**NEWSPAPERS TO PLACES ABROAD.
TREASURY WARRANT.**

WE, the Commissioners of Her Majesty's Treasury, in exercise of all powers given to us by the Post Office Acts or any of them, and of all other powers enabling us in this behalf, do, by this Warrant, made on the representation of Her Majesty's Postmaster-General (testified by his signing the same), and under the hands of two of us, the said Commissioners, order, direct, and declare as follows:—

1. The Warrant made by the Commissioners of Her Majesty's Treasury, dated the twenty-seventh day of December, one thousand eight hundred and seventy, and relating to the transmission by post of newspapers from any place in the United Kingdom, to any place out of the United Kingdom, shall be repealed, revoked, and annulled, on and as from the day on which this Warrant comes into operation.

2. In this Warrant the expression "United Kingdom," includes the Channel Islands and the Isle of Man.

3. Every packet consisting of newspapers transmitted by Post from the United Kingdom to any other country or place under the authority of the Treasury Warrant, dated the eleventh day of November, one thousand eight hundred and ninety-one, shall be posted, forwarded, conveyed, and delivered under and subject to the regulations, conditions, prohibitions, and restrictions, now or for the time being in force applicable to a packet of books or printed papers so transmitted.

4. This Warrant shall come into operation on the first day of January, one thousand eight hundred and ninety-two.

(PLEURO-PNEUMONIA.)

By the Board of Agriculture.

THE Board of Agriculture, by virtue and in exercise of the powers in them vested under the Board of Agriculture Act, 1889, and the Contagious Diseases (Animals) Acts, 1878 to 1890, and of every other power enabling them in this behalf, do order, and it is hereby ordered, as follows:

1. The following Places (namely),—(1) the whole of the land and premises at Fye Bank and Middle Bents Farms, Wilsden, in the West Riding of the county of York, in the occupation

of Mr. William Abbott, and (2) the yard, cow-houses, stables, and other outhouses at Lane Ends Farm, together with the five adjoining pasture fields respectively known as, the First field, the Middle field, the Meadow, the Browns, and the Far Browns, all which yard, houses, stables, and pasture fields are situate in the parish of Bingley, in the West Riding of the county of York, and are in the occupation of Mr. John Robinson,—which were declared by Order of the Board dated the twenty-fourth day of November, one thousand eight hundred and ninety-one, to be Places infected with pleuro-pneumonia, are hereby declared to be free from pleuro-pneumonia, and those Places shall, as from the commencement of this Order, cease to be Places infected with pleuro-pneumonia.

2. This Order shall take effect from and immediately after the nineteenth day of December, one thousand eight hundred and ninety-one.
