

Mease to its junction with the Trent, and turning to the right along the river Trent to Drakelow Viaducts aforesaid.

(2.) So much of the parish of Tatenhill, in the county of Stafford, as lies within the following boundaries, that is to say, the foot-path from Yoxall Lodge by Lin brook to Range moor, thence by the highway to Dunstall cross-roads, thence by the Shirall highway to Penny's turn, and thence by the carriage-drive to Yoxall Lodge aforesaid.

(3.) The petty sessional division of Elford, except the portion of the parish of Edingale which lies on the northern side of the highway from Lullington through Edingale village to Croxall.

(4.) The townships of Dunstall, Barton-under-Needwood, and Wichnor.

Warwickshire.—(1.) So much of the hamlet of Erdington, in the county of Warwick, as lies within the following boundaries, that is to say, the Midland railway on the south, Chester-road on the east, Grange-lane on the north, and the road leading from Bromford to Erdington on the west.

(2.) So much of the township of Amington, in the county of Warwick, as lies within the following boundaries, that is to say, the road from the Tamworth Colliery to Shuttington Bridge and the cart-road to Statfold Lodge on the east, the Ashby and Tamworth turnpike-road to the outside of Amington Old Hall farm on the north, the outside of Amington Old Hall farm and a straight line from thence to the London and North-Western Railway on the west, and the London and North-Western Railway to the Tamworth Colliery on the south.

Wiltshire.—So much of the parishes of Stratford, and Fugglestone St. Peter, in the county of Wilts, as lies within the following boundaries, that is to say, on the north by the southern fence of the main-road from Wilton to Woodford from the Direction Post at New Cut on the Devizes-road to the top of Camp Hill, from thence by a straight line across the Down to Little Durnford Lodge, and on the east by the eastern fence of and including the main-road from Woodford to Salisbury from Little Durnford Lodge to the county bridge crossing the river Avon at Stratford-sub-Castle, and on the south by a straight line from the county bridge at Stratford-sub-Castle across an orchard in the occupation of William Allen to a hedge extending from the western side of the orchard to the Devizes-road, and on the west by the eastern fence of the old turnpike-road from Salisbury to Devizes from the said hedge to the Direction Post at New Cut on the Devizes-road aforesaid.

Yorkshire (East Riding).—(1.) So much of the parish of Grindall, in the East Riding of the county of York, as lies within the following boundaries, that is to say, the highway leading from North Burton to Boynton on the east and south, and a quickwood fence dividing a grass field and tillage fields on the north and west sides in the same occupation and known by the name of the Back Garth.

(2.) So much of the parish of Hunmanby, in the Dickering petty sessional division, in the East Riding of the county of York, as lies within the following boundaries, that is to say, the highway leading from Hunmanby to Rudston on the east, certain quickwood fences dividing tillage fields from the grass field known as

Cowpasture, in the occupation of Hannah Lowish, on the north, south, and west.

Yorkshire (West Riding).—So much of the township of Erringden, in the West Riding of the county of York, as lies within the following boundaries, that is to say, the river Calder on the north, the Lancashire and Yorkshire Railway on the south, the fence dividing Stocks Hall farm from the farm of Robert Ashworth on the east, and the fence dividing Stocks Hall farm from the farm of Lewis Sutcliffe on the west.

(SWINE-FEVER.)

THE following Areas are now *Areas Infected with Swine-Fever* under the above-mentioned Act (except the lines of railway within those areas as far as those lines are used or required for the transit of swine through those areas, without untrucking):—

Buckinghamshire.—The whole of the parish of Stewkley, except the hamlet of Littlecote, in the county of Buckingham.

Wiltshire.—The petty sessional divisions of Calne, Chippenham, and Malmesbury, in the county of Wilts.

IN pursuance of the Act 31 and 32 Vic., cap. 22, the Lock-up belonging to the Justices of the Peace for the West Riding of Yorkshire, situate at Rotherham, has been constituted a place to be used for the custody of such offenders as may be liable to be detained in a Lock-up within the jurisdiction of the Corporation of Rotherham.

TREASURY WARRANT.

WE, the Commissioners of Her Majesty's Treasury, in exercise of all powers enabling us in this behalf, do by this Warrant, made on the representation of Her Majesty's Postmaster-General (testified by his signing the same), and under the hands of two of us, the said Commissioners, order, direct, and declare as follows:—

1. The rate of postage to be charged by or under the authority of the Postmaster-General in respect of a Reply Post Card conveyed or delivered for conveyance by Post within the United Kingdom, the Channel Islands, and the Isle of Man shall be one penny.

2. All such Reply Post Cards as are hereinbefore referred to shall be posted, forwarded, conveyed, and delivered under and subject to the several regulations, conditions, prohibitions, and restrictions contained in the schedule hereunder written.

3. This Warrant shall come into operation on the first day of October, one thousand eight hundred and eighty-two.

SCHEDULE.

REGULATIONS, Conditions, Prohibitions, and Restrictions as to the posting, forwarding, conveyance, and delivery of Reply Post Cards conveyed or delivered for conveyance by Post within the United Kingdom, the Channel Islands, and the Isle of Man.

1. Reply Post Cards with an impressed stamp of one halfpenny on each half thereof shall be issued by the Postmaster-General, and the Cards so issued, and no others, shall be deemed to be

Reply Post Cards within the meaning of this Warrant.

2. The address, and nothing else, shall, after the issue of a Reply Post Card, be written, printed, or otherwise impressed on that side of either half thereof which bears the impressed stamp, and no part of the address shall be written, printed, or otherwise impressed across such stamp.

3. Anything (including a letter or communication in the nature of a letter) may be written, printed, or otherwise impressed on that side of each half of a Reply Post Card which does not bear the impressed stamp.

4. Nothing whatever shall be in any manner attached to a Reply Post Card, nor shall a Reply Post Card after the issue thereof be cut or folded or otherwise altered, except that that half of a Reply Post Card which is intended to be used for the purpose of a Reply (in these Regulations referred to as "the Return half"), may be severed from the other half thereof.

5. If any Reply Post Card or the Return half thereof is sent by Post otherwise than in conformity with these Regulations it shall be enclosed in a sealed cover and forwarded to its destination charged on delivery with postage as an insufficiently paid letter of the same weight.

6. In the case of the re-direction of a Reply Post Card, or the Return half thereof, made by an Officer of the Post Office to a place within the same free delivery as the original address, no re-direction postage shall be charged.

7. In any case (not within the last preceding Regulation) of the re-direction of a Reply Post Card, or the Return half thereof, a re-direction postage shall be charged and paid of one half-penny, and such postage may be either prepaid by an adhesive Stamp or may be collected on the delivery of the Reply Post Card or the Return half thereof.

8. Where the despatch or delivery from a Post Office of letters would be delayed by the despatch or delivery therefrom at the same time of Reply Post Cards or the Return halves thereof, the same or any of them may be detained in the Post Office until the despatch or delivery next following that by which they would ordinarily be despatched or delivered.

9. There shall not be sent or forwarded by post any Reply Post Card or Return half thereof having thereon any words, marks, or designs of an indecent, obscene, libellous, or grossly offensive character, and if any Reply Post Card or Return half thereof shall be posted which shall *prima facie* fall within the aforesaid prohibition, it shall be stopped and submitted at the General Post Office to the inspection of an Officer duly authorized in that behalf by the Postmaster-General.
