banks Acts, and whatever award shall be made by the said Barrister will be binding and final without any appeal.

Settlement of disputes.

20. The officers of the Postmaster-General engaged in the receipt or payment of deposits are not allowed to disclose the name of any Depositor, or the amount deposited or withdrawn by him, except to the Postmaster-General, or to such of his Officers as may be appointed to assist in carrying out the provisions of the Post Office Savings Bank Act.

Secrecy.

## XXVIII.—GOVERNMENT INSURANCES AND ANNUITIES.

1. The Postmaster-General is empowered, under the Act 27 & 28 Victoria, cap. 43., to insure the lives of persons of either sex, between the ages of 16 and 60, for not less than 20*l.* or more than 100*l.* He is also empowered under the same Act to grant Immediate or Deferred Annuities of not more than 50*l.* on the lives of persons of either sex, and of the age of 10 years and upwards.

The persons whose lives are insured, or to whom Annuities are granted, by the Postmaster-General, have direct Government security for the payment of the money, at the proper time.

2. Certain Post Offices (the names of which may be obtained at any Post Office) have been opened for the receipt of proposals for the Insurance of Lives and the purchase of Annuities; and forms of proposal, with full instructions for filling up and delivering these forms, may be obtained at these Post Offices.

3. Tables of the premiums to be charged for the Insurance of Lives or for the grant of Immediate Annuities or for the grant of Deferred Annuities or Deferred Monthly Allowances, without return of purchase money, or for the grant of Deferred Annuities or Deferred Monthly Allowances, with return of purchase money, have been printed, and may be seen at the Post Offices which have been opened for the receipt of proposals. These tables may also be obtained of Messrs. Eyre and Spottiswoode, London. The price of the Tables for the Insurance of Lives and the grant of Annuities, without return of purchase money, is 3½*d.* The price of the Tables for the grant of Annuities with return of purchase money is 2*d.* If sent by post, 5*d.* is charged in the one case, and 3*d.* in the other. The Tables for the Insurance of Lives and the purchase of Immediate Life Annuities, are given in the Appendix, page 229.

4. The premiums to be charged for the Insurance of Lives vary with the ages of the persons whose lives are to be insured, and with the mode in which they are to be paid.

5. The Life of a Man or Woman in his or her 30th year may be insured for 100*l.* under any one of the following arrangements :—

Smaller sums may be insured by proportionate payments, but no one of the periodical payments must be of less amount than two shillings.

6. No one life can be insured for less than 20*l.* in the whole ; but when a life has been insured for 20*l.*, further insurances may be effected on the same life from time to time, for any amount, until the whole sum for which it is insured amounts to 100*l.*

7. If after having duly made his payments for a period of five years, the insured person shall be unable to continue, or shall desire to discontinue, such payments, a portion of the premiums paid by him (which portion will in no case be less than one-third of the whole sum paid by him) will be returned to him.

8. The sums to be charged for the purchase of Immediate Annuities will vary with the age and sex of the person on whose life the annuity is to depend :

9. The sums to be charged for the purchase of Deferred Annuities, or Deferred Monthly Allowances, will vary with the age and sex of the person on whose life the Annuity or Monthly Allowance is to depend ; and with the length of the term for which the Annuity is deferred (or in other words, with the number of years which are to pass before the commencement of the Annuity), and with the conditions of the contract as to the mode of purchase, mode of payment, and return or non-return of purchase money.

10. When the condition of the contract is to be that no part of the purchase money shall, in any event, be returned :—

and a Man aged 30 may purchase a Deferred Allowance of 2*l.* 7*s.* 3*d.* per month, to commence when he reaches the age of 60, by a payment until he reaches that age, of 8*s.* per month ; and a woman of like age may, by a like payment of 8*s.* per month, purchase a Deferred Allowance of 1*l.* 16*s.* 7*d.*, to commence when she reaches the age of 60.

