THE INLAND POST AMENDMENT (No. 11) WARRANT, 1910. DATED AUGUST 17, 1910.

We, the Commissioners of His Majesty's Treasury, in exercise of all powers given to us by the Post Office Act, 1908,* and of all other powers enabling us in this behalf, do by this Warrant made on the recommendation of His Majesty's Postmaster-General (testified by his signing the same) and under the hands of two of us the said Commissioners, order, direct, and declare as follows:—

Warrant to be read with existing Warrants.

Repeal of Clause 65 of Principal Warrant and substitution of new Clause.

Compulsory registration of certain packets. 1. This Warrant shall be read as one with the Inland Post Warrant, 1903† (hereinafter referred to as "the Principal Warrant"), and all Warrants amending the same.

2. Clause 65 of the Principal Warrant is hereby repealed and the following clause shall be substituted in lieu thereof, viz.:—

65. All postal packets on which, or on the envelope or cover of which, the word "registered," or any other word, phrase, or mark conveying the impression that the packet is registered or intended to be registered, is written or impressed, or which contain coin or jewellery (all which packets are hereinafter called "postal packets subject to compulsory registration") shall be registered, and if found in the post unregistered may be detained for the purpose of registration, at any Post Office through which they shall pass, until the ordinary despatch of packets next after that by which such packets ought otherwise to have been forwarded.

Alteration of Clause 67 of Principal Warrant.

Definition of jewellery

3. Clause 67, sub-clause (1) (e) of the Principal Warrant shall be read and take effect as though the word "watches" were omitted.

- 4. On and from the date when this Warrant comes into operation the expression "jewellery" shall mean:—
 - (a) gold or silver in a manufactured state; that is to say, a state in which value is added to the raw material

by skilled workmanship, and in this definition are included any coins used or designed for purposes of ornament,

(b) diamonds and precious stones,

(c) watches, the cases of which are entirely or mainly composed of gold or silver, and

(d) any article of a like nature which, apart from workmanship, has an intrinsic or marketable value.

5. This Warrant may be cited as the Inland Post Amendment Short title

(No. 11) Warrant, 1910.

6. This Warrant shall come into operation on the 17th day of Commence August, 1910.
