THE Governor and Company of the Bank of England give notice that they are authorized by the Lords Commissioners of Her Majesty's Treasury to receive on Tuesday, the 25th instant, tenders for Exchequer Bonds, as above, to be created under the Acts 29 Vict., c. 25, 52 Vict., c. 4, and 52 Vict., c. 6.

The Bonds will be issued for one, two or three years, at the option of the persons tendering, and will be repayable 1st August, 1894, 1895, or 1896, respectively.

Interest at  $£2\frac{1}{2}$  per cent. per annum will be payable by coupon half-yearly on 1st February and 1st August, the first coupon being payable on 1st February next.

Tenders may be for the whole of the issue or for any part, in multiples of £500, and must be delivered at the Chief Cashier's Office, Bank of England, not later than one o'clock, on Tuesday, the 25th instant. The prices offered must not include fractions of one shilling other than six pence, and separate forms must be used for different prices. The amount of Bonds applied for must be written on the outside of the tender.

In the event of the receipt of tenders for a larger amount of Bonds than that to be issued, the tenders at the lowest price accepted may be subject to a pro rata diminution.

The Lords Commissioners of Her Majesty's Treasury reserve the right of rejecting any tenders.

Payment in full of allotments must be made on Tuesday, 1st August, 1893, when the Bonds will be ready for delivery.

#### EXPRESS DELIVERY SERVICE.

##### TREASURY WARRANT.

WE, the Commissioners of Her Majesty's Treasury, in pursuance of the Acts relating to Her Majesty's Post Office, and in exercise of all powers enabling us in this behalf, do by this

Warrant, made on the representation of Her Majesty's Postmaster-General (testified by his signing the same), and under the hands of two of us, the said Commissioners, order, direct, and declare as follows:—

1. This Warrant may be cited as the "Inland Post Amendment Warrant, 1893."

2. This Warrant shall be read as one with the Inland Post Warrant, 1892 (hereinafter referred to as "the principal Warrant"), and all Warrants amending the same.

3. Where any express packet exceeds one pound in weight, there shall be charged and paid, in addition to all other fees chargeable under the principal Warrant or any Warrant amending the same, a fee (hereinafter referred to as an extra weight fee) of three half-pence for every pound or fractional part of a pound beyond the first pound.

4. Where two or more express packets addressed to different addressees are at the request of the sender delivered by the same special messenger, there shall be charged thereon—

(1.) In respect of the express packet which the messenger last delivers, the full express fees chargeable under the principal Warrant, the distance of the place of delivery from the express delivery office being calculated along the whole route actually traversed by the messenger.

(2.) In respect of each other of such express packets, in lieu of all other express fees (except extra weight fees), the sum of twopence.

Provided always that a sender shall not be entitled to require that any number of express packets exceeding ten or weighing collectively more than fifteen pounds be delivered by the same special messenger.

5.—(1.) Subject to the provisions of this Warrant, a postal packet may be conveyed and delivered by special messenger at the request of the addressee, and a packet so conveyed shall be included in the term "express packet" as used in the principal Warrant and any Warrants amending the same.

(2.) Where the addressee of a postal packet desires that such packet shall be delivered by a special messenger, he shall give notice in that behalf to the Post Office from which such postal packet would in the ordinary course of post be delivered (hereinafter referred to as "the Delivery Office").

(3.) Such notice shall be in a form to be prescribed by the Postmaster-General, and shall be delivered at the Delivery Office at such time as may be prescribed by the Postmaster-General.

(4.) Where one express packet only is delivered at the request of the addressee, there shall be charged thereon the full express fees chargeable on an express packet under the principal Warrant.

(5.) Where two or more express packets are delivered at the request of the addressee, there shall be charged thereon:—

(a.) In respect of one of such packets the full express fees chargeable on an express packet under the principal Warrant.

(b.) In respect of all other such packets, in lieu of all other express fees (except extra-weight fees), the sum of one penny for any number of packets not exceeding ten, and an additional sum of one penny for every ten packets or smaller number in excess of ten or any multiple of ten.

6. There shall be repealed so much of the principal Warrant as is specified in the Schedule hereto.

7. This Warrant shall come into operation on the twenty-fourth day of July, one thousand eight hundred and ninety-three.