11. When the condition of the contract is that, in the event of the death of the person on whose life the Annuity or allowance is to depend before the commencement of the Annuity or Allowance, the purchase money is to be returned to his representatives, and that if the purchaser at any time before the commencement of the Annuity or Allowance is unable to continue, or

wishes to discontinue, the purchase, the purchase money shall be returned to him; the price charged will be higher than when no such condition is made.

12. The Annuity or Monthly allowance granted on any one life must not exceed 50*l.* per annum, or 4*l.* 3*s.* 4*d.* per month; but purchasers need not purchase the whole amount of such Annuity or Allowance at one time. They may begin by purchasing such part as they can afford to purchase, and go on increasing their purchases from time to time as their circumstances will permit.

13. Husband and Wife may each be insured to the full amount of 100*l.*, and may each purchase an Annuity of 50*l.* or a Monthly Allowance of 4*l.* 3*s.* 4*d.* Any two persons may purchase an Annuity on their joint lives, with or without continuance of the Annuity to the survivor.

14. Persons contracting for the Insurance of their Lives, or for the purchase of Annuities or Monthly Allowances, will be allowed to pay their periodical premiums or instalments of purchase money at such of the Post Offices, which have been or may hereafter be opened for the purpose, as will suit them best.

15. Persons proposing to effect insurances on their lives, or to purchase Deferred Monthly Allowances, must provide, at their own cost, such certificates of birth or baptism, or other evidence of age, as shall be required from them; but will not be required to pay any fee for medical examination, or to pay the cost of any inquiry which the Postmaster General may think fit to make with regard to their health, habits, age, and occupation, or to pay any fee for the issue of any contracts which may be made in accordance with their proposals, or to pay any postage for the transmission of their proposals, or for the transmission of any correspondence arising out of such proposals between them and the Postmaster-General; inasmuch as a provision for all such costs and charges is included in the premiums which they will be required to pay, in accordance with the Tables framed for the purpose for the Insurance of their Lives or the purchase of Deferred Monthly Allowances.

16. Persons proposing to purchase Immediate or Deferred Annuities, payable half-yearly, must provide at their own cost such certificates of birth or baptism or other evidence of age as shall be required of them; and, inasmuch as the premiums fixed by the Tables framed for the grant of such Annuities do not include any provision for costs and charges, must pay, at the time of purchase, a fee of 1*s.* for every 1*l.* of Annuity purchased.

Explanation of the signs used in this list.

1. All Head Offices are Money Order Offices and Post Office Savings Banks, and also, with few exceptions, Postal Telegraph Offices. In the following list *Money Order Offices* and *Post Office Savings Banks* are marked thus \* ; *Postal Telegraph Offices* are marked thus † ; *Insurance and Annuity Offices* are marked thus ‡ ; and certain places where Railway Companies collect and deliver telegrams on behalf of the Post Office are marked thus §.

Head and Sub-offices.

2. Those places in the list which stand alone are *Post Towns*, that is, towns where the office is a Head Office. Where two places are mentioned, the first is a *Sub-office*, the second being its Head Office or Post Town. Where three are mentioned, the first is a *Sub-office*, the second is the *Head Office*, and the third is the *Money Order Office* nearest to the Sub-office ; this being added for the information of persons who may desire to send money to the neighbourhood.

Railway Sub-offices.

3. The initials "R.S.O.," and the name of a county in brackets, following the name of a place, indicate that the office is what is termed a *Railway Sub-office*, that is, a Sub-office which receives its correspondence direct from a Travelling Post Office instead of through a Post Town. If the Railway Sub-office is not a Money Order Office, the name of the nearest Money Order Office is added after the name of the county. Certain Sub-offices receive the bulk of their correspondence from some other than their own Head Office ; and in this list these offices are followed by the initials "S.O.," and the name of a county in brackets. Letters for such Sub-offices and for Railway Sub-offices should have the initials "S.O." or "R.S.O.," as the case may be, together with the name of the county added to the address.
