THE FOREIGN AND COLONIAL POST AMENDMENT (No. 8) WARRANT, 1910. DATED AUGUST 17, 1910.

We, the Commissioners of His Majesty's Treasury, in exercise of all powers given to us by the Post Office Act, 1908,* and of all other powers enabling us in this behalf, do by this Warrant made on the recommendation of His Majesty's Postmaster-General (testified by his signing the same) and under the hands of two of us the said Commissioners, order, direct, and declare as follows:-

- 1. This Warrant shall be read as one with the Foreign and Colonial Post Warrant, 1907† (hereinafter called "the Principal Warrant "), and all Warrants amending the same.
- 2. Sub-clauses (2) and (3) of Clause 38 of the Principal Warrant are hereby repealed, and the following sub-clauses shall be substituted in lieu thereof, viz.:--
 - 38. (2) Every outgoing postal packet which contains coin or jewellery, and which is addressed to a country to which such articles are transmissible by post, shall be registered, and, if posted without registration, shall be returned to the sender.
 - (3) Every incoming postal packet which contains coin or jewellery, and which is not registered, shall be treated

in accordance with the rules for the time being in force with respect to a similar inland postal packet in the United Kingdom.

Definition of jewellery.

3. On and from the date when this Warrant comes into operation the expression "jewellery" shall mean:—

(a) gold or silver in a manufactured state; that is to say, a state in which value is added to the raw material by skilled workmanship, and in this definition are included any coins used or designed for purposes of ornament,

(b) diamonds and precious stones,

(c) watches, the cases of which are entirely or mainly composed of gold or silver, and,

(d) any article of a like nature which, apart from workmanship, has an intrinsic or marketable value.

Short title.

4. This Warrant may be cited as the Foreign and Colonial Post Amendment (No. 8) Warrant, 1910.

Commencement.

5. This Warrant shall come into operation on the 17th day of August, 1910.
