OVERTIME.—ADDITIONAL TWO HOURS.

Order of Secretary of State extending Special Exception.

WHEREAS the Factory and Workshop Act, 1878, contains a special exception to the effect that the regulations of the Act with respect to the employment of young persons and women shall not prevent the employment in the factories and workshops or parts thereof to which the exception applies of young persons and of women during a period of employment beginning at 6 A.M. and ending at 8 P.M., or beginning at 7 A.M. and ending at 9 P.M., or beginning at 8 A.M. and ending at 10 P.M., if they are employed in accordance with the following conditions; namely,

(1.) There shall be allowed to every such young person and woman for meals during the period of employment not less than two hours, of which half an hour shall be after five o'clock in the evening; and

(2.) Any such young person or woman shall not be so employed on the whole for more than 5 days in any one week, nor for more than 48 days in any 12 months.

And whereas the special exception is by the Act declared to apply to the factories and workshops referred to in the said section;

And whereas it has been proved to my satisfaction that in the class of workshops mentioned in the schedule hereunder, it is necessary, by reason of press of work arising at certain recurring seasons of the year, and of the liability of the business to a sudden press of orders arising from unforeseen events, to employ young persons and women in manner authorized by this exception, and that such employment will not injure the health of the young persons and women affected thereby;

Now I, the Right Honourable Sir William Vernon Harcourt, one of Her Majesty's Principal Secretaries of State, by this Order, made under Part 2 of the said Act, extend this exception accordingly. Provided that nothing in this Order shall be taken to apply:

(a.) Where persons are employed at home, that is to say, to a private house, room, or place which, though used as a dwelling, is, by reason of the work carried on there, a factory or workshop within the meaning of this Act, and in which neither steam, water, nor other mechanical power is used, and in which the only persons employed are members of the same family dwelling there; or

(b.) To a workshop, or part thereof, which is conducted on the system of not employing any child or young person therein.

This Order shall come into effect on Tuesday, the 11th of October, 1881; and shall, unless previously revoked, continue in force until 31st December, 1882, and no longer.

TREASURY WARRANT.

WE, the Commissioners of Her Majesty's Treasury, in exercise of all powers enabling us in this behalf, do, by this Warrant, made on the representation of Her Majesty's Postmaster-General (testified by his signing the same), and

under the hands of two of us, the said Commissioners, order, direct, and declare as follows:—

1. All Treasury Warrants at any time heretofore made relating to the conveyance by post of postal packets (which term in this Warrant means and includes all letters, post-cards, newspapers, packets of commercial papers, packets of printed papers, and pattern or sample packets), between the United Kingdom and the Kingdom of Hawaii (Sandwich Islands), and also between any British Colony or Foreign Country and the Kingdom of Hawaii (Sandwich Islands), are hereby annulled to the extent to which such Warrants respectively relate to the several matters comprised in this Warrant as aforesaid.

2. The rates of postage and additional sum for registration now chargeable and payable by the authority of the Treasury Warrant of the 29th day of May, 1879, or the schedules thereunder written on postal packets conveyed or delivered for conveyance by post from or to Mexico, to or from any other country or place affected by the provisions of such last-mentioned Warrant of the 29th day of May, 1879, and all regulations and conditions as to the posting, forwarding, conveyance, and delivery of postal packets conveyed or delivered for conveyance by post now in force and applicable thereto shall extend and apply to all postal packets conveyed or delivered for conveyance by post from or to the Kingdom of Hawaii (Sandwich Islands), to or from any other country or place affected by the provisions of such last-mentioned Warrant of the 29th day of May, 1879, in the same way as if the Kingdom of Hawaii (Sandwich Islands) had been named in such last-mentioned Warrant of the 29th day of May, 1879, or the schedules thereunder written.

3. This Warrant shall come into operation on the first day of January, 1882.

INSTRUMENT of the Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England, substituting the New Church within the Parish of Llangwryfon,

for the Old Church thereof, in the County of Cardigan, and Diocese of Saint David's.

To all to whom these presents shall come, the Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England, send greeting:

WHEREAS a new church has lately been built within the parish of Llangwryfon, in the county of Cardigan, and in the diocese of Saint David's, and has been consecrated and dedicated as the Church of Llangwryfon.

And whereas the Right Reverend William Basil, Bishop of the said diocese of Saint David's, as such Bishop, and Sir Alexander Palmer Bruce Chichester, of Arlington, in the county of Devon, Baronet, as the patron of the vicarage of the said parish of Llangwryfon, and the Reverend Morgan Evans, Clerk in Holy Orders, as the Vicar or Incumbent of the same vicarage, did, by an instrument under their hands, bearing date on or about the fifth day of November, in the year one thousand eight hundred and eighty, certify to us, the said Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England, that it would be for the convenience of the said parish of Llangwryfon, that the said new church of Llangwryfon, situate within such parish, should be substituted for the old parish church (also called the Church of Llangwryfon), of the same parish.

And whereas, since the date of the said instrument, the said Sir Alexander Palmer Bruce Chichester, party thereto as aforesaid, has departed this life.

And whereas the four persons next hereinafter mentioned, that is to say, William Wither Bramston Beach, of Oakley Hall, near Basingstoke, in the county of Hants, Esquire, and Tankerville Chamberlayne, of Cranbury Park, near Southampton, in the said county of Hants, Esquire, and William Best, of Winchester, in the said county of Hants, Esquire, and Hans Sloane Stanley, of Number 14, Halkin-street West, in the county of Middlesex, Esquire, are the trustees of the settled estates of the said Sir Alexander Palmer Bruce Chichester, deceased, and are as such the present patrons of the said vicarage of the said parish of Llangwryfon.

And whereas the said present patrons of the said vicarage of the said parish of Llangwryfon are consenting to these presents, and in testimony of such their consent they have agreed to execute this instrument as is hereinafter mentioned.

Now, therefore, we, the said Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England, in exercise and execution of the power or authority in that behalf contained in the Act of the eighth and ninth years of Her present Majesty, chapter seventy, and in the Act of the nineteenth and twentieth years of Her said Majesty, chapter fifty-five, and of all other powers or authorities in anywise enabling us in the same behalf, do, by this instrument under our common seal, with the consents (testified as hereinafter mentioned) of the said William Basil, Bishop of the said diocese of Saint David's, and of the said William Wither Bramston Beach, Tankerville Chamberlayne, William Best, and Hans Sloane Stanley, and of the said Morgan Evans, hereby declare that the said new church of Llangwryfon, situate within the said parish of Llangwryfon, and duly consecrated as aforesaid, shall be and the same is hereby substituted for the said old parish church (also called the church of Llangwryfon as aforesaid), of the same parish, and that such new church shall henceforth be the parish church of the said parish of Llangwryfon, in lieu of the said old parish church of Llangwryfon, as fully in all respects as if the said new church of Llangwryfon so hereby substi-
